Japs Prepare For Big Scale Attack

Russia's 'Back Door' Is Likely Objective For New Jap Thrust

A mysterious slump in Japanese aerial strength in the Southwest Pacific, coupled with the continued withdraw al of enemy invasion armies in China, renewed speculation Thursday that Japan was preparing to spring a big-scale attack elsewhere in the Pacific.

Russia's "back door" in Siberia, India and even the United States have been cited as likely objectives for a new Japanese offensive.

The apparent withdrawal or diminishing of Japanese air power in the Southwest Pacific was reflected in a communique from Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters reporting that Allied fliers were unchallenged by enemy planes in attacks on two big Japanese bases.

tions of war against Germany, the agreements specify and formalize the principles and procedures covering aid to the Armed Forces of the United States by the other parties to the agreements on the same terms as those under which the United States supplies lend-lease aid to them.

Such reciprocal aid already has been furnished to the United States also by the other signatories without conclusion of formal agreements and, a State Department commen-tary points out, "This aid is rapidly increasing in importance as the intensity of the American war effort increases in the various theaters of

All of the agreements emphasize that the general principle govern-ing mutual aid is that the war production and war resources of each of the signatories should be used in ways most effectively utilizing the available materials, manpower production facilities and shipping

CAIRO, Egypt.—Cautious probing by Marshal Erwin Rommel's African Corps has encountered a fury in air attack, artillery fire and harassment by mobile forces, and four days after the British expected an Axis offensive the showdown battle for the Nile had failed to develop.

Britain's desert armies lashed out at Axis forces massed in the southern sector of the 35-mile El Alamein front, 80 miles west of Alexandria, countering the offensive.



Soldiers Behave

It now develops beyond any doubts that this new U. S Army is good—and by "good" in this case is meant wellbehaved, disciplined, law and order abiding. This fact comes out through studies of the Army's court martial record as compiled by the Judge Advocate General's De-

Principal cause of this apparent improvement in behavior comes from the Army's new ideas on how to administer military justice to the men in service who do occasionally break over the traces.

Today the Army doesn't have the old idea that every time a soldier breaks one of the Articles of War, which is the military code of laws, the offender should be haled before a court martial, tried and given appropriate sentence as provided for in the table of maximum punishments in the Manual of Courts Martial. There is a punishment tailored to fit every crime in this tabulation, from death for sleeping on post in time of war or desertion in the face of the enemy, down to minor offenses which call for forfeiture of pay, confinement to quarters or a few days in the guard house.

A short time before the defense Army began to be built up, the Army brass hats came to the sensible decision that in order to give maximum training to every soldier, the only kind of a guard house which did the Army any good was an empty guard house, and furthermore it was silly to take up the time of a lot of officers conducting courts martial.

Instead of preferring formal charges and bringing soldiers before a military court on all petty offenses, commanding officers now award administrative punishment such as a reprimand or extra duty unless the soldier demands trial by court martial. 

Air Power To Be Given Full Test In Drive On Nazi

CINCINNATI (A) - The United States plans to make a full test of a "good fling at bringing Germany to her knees by concentrated use of air power," Assistant Secretary of War John J. McCloy says, but he adds 'hat it still must rely on ground troops to win the war.

McCloy, in an address prepared

for delivery before the Veterans of Foreign Wars encampment here, related how United States planes already "are fighting effectively all facts" about the quality of American war planes.

He reported that Army fliers had shot down 234 Japanese planes since Feb. 1 while losing 109 of their own craft, not including planes lost on the ground, by anti-aircraft fire, nor the 218 Jap craft destroyed by the American Voluntter Group. Tells Of Raids

Telling his audience that Americans should "feel more encouraged" about new and improved United States warplanes soon to be in action, McCloy emphasized the work of flying fortress planes over Europe-"they have been in all important daylight missions x x and thus far all planes hove come back." Many persons, McCloy says, call for a "shortcut to victory." That, he continued, cannot be readily found. Despite the damage done by aircraft, McClay says, "the great achievements have not been the bombing of London, Tokyo, or Ber-lin, but the march through France

Texas Farmers Boost Income Sixty Percent

AUSTIN.(A)-Texas farmers pocketed \$334,342,000 for the first seven months of this year, boosting their income more than 60 per cent above last year, the Univ-versity of Texas Bureau of Busi-ness Research has reported.

The Bureau's July index of Agricultural cash income rose to 148.4, a gain of 48.4 per cent over the July average for the period 1928-32. This margin of gain was not as spectacular as the June index of





Mix together cheese, milk, 3/4 teapoon salt and the dry mustard. Cook over boiling water until cheese melts and mixture is smooth, stirring frequently. Add beans. Keep warm. Turn on oven and set at moderate (375° F.). Toast bread slices on one side. Put in shallow baking pan, toasted side up. Cut tomatoes into 1/2 inch slices. Arrange tomato slices on toasted bread.
