

# Marines Break Japs' Hold Nazis Prepare To Attack Stalingrad

## Capture Of Elista Is Announced As Troops Move Toward Caspian

Adolf Hitler's invasion armies were reported massing huge numbers of troops for an assault on the Volga steel city of Stalingrad Thursday and at the same time the German high command said other Nazi columns had captured Elista in a thrust more than half way across the Caucasus toward the Caspian Sea.

Elista, the capital of the Soviet Kalmuch Republic, lies 230 miles southeast of Rostov and only 175 miles from the vitally important city of Astrakhan at the Volga Delta.

The loss of Astrakhan would be a serious blow to Russia's river-borne line of war supplies.

As the global war exploded to peak fury on land, at sea and in the air, United States headquarters in Europe announced that during the past 48 hours U. S. Army air fighters had entered the struggle on a large scale for the first time.

A communiqué said American fliers had made 31 sorties from 9 a. m. Tuesday until 9 a. m. Thursday, including three sweeps over the Nazi-occupied French "invasion" coast, 20 missions at sea and eight interception flights off the coast of England.

No losses were mentioned. Simultaneously, the Italian headquarters reported that Axis planes and submarines still attacking a powerful British convoy in a three-day-old battle in the Western Mediterranean had inflicted "heavy losses" above all to aircraft carriers.

The Italian command said the convoy was escorted by "an imposing number of warships, among which were numerous aircraft carriers."

**Crews Of Two Red Warships Interned**  
LONDON (AP)—The German-controlled Paris radio broadcast a report Thursday under an Istanbul dateline saying that two Russian warships, fully manned, had entered a Turkish Black Sea port and that the crews had been interned.

**MOSCOW (AP)**—Fighting, similar in scope and intensity to the Battle of the Caucasus, flared Thursday over Russia's Northwestern Front—the battle line which loops more than 500 miles northwestward from Moscow to Leningrad.

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## Allied Fleet Forces Back U. S. Marines

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia (AP)—Firmly entrenched at three points in the Solomon Islands, United States Marines battled to expand their positions Thursday with the immediate backing of Allied sea forces and long-range air assaults on Japanese communications and reinforcement bases.

There was an unconfirmed Australian report that American parachute troops had been used as shock forces.

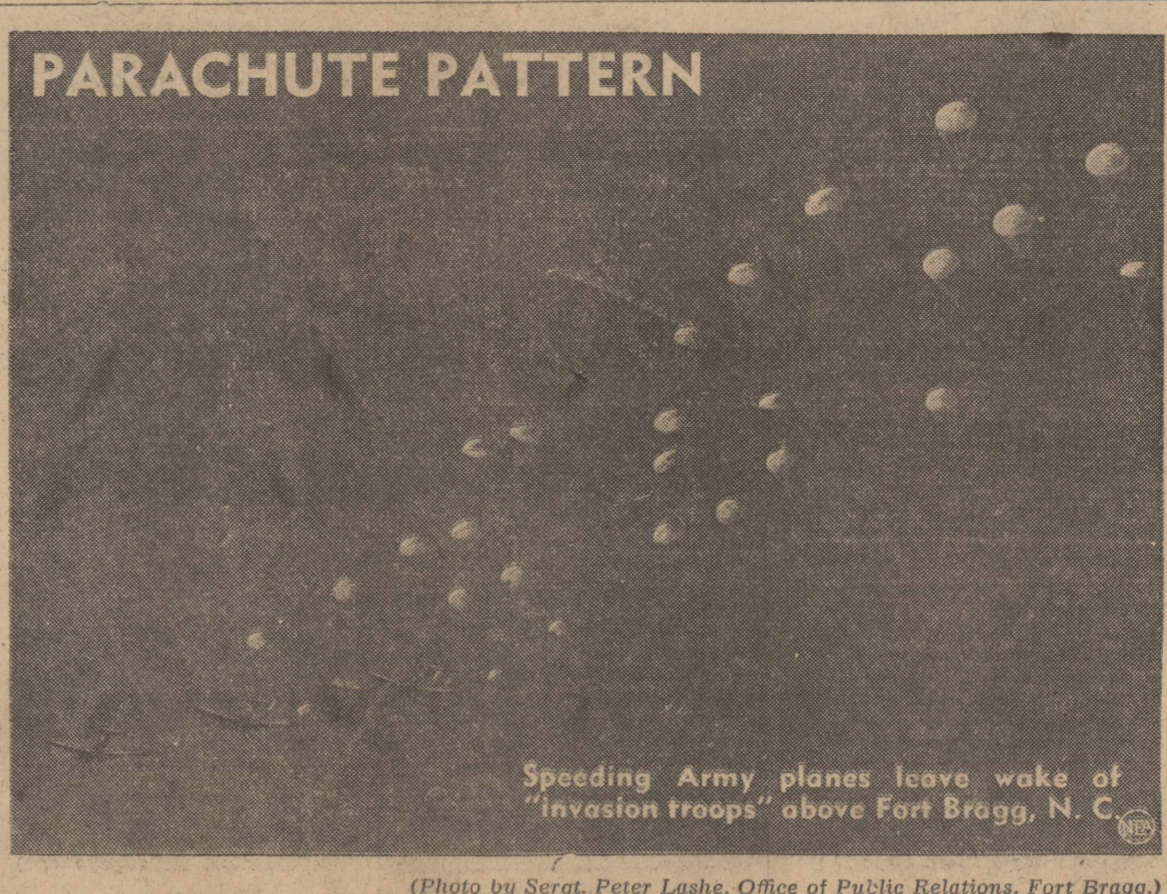
A spokesman here, asked for comment, said only that he never knew of such troops being landed from ship-based aircraft before.

A Washington Navy announcement that operations had advanced to the point where the leathernecks were consolidating their holdings in the Tulagi area, in the Southeastern Solomons, indicated that initial land opposition had been overcome after six days of savage hand-to-hand combat.

**Land On Schedule**  
The U. S. Navy's communiqué said the Marines landed as scheduled on three islands, whose names it did not disclose, in the Tulagi vicinity. It added that supporting Naval craft were meeting with bitter opposition, suggesting that the Japanese had thrown powerful surface and air units into the defense of their ground forces.

Flying fortresses, striking Wednesday at Rabaul, New Britain, in the fifth raid there in five days, knocked out four enemy ships in the harbor of this base from which Japanese troops and supplies have moved to the Solomons.

**Sink Ship**  
A 15,000-ton ship and two medium-sized ones were left spouting flames and another large ship was seen sinking by the stern, a headquarters communiqué said. One of eight challenging fighters was shot (Continued on page two)

**U. S. Bombers Blast Jap Occupied Town**  
CHUNGKING (AP)—United States bombers attacked the Japanese-occupied town of Yoyang (Yochow) in the northeastern corner of Hunan Province Tuesday, the American headquarters announced Thursday.

"Both high explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped, all of which landed within the town," the communiqué asserted. "The raid was highly successful and all American planes returned to their bases."

**Swastika Snatcher**  
New Berlin Bound  
Lou Zamperini, American Olympic track star who yanked down a swastika from Hitler's palace in Berlin in 1936, is going back to do a better job, complete this time.

## Japanese Are Driven From Many Defensive Positions On Islands

American "Devil Dog" Marines appeared to have won the first round in the seven-day-old battle of the Solomon Islands Thursday, beating off furious Japanese counterattacks at three invasion beachheads in the 900-mile-long island chain.

A correspondent of the Australia Broadcasting Commission said it was believed the Marines, strongly reinforced, had broken the Japanese hold on the Tulagi area.

"The Japanese have been driven from many of their defensive positions after fierce hand-to-hand fighting," the correspondent said.

Tulagi harbor is one of the finest naval base sites in the Southwest Pacific.

**Use Parachute Troops**  
An unconfirmed Australian report said American parachute troops had been used as shock forces in the assault.

Dispatches to the Yorkshire, England, Post reported that the Japanese fleet had "lost control of Tulagi harbor" and declared: "The Allies have air superiority and are using it at sea as well as on land."

A U. S. Navy communiqué said the Marines, firmly entrenched after six days of violent hand-to-hand fighting, were now consolidating their positions.

**Bitter Naval Fighting**  
Supporting naval forces are engaged in bitter fighting," the Navy said.

The communiqué did not specify whether the enemy was bringing up warship reinforcements or using land-based aircraft to bolster the defense of their ground forces. However, Allied reconnaissance showed a spurt in enemy shipping activity around Rabaul, New Britain, a major base for Japanese troops and supplies moving to the Solomons.

**Bombardiers Blast Ships**  
Striking to paralyze enemy reinforcements, American flying fortresses smashed at the Rabaul base for the fifth time in five days Wednesday. Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters said the raiders left a 15,000-ton ship and two medium-sized vessels in flames and a fourth enemy ship foundering.

Without the loss of a single bomber, the fighting craft shot down one of eight challenging Japanese fighters and damaged from three to six others, United Nations headquarters reported.

**Expand Gains**  
Rabaul lies 700 miles northwest of the Tulagi sector in the Southeastern Solomons, where the Navy said U. S. Marines were battling to expand their gains on three islands in the Tulagi vicinity—presumably Florida, Guadalcanal and Malaita.

**German Soldiers Are Killed In Explosion**  
LONDON (AP)—A Reuters dispatch from Stockholm said Thursday many German soldiers were killed or injured in an explosion which followed the collision of a German troop train and a fuel train on the Douai-Arras line in occupied France. It did not say when the collision occurred.

**Nazi Advances May Give Only Empty Victory**

The Germans continue their advances in the Caucasus, spreading both ways among the rugged northern foothills of the towering mountain range which forms a barrier across the great Caucasian isthmus separating the Black and the Caspian Seas.

On the coasts of either end of this mighty barricade are comparatively narrow routes which lead down into the Middle East and some of the world's richest oil fields. The Nazi Genghis Kahn is headed for those coastal routes, which may carry him to a great and perhaps decisive victory—if he can travel them. The fighting is fierce and bloody, for the Russians are exacting a terrible price for every foot of ground they surrender.

The picture isn't a cheerful one from our standpoint. Still, while some gloom is bound to creep through the clouds of our armor, especially in these muggy August days, we must remember that nothing decisive has happened yet. Despite Hitler's spectacular victories, if the Nazi leader had utterly smashed the Russian army—as he has been trying to do—the story would be different. Then something decisive would have happened. But so long as the Red fighting machine continues to function as a unit, the Russians aren't beaten by a long way.

**Oil Industry's Blanket Priority Order Extended**  
WASHINGTON (AP)—The War Production Board Thursday extended the oil industry's blanket priority (P-98) order without change until September 15.

The order expired July 31, but producers, distributors and marketers of petroleum products have been obtaining materials under it since that time with tacit WPB consent. The board said a new order which has been in preparation for weeks—probably would be issued by September 15 to supplant the old one.

Officials of the Office of Petroleum Coordinator have disclosed that the order being prepared would probably withdraw from the industry the blanket, automatic assistance in obtaining equipment and materials which the present order permits. Shortages of steel, iron, copper and other materials used by the industry are so critical, it was stated that it will not be possible to continue the blanket priority ratings much longer.

## WAR BULLETINS

Getting In The Scrap

As furnaces are roaring to produce more steel for tanks, planes, and aircraft carriers, Uncle Sam's scrap pile is rapidly diminishing. The need for scrap and more scrap is becoming more and more urgent.

And Uncle Sam isn't the only one who is feeling this shortage. Hitler is also having trouble keeping Axis furnaces fed with scrap. But what a difference between his way and the American way of collecting it. Confiscation of all unused iron and steel in Germany has been ordered by the Fuehrer, with the campaign enforced by uniformed police.

We don't do things that way in this country. The War Production Board is organizing a vast scrap drive on a voluntary basis, and industry, through the American Industries Salvage Committee and other groups, is cooperating to assist the efforts of WPB. No, our industries don't need to have their scrap confiscated. They are eager to help.

A case in point is the "modern, efficient alloy steel plant," as dedicated by the War Production Board recently, which was built of used materials and contains equipment made solely from scrap material.

Cost of the plant is said by the WPB to represent the "lowest capital investment per net ton of output during the emergency." Thus the scrap is now a "monument to American industrial initiative," said the WPB official at dedication ceremonies.

This is just one of many instances of industries that have gone all-out on their own initiative, digging up obsolete machinery, looking in every corner, and even combing the sweepings from factory floors, so that they might show Hitler who is really "in the scrap."

American Bombers Damage Three Axis Ships Near Greece

CAIRO (AP) — America's huge bombers, swooping out of a setting sun, scored great damage on three Axis warships at Pylos (Navarino) on the West Coast of Greece, making two direct hits on one cruiser, setting a second afire and causing an explosion aboard a third, it was announced Thursday.

A terrific explosion also was caused aboard the cruiser on which the two direct hits were made, and black smoke was seen pouring from the second cruiser as a result of either a direct hit or a near miss.

There also was a terrific explosion aboard a third cruiser after a bomb burst next to it.

The raid was delivered in the light of the setting sun on Tuesday.

"Hands Off" Policy In India For U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is following a "hands off" policy in the Indian crisis, and American military forces in India have been ordered to avoid even the appearance of participating in the internal strife touched off there by Mohandas K. Gandhi's "Freedom Now" campaign.

This was made clear in a statement of policy incorporated in orders to the American forces in India and made public by the State Department.

The statement emphasized that the sole purpose of American forces in India is to carry on the war against the Axis.

Pass Bill To Speed Pay To Dependents Of U. S. Servicemen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation permitting the War and Navy Departments to make immediate payments to dependents of servicemen under the recently-enacted allowance and allotment acts was passed by the House and sent to the Senate Thursday.

The original legislation provided that first payments be made November 1, but benefits started to accrue June 1.

Rep. Rankin (D-Miss), sponsor of the amendment, said it was intended to enable the departments "to take care of the needy cases now."

There was no opposition to passage of the bill from among the approximately 30 members present, although previous attempts to consider it had been blocked, and the War Department had expressed opposition.

ment Wednesday conceded the loss of the aircraft carrier Eagle.

Such a convoy might be transporting Allied troops or supplies either to reinforce Britain's imperial armies in Egypt, now stalemated 80 miles west of Alexandria, or via the Middle East to Russia.

U. S. Bombers Attack Ships

U. S. Army heavy bombers struck back with a destructive smash at Axis warships in Pylos (Navarino) harbor, on the West Coast of Greece, it was announced in Cairo.

A communique said the American fliers scored two direct hits on a cruiser, started black smoke boiling from another cruiser, and caused a terrific explosion aboard a third cruiser after a bomb hit next to it.

On the Soviet front, dispatches from Moscow said a mighty new German offensive against Stalingrad appeared to be taking shape as the invaders concentrated vast quantities of men and equipment in the Don River Bend.

Front-line advances said both armies were hurling almost unprecedented numbers of troops into the struggle amid indications that one of the mightiest battles of the war was developing.

Situation Is Acute

The Russians frankly conceded that the situation in the Caucasus, where Hitler's motorized infantry was rapidly overrunning the whole Northern Caucasus, was acute.

Waves of 40 to 60 Nazi dive-bombers were reported raining tons of high-explosives on towns and villages, leaving the once pastoral Caucasus in flames.

"German and Allied troops, despite stubborn enemy resistance, drove the enemy further back in the Caucasus region. One Russian group was cut off and destroyed," Nazi field headquarters said.

Fierce Fighting

"Between the Volga and the Don, the attack of German and Rumanian troops against stubbornly defended positions gained additional ground in fierce fighting."

This apparently referred to the Kotelnikovski sector, 95 miles southwest of Stalingrad, where the Russians reported a sudden intensification of the fighting as the Germans sought to tighten the southern clog of a pincers drive against Stalingrad.

Far to the North, the Germans admitted that Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's armies were battering heavily at Nazi defense works in the Voronezh and Rzhnev sectors, southeast and northwest of Moscow, with the Russians taking the initiative at both points.

In the Western air war, powerful British bomber squadrons — perhaps 250 to 400 strong — pounded the German industrial center of Mainz in the Rhineland for the second night in a row while German raiders bombed the outskirts of London.

British Warships Enter Gibraltar
LONDON (AP) — A Vichy broadcast heard here Thursday quoted Algerian dispatches as saying a British "aircraft carrier of the Glorious class and the aircraft carrier Argus and four destroyers have entered Gibraltar."

down and from three to six others were hit and damaged. Not a single Allied bomber was lost.

Allied airmen went to work on shipping at Rabaul after completing their previous raids this week on the big Japanese airdrome there which undoubtedly had been sending air aid to the Solomons.

Reconnaissance before Thursday's raid showed a spurt in shipping activity in and about Rabaul, which is some 700 miles northwest of Tulagi, a headquarters spokesman said.

Some 2,000 miles west of the Solomons Allied airmen attacked Japanese shipping and base installations in the Dutch Timor-Banda Sea area with undetermined results.

The U. S. Navy communique on the Solomon action said there was substantial evidence that the Japanese since invading the island in January had a base well under way in the Tulagi area.

This presumably was at Tulagi harbor, potentially one of the finest naval base sites in the Southwestern Pacific.

With the hurricane-free, 100-foot deep harbor in Allied hands, it could play a big part in the newly generated offensive to throw the Japanese out of the Southwest Pacific Islands.

In the Papuan peninsula of New Guinea, where quiet prevailed Thursday, it was disclosed that American Aircobras were used as divebombers for the first time in the Southwest Pacific last Sunday during a big-scale Allied raid on Japanese positions at Kokoda, 60 miles across the Owen Stanley Range from Allied-held Port Moresby.

Operations against the Japanese in the Kokoda area began Friday, the same day that American forces challenged the invaders in the Solomons. In the opening skirmish eight Japanese were killed and 15 wounded, and one Australian was wounded.

On Sunday, the Australians made thrusts with three groups of their skirmishers and at least 35 Japanese were killed, many were wounded and many war trophies seized.

Workers Return To Mills In Bombay
BOMBAY (AP) — Rioting and clashes with police kept alive the spark of danger Thursday in several Indian cities but in Bombay, where much of the violence had centered, outbreaks over Mohandas K. Gandhi's do-or-die Indian independence drive grew fewer and smaller.

The situation in Bombay was quiet all morning with no incidents of any kind. Workers were returning to the mills.

A dispatch from Madras said four persons were killed and ten injured at Tenali Wednesday when police fired on a crowd which attacked the railway station and set it on fire.

Armed police and troops were on guard here and elsewhere against new flare-ups.

A four-day lull in announced ship sinkings was broken by the Navy in disclosing the loss of a small Dutch merchantman with a death toll of 23 crewmen in late July when a submarine's torpedo sent her to the bottom off the East Coast of South America.

Only 14 seamen were rescued after the attack which broke the vessel in two and made it the 420th announced wartime merchant victim in the Western Atlantic area, as tabulated by The Associated Press.

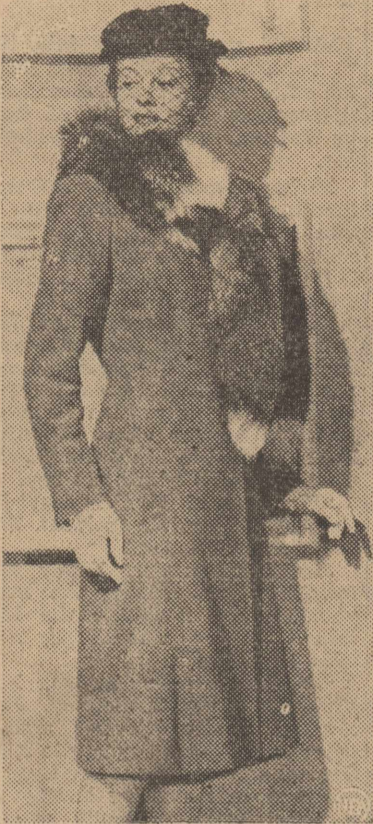

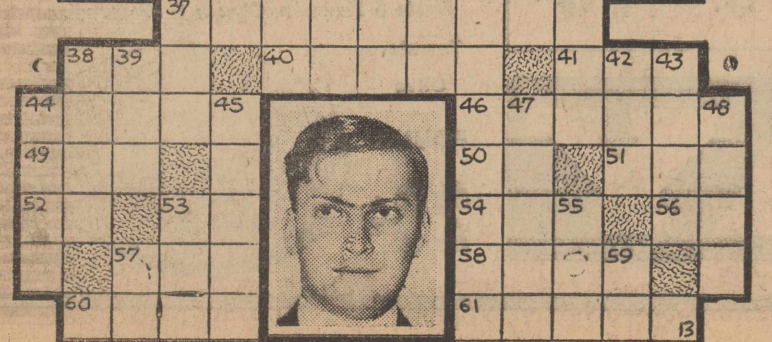

### Manufacturers Favor 8 Per Cent Sales Tax

WASHINGTON (AP)—An 8 per cent sales tax to supplement heavy corporate and individual income tax levies for war purposes was proposed Thursday by J. Cheever Cowdin, spokesman for the National Association of Manufacturers.

The N. A. M. program called for 37,200,000 in revenue in 1943, a sharp increase over pending measures on top of which was suggested consideration of compulsory individual savings.

While urging a sales tax as had the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the NAM said a 5 per cent withholding tax on individual earnings, such as the chamber also proposed, was "impractical and indefensible."

Cowdin, in recommendations prepared for the Senate finance committee, called the revenue bill pending before it "one of the most important single measures ever to come before Congress" and added: "A bad tax bill can lose the war."

### Monahans Air School Plans Are Cancelled

MONAHANS.—Plans for the Las Aero Primary Flying School, scheduled to have started in Monahans August 1, have been cancelled. No definite reason was given, but it is thought that the location might conflict with the proposed Army flying school at Pyote.

Officials of the school, a private flying school to be conducted as a trainer for Army pilots, stated that no further expansion would be approved for the present time.

Jackpot calf ropings also will be held with cowboys of the area invited to enter. Exhibition bronc riding, bulldogging and steer riding by nationally known performers will add color to the stellar attraction.

### Nazis Continue To Organize In U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Dies committee, it was learned authoritatively Thursday, will send to President Roosevelt this week a copy of a confidential letter sent from Germany to trusted Nazi sympathizers in the United States advising them that Walter Kappe had been appointed to head a Fifth Column front in this country and paving the way for his work.

The FBI is seeking Kappe in connection with its investigation of a Nazi sabotage ring and has charged he was associated with six saboteurs executed here last Saturday after a military commission trial.

Signed by Kappe, whom the FBI described as head of "a contemplated German sabotage organization," the letter, bearing the salutation "Hell Hitler," said:

"I have accepted the leadership of the comradeship USA x x x on the grounds that a central office of the comradeship USA must also exist in time of war . . . I depend upon the cooperation of everyone."

In view of the fact Kappe has had more than a year and a half to operate in this country, since the letter was written, the committee was reported to have taken the position that all persons identified with Nazi movements in America should be under constant surveillance.

Along with the letter, it was learned, the committee will send to the White House a list of names of approximately 17,000 persons whose past activities indicated Nazi sympathies.

### Andrews Election Case To Be Heard By Judges

Andrews County election judges were agreed on Wednesday afternoon as a special court to hear the protest of the vote in the county judge's election at the recent Democratic primary, in which Judge C. W. Roberts is contesting some of the ballots cast for H. T. Wilson, the victor in the race.

Klanroth and Hamilton, Midland law firm, are representing Roberts, and will present the evidence at a hearing to be called within a few days by the election board.

### O'Daniel Makes 27 Speeches In Only Three Days

MERKEL (AP) — Three days of speedy campaigning behind him, Senator W. Lee O'Daniel Thursday shortened his schedule from six to five stump speeches for the day.

In three days O'Daniel has delivered 27 speeches over a route of close to or better than 1,000 miles. O'Daniel had heavy stress on the argument he was not an isolationist and on the charge that Allred is grasping at a straw in proposing a farm program including a 25 cent floor under cotton.

While the senator was declaring that Allred was actually setting a ceiling on cotton, because that staple went to 39 cents in the first World War, a voice from the crowd cried out: "What are you going to peg it at?"

The senator ignored the question, if he heard it.

### Loans Available Through FSA For Fall Gardens

Fall gardens, designed to hasten the downfall of the Axis and at the same time add to the home store of food for use during the winter months, are proving more popular than ever before with Midland County farm families working with the Farm Security Administration, according to Miss Jean Bain, home management supervisor.

"Even before the regular gardening season is over," said Miss Bain, "The Farm Security families are making plans and getting ready to produce fall gardens. It is apparent that the supply of store bought foods will be less, and women all over the country are increasing their supply of home produced food. NOW is the time to start fall gardens. Some of the following are suggested for this county: Green beans, Kentucky Wonder or Pintos, carrots, Swiss chard, collards, kale, mustard, Tendergreen or Florida Broad Leaf, parsley, spinach, beets, radishes, black-eyed or cream peas, and Irish potatoes."

It would be a good idea, in case seed are not available later, to set a few carrots, and beets at the side of the garden to go to seed, and to keep some of the other seed you will want next year.

A hundred quart of fruits and vegetables, per person, should be minimum for farm families.

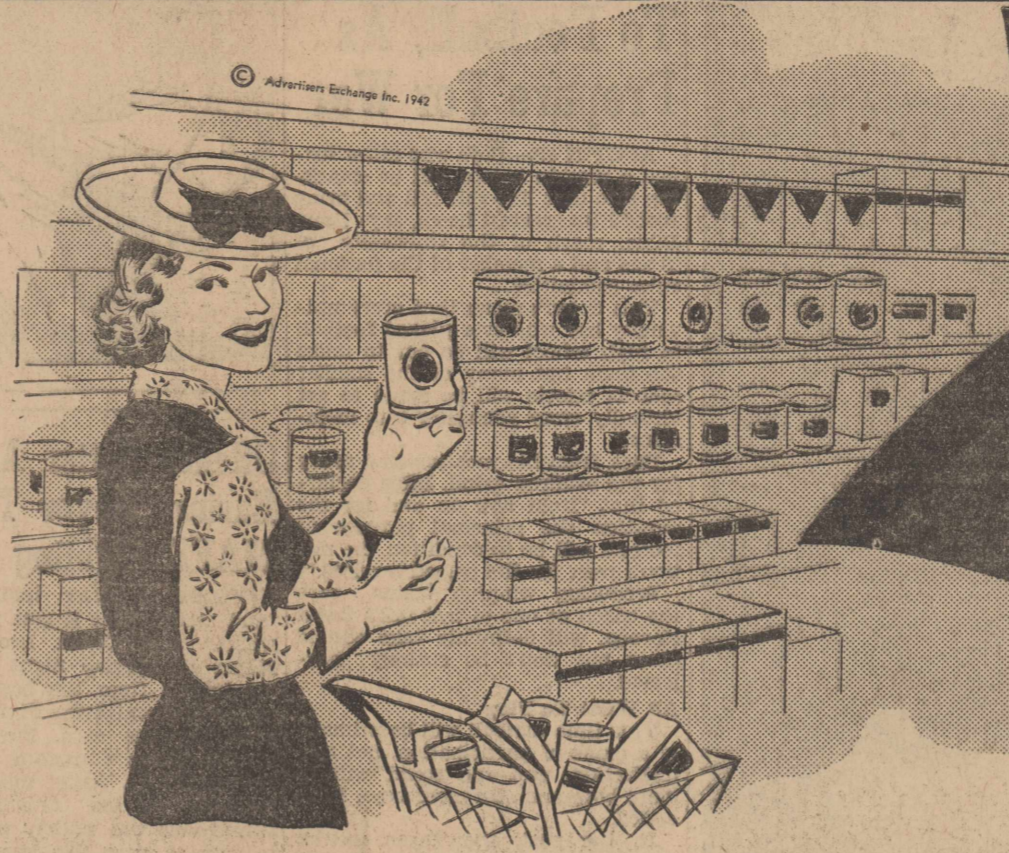
Farm families and part-time families who need funds for the purchase of seed, implements, canning equipment and storage facilities may make application to the Farm Security Administration for a Food or Freedom Loan. These loans were made by the FSA in Midland County last spring but the demand was so great that funds were exhausted before all prospective borrowers could be served. Since July 1, additional funds have been made available and those families who were unable to borrow earlier this year, are expected to have their needs met this summer for fall operations.

Both teams won again Wednesday, and the Boston Red Sox and the Philadelphia Phils discovered what many others already knew about the Yankees and the Dodgers—that is, if they can't beat you one way, they'll beat you another.

At Ebbets Field, the Dodgers went to bat in the ninth inning of a scoreless pitching duel between their ace, Lefty Larry French, and Rube Melton of the Phils. They loaded the bases on two singles and a walk and sent dangerous Dolph Camilli to the plate.

Camilli, however, didn't lay a bat on the ball. He merely waited out a walk which forced the winning run across, giving the Dodgers the verdict, 1-0.

Meanwhile, over in the Bronx, the Yankees went to bat against the Red Sox with the score tied in the last half of the ninth. They also loaded the bases with one away and brought up Charlie (King Kong) Keller.

Keller hits Homer Keller picked out a pitch he liked, slammed it 420 feet into the right-center field bleachers for his 18th homer of the year and presented the Yankees with an 8-4 triumph.

Brooklyn's success provided French with his 12th victory against only one loss, although his four-hitter was matched by Melton, but it didn't keep the St. Louis Cardinals from picking up half a game and reducing the Dodgers' lead to eight lengths.

The Cards downed the Chicago Cubs twice, 9-4 and 8-3. John Beazley registered his 13th pitching victory in the opener and Harry Gumbert pitched eight-hit ball as the Cards coasted through in the afterpiece on 13 blows, one a homer by Enos Slaughter.

The Cincinnati Reds regained third place, with the help of the Boston Braves and the shutout pitching of Johnny Vander Meer.

"Double no-hit" Johnny tossed a three-hitter at the Pittsburgh Pirates in a night contest which the Reds won, 3-0.

Earlier in the day, the Braves knocked the New York Giants loose from their hold on third place by sweeping a doubleheader, 1-0 and 8-2, ending the Giants' five-game winning streak.

All Want To Play This time football will be primarily a game of participation, not specialization, and the trend will be more boys and still more boys, Bible added.

In the past, the Texas mentor pointed out, coaches have molded relatively small groups of boys into units which have functioned with precision and finesse.

"Now this practice is to be sacrificed to herd more students into actual competition in an all-out effort to raise football's contribution to the war effort to maximum efficiency."

"Increasingly boys are discovering that football is more than a great sport—it develops courage and self-reliance and, with the prospect of service in the fighting force, they know synchronization of mind and body demanded by the gridiron may mean in a grimmer game the hair's breadth difference between victory and defeat."

Dutch Meyer Finds Wealth Of Football Among Bombardiers

"Give me 50 bombardiers and I can turn out the nation's top football team."

With these words, Leo R. (Dutch) Meyer, head coach at Texas Christian University, today keynoted a "locker room chat" with the members of the sixth and largest class of "Hell from Heaven Men" to be graduated from the Midland Army Flying School.

Paying tribute to the qualities of teamwork manifested by bombardiers in their rigorous training for positions on Uncle Sams bombardment aviation teams, Coach Meyer declared: "Bombardier training gives men the same values, but in a much broader sense, that they acquire on a football field."

Signatures of every survivor—including those of two women picked up after drifting all night in a lifeboat — are scrawled on the Pimpnel's wardroom walls.

The wardroom, which normally accommodates five officers, once was crowded with fifty persons dragged from the ocean. On the voyage home, the crew lived on hardtack so the survivors could have the best food.

East later made the ace of trumps and that was all. The opening lead was a strategic error often made by inexperienced players. With four trumps, including a stopper, the general plan

should be to try to force the declarer. A short suit lead, playing for a ruff, usually relieves the declarer of much of the trouble that can be caused by a strong adverse trump holding. East's only long side suit has been led by South. Still, the bid was secondary, and North has denied the suit. It is not too much to hope that North can be forced by spade leads. East should stick to principles by opening the five of spades. Dummy wins and probably leads the king of hearts, which East may well duck. Now declarer cashes the ace and king of diamonds and ruffs out the loser. Then he leads the jack of trumps. Whenever East wants to take his ace, he can punch North with spades, and West can punch him with diamonds when he gets in with the club king. Declarer is set one or two tricks.

### Seattle Man Is War Bond Salesman

SEATTLE (P) — Joe Gluck, 59-year-old merchandise broker, has turned his back on his own business for the duration to devote all his time to selling war bonds without salary or commission. He feels it's a privilege.

He has sold more than \$300,000 worth of bonds and has a \$500,000 goal set for Oct. 1. He buys bonds with his own funds and resells them to a regular list of "customers" whose purchases total more than \$21,000 weekly. Gluck himself has pledged to put \$8,000 annually into war bonds.

"I arrange their purchases so that all they have to do is to make out a check," Gluck explained. "The bonds are bought for them in advance and delivered to their offices or front doors—they never have any excuse for putting it off."

### Birth Rate Increases In Australia In 1941

SOMEWHERE IN AUSTRALIA (P)—In the wake of a wartime marriage boom in 1940, Australia's birth rate turned upward last year. S. R. Carver, acting statistician, reported that the commonwealth's birth rate increased from 18.02 to 19.92 per thousand. There were 126,347 births in 1940 and 134,525 in 1941.

Marriages last year totaled 75,145, compared with the record number of 77,889 in 1940, when a top marriage rate of 11.11 per thousand of population was reached.

For the first time in 20 years, Australia's death rate exceeded 10 in a thousand. The death rate in 1941 was 10.17 against 9.75 in 1940. Australia's population had increased from 7,068,689 in 1940 to 7,137,221 at the end of 1941.

### So, She Went On Home Without Seeing Hubby

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (P)—When Private James McNulty's wife took a vacation from New York City and came here to visit her husband stationed with the Army Air Forces technical training command, he could speak to her only by phone for he was confined to quarters awaiting shipment elsewhere. But he promised to write when he reached his destination.

Two days later Mrs. McNulty heard from her husband. He had been sent to a technical school in New York City.

### Ohio Man Owns Only Trained Silver Fox

DOVER, Ohio. (P)—Meet Mitzl, whose owner, Charles H. Raynor, says she's the only trained silver fox in the world. "Mitzl likes to smoke, putting her muzzle against the end of a cigarette butt and inhaling," the former silver fox rancher says. Raynor found day-old Mitzl abandoned by her mother. A cat adopted the fox and Mitzl thrived, but the cat's litter of kittens nearly starved.

Dogs give Mitzl a wide berth and she doesn't take to strangers. Raynor says.

### Compact Furniture? Aye, Aye, Sir!

### Flying Gas Stations, Garages In The Skies, Part Of Navy Plans For Command Of Airway

AKRON, O.—Airplane bases in the clouds and flying gasoline stations may be developed to give the Navy greater striking power in its war on the wing. Lighter-than-aircraft experts envision huge dirigibles, capable of carrying broods of bombing planes, that could be used as sky ports and refueling stations to supplement sea carriers.



Designers here have submitted to the Navy plans for a rigid airship of 10,000,000 cubic feet capacity—nearly half again as large as the Akron and Macon, and about 3,000,000 cubic feet larger than the Hindenburg, German goliath of all dirigibles. All of these ships met disaster.

A "mother" ship of this size would carry 10 attack bombers and would operate in conjunction with other naval units at sea. Its function would be to put its load of planes within range of the objective as speedily as possible. In its speed and maneuverability, the airship has certain advantages over surface carriers, its proponents argue.

Captain C. E. Rosendahl, Navy dirigible expert, two years ago said the airship could travel "much farther than any airplane, must faster than any surface vessel." "A surface cruiser is generally capable of about three days' sustained speed of 30 knots," he commented at that time. "Carrying 10,000,000 cubic feet airship at a cruising speed of 50 knots, or 60 land miles per hour, could cruise non-stop for 10,000 miles."

This speed would enable the airship to deliver its planes near the objective in about half the time required by a surface carrier and permit it to get away with greater ease. The airship fears neither mines nor torpedoes and has no business to get within gun range. It can be attacked by planes, but is protected by its own planes, and its gun installations.

The airship's vulnerable area is only about one-fifth its total, according to Captain Rosendahl. The use of non-inflammable helium gas reduces the hazard of fire from incendiary bullets. The loss of a gas cell reduces the ship's buoyancy but does not, down it, and bullet holes may be repaired during flight. The principle of launching and recovering planes from a sky base first was tested nearly a decade ago with the ships Akron and Macon. Each carried floating hangars inside the hull with space for five fighting planes. A trapeze arrangement released and picked up the planes through a T-shaped opening in the airship's bottom.

Gas Station, Too These operations were performed more than 3,000 times—by day and by night, in smooth weather and rough—by naval personnel. Carrying large supplies of gasoline and oil, the mother ship also served as a refueling point. Construction of giant dirigibles was halted in this country after the 1933 destruction of the Akron in an Atlantic Coast storm and the crash of the Macon in the Pacific two years later. In recent years the Navy's use of lighter-than-aircraft has been limited chiefly to blimps for coastal patrol.

### Easier Than Turning Streetcar Around

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (P)—Riders on a Memphis street car saw a look of consternation come over the face of the motorman as a black cat strolled across the tracks ahead. The motorman brought the car to a stop, turned his cap around backward, and then proceeded.

### RUNS SPECIAL CAR FOR MATERNITY CASES

PORTLAND, Ore. (P)—A woman passenger told the bus driver the stork was about to arrive. The bus driver hailed a passing motorist. "Put her in here," the motorist obliged. "I'm on my way to the maternity hospital with another passenger right now."

### Now We All Can Be Like The Fireflies

NEW YORK — The surgeon now can light up your body with an internal glow, the better to see certain important facts about where to operate. The glow is produced by fluorescein, a common drug, which fluoresces under ultra violet light. Drs. Kurt Lange and Linn J. Body of New York Medical College describe the drug.

In some major operations around the abdomen it is necessary to remove tissues which have lost too much of their blood supply. But they appear no different than healthy tissues around them. The surgeon injects some fluorescein into a vein and in a few seconds, usually much less than half a minute, the color shows up all through the body, carried by the circulating blood. But it does not appear in the diseased area, and lack of fluorescent glow tells the surgeon what he wants to know. The glow is yellow-green. It is not ordinarily visible, but shows up under the rays of an ordinary ultra violet lamp.

The drug is also used to find out how long the blood takes to circulate throughout a human body. In normal adults this is 15 to 20 seconds. In some heart cases the time may run to a minute or longer.

### Tour With Dobbin And Be Up-To-Date

BALTIMORE (P)—Tip to tourists: You'll make out fine in Baltimore traffic with a horse and buggy. After a motorist complained that traffic lights were synchronized for a horse and buggy, the Baltimore Evening Sun hired a horse (Mr. Chips), a buggy, and sent a liveryman and reporter out to investigate.

Jogging along at 6 miles an hour, Mr. Chips ambled up and down three main thoroughfares, stopping for nary a light. Automobiles whisked by him, but Mr. Chips often pulled abreast at the next traffic light. Despite Mr. Chips, police insisted the lights were synchronized for a brisk 18-miles per hour.

LONDON (P)—You'd think paint would be essential to an artist but John C. Ward, a demobilized worker, proves it is not. An exhibitor at the Civil Defense Artists Exhibition, his painting is done with soot, old tea-leaves and other household waste.

### Women Help Win Battle Of Weeds

WASHINGTON (P)—An army of men, women and children—at times 3,000 strong—has won the "battle of weeds" in the Department of Agriculture's emergency rubber production project in Salinas Valley, Calif. More than 40 per cent of the weedeers were women from nearby communities who answered the call for help when it looked as though weeds might win out over the newly-planted guayule seedlings.

They have completed the chore of weeding 890 miles of four-foot-wide nursery beds planted last spring. These 530 acres of seedlings, which represent the only substantial supply of guayule planting stock in the Western Hemisphere, will provide stock for field planting of some 50,000 acres of guayule next winter.

### Real Blitz Planned On Foxes, Badgers

LONDON (P)—It seems impossible in this heavily-populated island but 12 miles from Charing Cross foxes and badgers are pests that kill chickens and young lambs by the score. So the home guard organized a hunt in the woods at Selston and Sanderstead. They shot many of the pests but still the depredations went on.

Now another shoot has been organized at which the home guard will have the help of regular troops, ARP wardens and firemen. Surrey County officers are going to help by gassing any of the foxes and badgers that escape into their holes.

### Bogota Traffic Cops Really Bring 'Em In

BOGOTA, Colombia (P)—When the Bogota traffic cop gives out a ticket, he doesn't worry whether the automobile driver will appear in court that corresponds to traffic court. One package cola-flavored gelatin, 1-2 cups hot water, 1-2 cup canned pineapple juice, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1 cup grated raw carrots, 1-2 cup sliced celery, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup diced canned pineapple. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add pineapple juice and vinegar. Chill until slightly thickened. Season carrots and celery with salt; add pineapple. Fold into slightly thickened gelatin. Turn into large mold of individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. Serve with mayonnaise or French dressing. Evaporated milk costs less and can be used in many recipes call-

ing for cream. This fruit moussé proves the point deliciously.

### Peach Mousse (Makes 2 Quarts)

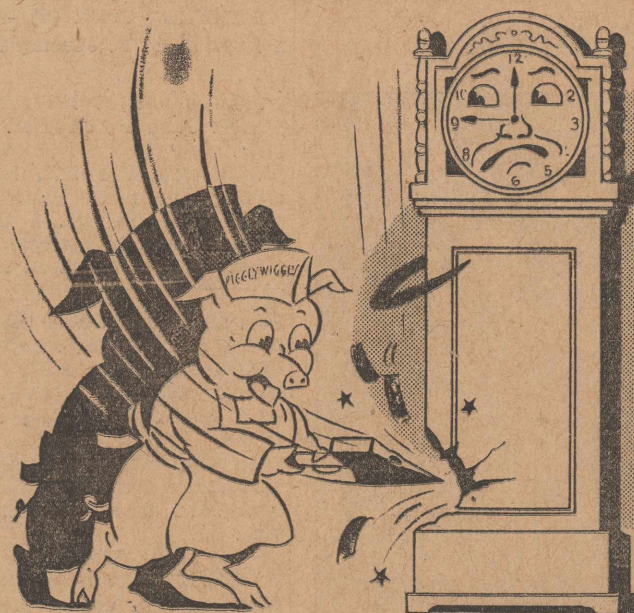

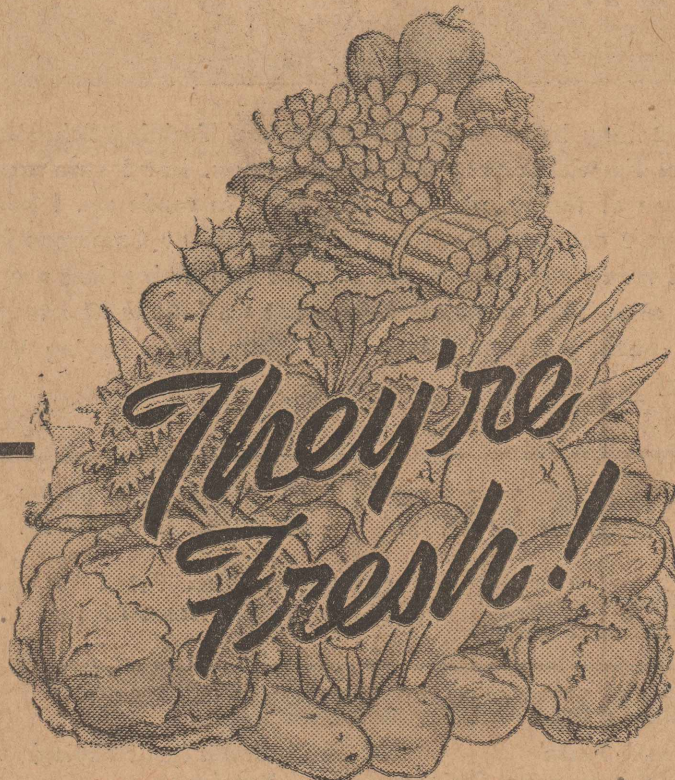
