# Huge Nazi Army Bogs Down French Island Is Hard Hit Hitler Issues Order To Seize Stalingrad

# **Key Ports On** Coast Are Taken

The Associated Pres British sea-borne forces were officially reported to have captured three key ports on French Madagascar Friday, and French dispatches said British motorized colums were now advancing on Tananarive, inland capital of the 1,000 mile long island.

Landing at dawn Thursday, under the protective guns of 18 warships, the British quickly seized the west coast towns of Akbanja, Majunga and Morondava, Prime Minister Churchill announced in London. Ambanja lies 120 miles southwes of the big Diego Suarez naval base at the northern end of the island, which the British captured last May. Majunga is 200 miles farther down the ccast, and Morondava an-other 370 miles south.
