Japs Occupy Three More Small Islands

(By The Associated Press) Imperial Tokyo headquarters asserted Japanese naval forces had occupied three more islands between Timor and New Guinea, thereby completing the tight-linked chain of potential invasion bases spreading in a vast arc above Australia. A communique said the Japanes had taken Kei, Aru and Tanimbar islands, which lie 375 to 500 miles north and northwest of Australia.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's head quarters reported quiet on the New Guinea front, where the Japanese have started a menacing drive toward the key Allied outpost at Port Moresby

Attack Outposts

Chinese headquarters announced that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's armies were attacking a string of Japanese outposts between the port of Wenchow and the Kiangsi-Chekiang rail line to the northwest.

The town of Suichang, midway between the rail line and Japaneseheld Lishui in southern Chekiang Province, was reported recaptured. Meanwhile, admiring Chinese pinned the nickname of "Sky Dragons" on the U. S. Army Air Forces hich on July 4 absorbed the "Flying Tigers" of Burma fame. A Chinese Army spokesman said the aggressive American fliers were making Japanese authorities at Hankow "rather jittery" with their hardhitting attacks.

An Allied military spokesman said the new Japanese foothold in New Guinea offered no special threat.

Aleutian Command

Perhaps the establishment of unified command in the Aleutians will clear up some of the fog which has surrounded those outposts of the continental United States. The physical fog probably will not prove amenable to orders from the unnamed naval officer now in charge.

But, as so many have pointed out already, fog sits alike upon the just and the unjust, Americans and Nipponese. The whole Aleutian situation has been surrounded by

a tragic surplusage of mental fog, and this a competent naval officer, given proper weapons and sufficient authority, can dispel.

President Roosevelt must be presumed to have known what he was doing when he gave the Navy supreme command there. The decision has at least one unfortunate aspect. The Navy's high command has insisted consistently that occupation of this western hemisphere territory is of no importance and no concern-a bit of trivia, hardly worthy of mention.

It is no reflection upon the ability of whatever naval subordinate has the Aleutian command to wish that the task of sending the Japs back home had been handed to a department which was willing to admit, even to itself, that it is disgraceful and alarming for us to permit an

enemy to stay on our hemisphere soil so long. The Army has realized, for years, the potential menace of Japanese seizure of key spots in the Aleutians, and sought vainly to get appropriations for their defense Dutch Never Will .ong before we were at war.

WASHINGTON (P)-Senate advocates of a cargo-carrier expansion program which would combat the submarine menace searched Thursday for a solution of the steel problem, which led the Maritime Commission to swamp the plan of A. J. Higgins, New Orleans ship-builder, to make 200 Liberty ships. The defense investigating com mittee called Reese Taylor, chief of the iron and steel division of the War Production Board, to tell what he could of the steel supply and allocations.

Chairman Truman (D-Mo), meanwhile, condemned the Navy Department's bureau of ships for 'negligence and wilful misconduct' in dealing with a "vehicle im-portant to the success of any invasion attempt." He transmitted a committee report to Secretary of the Navy Knox as a basis for his charges, leaving it to the Navy to decide whether the report should be made public.

Truman also accused the bureau of ships of "biased and prejudiced treatment" of the Higgins industries in insisting that the shipyard use models of the bureau's design "de-spite the repeated failures thereof.

Big Cargo Plane Production Will Be Double Soon

WASHINGTON (P) - The War Production Board's committee on cargo planes has recommended the doubling, at least, of cargo plane production, Chairman Donald M. Nelson announced Wednesday night but he left squarely up to the military chiefs the decision whether to cut down combat plane production

to make the increase possible. Three major recommendations of the committee, Nelson said, called for

1. An increase in cargo plane output to at least twice the present program, through an increase in present procurement and through conversion of certain bombers to cargo type.

2. Further impetus to development of longer-range land and sea planes.

3. A "large increase" in facili-ties for the manufacture and transportation of aviation gasoline to meet the needs of a greatly expanded movement of cargo by air.

"If we now undertake to build a substantially larger number of car-go planes than is already provided for in our schedule, we must of course cut down the number of some other airplanes in our pro-gram," Nelson said in releasing a digest of the special committee's report.

"That is a decision for the chiefs of staffs to make, since it is es-sentially a matter of high military strategy

'Meanwhile the War Production Board will continue to study the situation to see whether it is going to be impossible to expand our production of cargo planes through new facilities or by using other industries such as shipbuilders."




