MOSCOW (AP) - Fighting, similar in scope and inintensity to the Battle of the Caucasus, flared Thursday over Russia's Northwestern Front — the battle line which loops more than 500 miles northwestward from Moscow to Leningrad.

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) - The German high command announced Thursday the United States aircraft carrier Wasp had been set afire by six direct bomb hits and now "is trying to reach Malta" as a result of a running attack on a big Allied Mediterranean convoy by German and Italian air and naval

ANKARA (AP) — The Russian Black Sea fleet has reached Batum, Soviet port on the Caucasus coast, where it apparently is preparing to base its future operations, it was reported here Thursday.

LONDON (AP) - A Netherlands submarine torpedoed two Japanese supply vessels which "must be considered total losses," the Netherlands government in London announced.

#### Seattle Man Is War Bond Salesman

SEATTLE (A) - Joe Gluck, 59year-old merchandise broker, has turned his back on his own business for the duration to devote all his time to selling war bonds without salary or commission. He feels it's a privilege.

He has sold more than \$300,000 worth of bonds and has a \$500,000 goal set for Oct. 1. He buys bonds with his own funds and resells them to a regular list of "custom ers" whose purchases total more than \$21,000 weekly. Gluck himself has pledged to put \$6,000 annually into war bonds.

"I arrange their purchases so that all they have to do is to make out a check," Gluck explained. "The bonds are bought for them in advance and delivered to their offices or front doors-they never have any excuse for putting it off.'




