Allies Swarming Nazi Rail, Factory Centers, Divert Drive On Reds

The Russians stoutly held their lines before Stalingrad Saturday night and made new gains in their own offensive at Rzhev while their Allies were striking massive air blows on the German home front and keeping the treacherous Japanese busy in case they were contemplating a stab at the Soviet back.

The Red Army was counter-attacking on the Volga plains and stalling every German attempt to break through to the great industrial city and water artery. The Nazi speed in the Caucasus toward the Grozny oil fields and the Black Sea ports was slowed.

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Too Many Strikes

The National Association of Manufacturers has made a study of "strikes since Pearl Harbor," covering the first six months of 1942.

During that period the association learned of 21 consequential walkouts, involving from as few as 119 employes up to as many as 12,392. Most were short-lived. They cost, in six months, 7,176,344 man-hours, which is the equivalent of 3588 man-years.

That does not bulk very large in our man-power economy. It represents a minute decimal of 1 per cent of the men engaged in war work.

But we feel, with Mrs. Elinore Herrick, New York regional director of the National Labor Relations Board and one of the truest friends organized labor ever had, that "one strike in a defense plant is one too many, even though it may have been provoked by the employer.

We also agree with the National Association of Manufacturers that "the percentage of workers involved in strikes is not important. Where the strikes occurred is important. One-ten thousandth of 1 per cent of all workers might paralyze the production of planes or tanks, if they struck.'

Moreover, the figures compiled by the National Association of Manufacturers are not truly representative of the seriousness of the labor situation today. They have to do solely with strikes, and most labor disturbances which are delaying war production are not, formally

Today's hand proved a good study in the question of when to exit. After taking the opening lead, East studied the dummy and decided that a shift to diamonds was too risky. Instead he led a second heart, both as an exit and to increase his chances of making a trump trick. Declarer ruffed in dummy, led a low trump to the ace, ruffed out his third heart, led dummy's last trump to the king,



Opening- 3. and then led another trump to force out East's good nine-spot.

East exited with the fourth heart, which South ruffed. A club finesse went to the king and East led a diamond. But this was one exit too many. Declarer took his ace, cashed the last trump and West was squeezed in the minor

The first heart exit by East was a fine play, the second was indif-ferent, but the final exit was a bad mistake. As East is defenseless now in clubs and diamonds, the stage is all set for a squeeze unless West has the ace of diamonds. De-clarer's bid and play certainly in-dicate that he has this ace. East must return a club, forcing dummy in the lead prematurely, so that South cannot lead his last trump.
