# Mansfield To Meet Burk In Title Match


The world's championship matched roping contest will be held this year in Midland. Toots Mansfield, the only man ever to hold the title three years in succession, and Clyde Burk, high man to date this year on points, and twice world's champion, will meet in Midland September 13 for the title.

The match was made in Midland Sunday when Mansfield met here with Clarence Scharbauer, president of the Midland Fair, Inc., Leonard Proctor, rodeo chairman, and John Dublin and Roy Parks, of the Midland Rodeo committee.

Mansfield came here direct from Cheyenne, Wyo., where he and Burk agreed last week to meet for the world title. Both expressed a preference for holding the match in Midland, and the committee has completed details of the contest. Soldiers Invited



Adolf Hitler's Russian offensive appeared Monday to be losing impetus against slowly tightening Russian defenses at the Don Bend approach to Stalingrad and along the last rail line to the oil fields of the Caucasus as the Red Army lashed back in a new show of strength.

Along the whole 300-mile arc from Kletskaya, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad, to Kushchevka, 50 miles south of Rostov, the Russians still were on the defensive; but the strengthening of their stand was indicated by cunterattacks which they reported hurled the Germans back with losses of 6,000 dead in a single day.



# **Progress Report**

This may be the time for a progress report on consumer goods which we have given up, as an incident of our entrance into a total war economy.

The War Production Board issued such a summary the other day, in skeleton form — a factual document, as government publicity properly should be, and unadorned with adjuctives.

Playing around with the statistics contained in the release, we have come up with some facts that seem worth passing on.

By government order, production for civilian use has been stopped in domestic oil burners, mechanical refrigerators, washing machines and ironers, electrical appliances, electric ranges and fans, fishing tackle, golf clubs, metal household furniture and signs, musical instruments, radios, outboard motors, many toys and games, vacuum cleaners, vending and amusement machines.

There has been sharp curtailent in the manufacture of baby carriages, bedding and mattresses, bicycles, caskets and burial vaults, church goods, cutlery, domestic cooking and heating stoves, coal stokers, hot water heaters and tanks, ice boxes, fountain pens and mechanical pencils, hair and bobby pins, incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs, jewelry, kitchen and household utensils, portable electric lamps and shades, razors and blades, and sewing machines.

Quite an imposing list, isn't it. And what have we gained?

Enough rubber for 9005 flying fortresses plus 18,011 medium tanks.

Enough aluminum for 2434 flying fortresses.

Enough copper for 260 destroyers, to chase Axis submarines.

Enough steel for 109 Liberty ships plus 33,333 fly- American farm output on record ing fortresses plus 12,820 medium tanks plus 4208 destrovers.

Enough lead for 12,544 medium tanks plus 26,909 armored trucks.
