Pipe For Oil Line Is Rolling Along

NEW YORK (AP)—Pipe for the Texas-Illinois pipe line destined to bring petroleum to the rationed Eastern Seaboard is shooting out of the National Tube Co.'s Lorain, O., works at the rate of five miles a day, the U. S. Steel Corp. has announced.

The 24-inch pipe for the 550-mile line, extending from Longview, Texas, to a point near Salem, Ill., is expected to be completed within four months and the line is scheduled to begin carrying oil in about half again that long. Capacity was estimated at 300,000 barrels a day.

Ward County Scrap Metal Drive Success MONAHANS—Ward County has collected 1,100,000 pounds of scrap metal in the nation-wide drive, it was announced by H. E. Hubbard, county salvage committee chairman. The metal has been assembled at several points in the county, and will be concentrated at the Golden Pipe and Supply Company in Monahans.

The drive will continue, the aim being to get a million and a half pounds, at least, said Hubbard. In the scrap rubber drive, more than 125,000 pounds have been gathered, and the campaign ending Friday is expected to yield a good deal more.

Custom Slaughter Rules Announced

WASHINGTON (AP)—The new price ceiling on beef and veal carcasses and wholesale cuts, effective July 13, has been amended to eliminate the possibility of evasion through the practice of "custom slaughtering."

The usual compensation for the custom slaughterer's services is the hide and offal. The new amendment requires that a slaughterer who kills as a service for the purchaser must remit to the purchaser an amount sufficient to equalize the purchaser's cost in acquiring the carcass. The equalization figure is the maximum price at which the slaughterer could have sold the carcass to the purchaser.

Another provision of the amendment requires each seller, in computing his maximum prices for forees and hinds separately, to adjust those prices so as to prevent the total price from exceeding the maximum permitted for a whole carcass.

Cary Grant Weds Woolworth Heiress HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Movie Star Cary Grant and Woolworth heiress Barbara Hutton are honeymooning at an undisclosed mountain retreat. Their wedding Wednesday at Lake Arrowhead caught the film colony napping but hardly could be regarded as a surprise, for the 38-year-old Bristol, England-born Grant and his bride, one of the nation's richest women, have been inseparable companions for two years. She is 29.
