





Sugar Shortage

The current controversy over sugar supply is unfortunate. However it may be settled, there will be those-not fifth columnists or sixth, but just ordinary suspicious and bellicose patriots-who will argue that the whole business has been badly bungled. These critics will be secondguessing, so they will have plenty of embarrassing material at their command.

The Office of Price Administration says firmly that sugar stocks on hand are not as large as the public believes, that the sugar shipping situation may not continue as favorable as in the past few months. OPA, while making two extra pounds of sugar available between July 10 and Aug. 22, still maintains that it is not possible to assure permanent increases in the weekly ration.

The real dispute is between those who believe sugar will continue coming in at the present pace—and therefore the public should be given a fatter allowance—and those who fear shipments may fall off soon, and argue that a stock-pile must be built up to insure against future short-

The original decision to ration sugar appeared amply justifiable, in view of the shipping situation and our need for molasses from which to make alcohol for munitions. However, instead of 1,300,000 tons of sugar for munitions, we found it necessary to use only 400,000 tons. The

However, effective as of May 6, 1942, and under the authority of the President of the United States, the Federal Reserve Board has published a Regulation (known as Regulation W) covering the extension of credit by retail stores, and with which Regulation all retail stores are compelled to comply.

One of the most important stipulations, applying specifically to open charge accounts (not to instalment accounts),

ALL CHARGE ACCOUNT PURCHASES MADE IN ANY GIVEN MONTH, REGARDLESS OF THE DAY OF THE MONTH ON WHICH THE PURCHASES ARE MADE, MUST BE PAID FOR IN FULL BY NOT LATER THAN THE TENTH DAY OF THE SECOND MONTH FOLLOWING THAT MONTH IN WHICH THE PURCHASES WER MADE. (For example, all purchases made on any date in the month of May must be paid for in full by not later than July 10.) In addition thereto, any balances unpaid on May 1, covering purchases made over any period of time prior to May 1, must also be paid in full by July 10.

Any account not paid in accordance with the government regulation becomes technically in default, in which event it shall be against the law for a merchant to approve further charges to the account; however, in full appreciation of the fact that undue hardship may result from this Regulation, and in order to allow further purchases by those who cannot pay their accounts in full, within the specified time, the law permits, liquidation of an account—current or past due-by notes or other written agreement, within certain limitations.






