Soviet Armies Yield Ground

Nazis Hammer Wedge Into Western Line Stalingrad Defenses

Russia's armies yielded fresh ground at the bloody western gates of Stalingrad Wednesday, but after 24 hours there was still no confirmation of a Nazi claim that German shock troops were fighting in the city's streets and had captured the main Stalingrad railway station.

"At heavy cost, the Germans advanced slightly," Soviet headquarters said in a mid-day communique.

Elsewhere on the slowly contracting defense arc, the Russians were declared to be holding firmly against an avalanche of battle-stained Nazi veterans and reserves.

A Berlin broadcast asserted that German troops had penetrated deeper into "the interior" of Stalingrad, but gave no details. DNE, the German news agency, reported "bitter street fighting against enemy nests of resistance" within the city.

German field headquarters reported merely that "considerable additional ground was gained in embittered struggles" around the Volga industrial center, and said the Russians were attacking in force at Rzhev and Vovronezh.

Stalingrad shrouded in smoke. Voronezh, on the upper Don River, lies about halfway between Stalingrad and Moscow. Rzhev is a key German bastion 135 miles northwest of Moscow.

Battlefront dispatches to Red Star, the Soviet army newspaper, said the Germans had lost 3,000 troops when they attempted to capture a hospital in one outlying section of Stalingrad.

Red Star said tempestuous Nazi assaults west of the city hammered wedges into Soviet defenses, but declared that in most of these salients the Russians counter-attacked and drove the Germans out.

Stalingrad itself was shrouded in smoke from fires, but its railroads were reported operating on a 24-hour basis despite incessant aerial attacks.

Ration Plan Big Question At Oil Meet

AUSTIN. (AP) — Concerned over proposed nationwide gasoline rationing, Texas oil operators convene Thursday for a state proration hearing to canvass the petroleum outlook for October and to consider a plan to fix allowables on a lease or production unit basis.

With current production running in excess of 1,400,000 barrels daily, nominations submitted to the Railroad Commission will reflect whether the industry foresees war demands sufficient to maintain the production quotas of the last few months or whether a period of readjustment involving sharply reduced state allowables must accompany rationing.

State officials predicted that the threat of universal gasoline rationing would exert a bearish effect on October nominations, hastening the trend toward substantially increased allowables for fields producing crude needed in the processing of war materials and toward corresponding decreases for fields producing crude types suitable only for domestic uses.

Some Fields To Suffer
Transition of the industry from a peacetime to a wartime basis was reflected in the September oil order which concentrated production in fields producing crude adaptable for war purposes while reducing the allowable in fields lacking transportation to outlets or confronted with shrinking domestic markets.

That the commission and the producers would condemn proposed gasoline rationing was considered certain.

Commissioners Ernest C. Thompson, C. L. Culbertson and Beauford Jester repeatedly have lashed at universal rationing. At the August proration hearing Culbertson asserted that "proposed gasoline rationing is the most serious problem confronting the oil industry in the Southwest."

Fuel Oil Rationing Is Ordered For Area

WASHINGTON. (AP)—Fuel oil rationing—possibly 25 per cent below normal use—has been ordered in a vast 30-state area for the coming heating season.

In addition to the 17 Atlantic seaboard states in which gasoline already is rationed, supplies of oil will be curtailed in these 13 Midwestern states:

Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota and Kentucky.

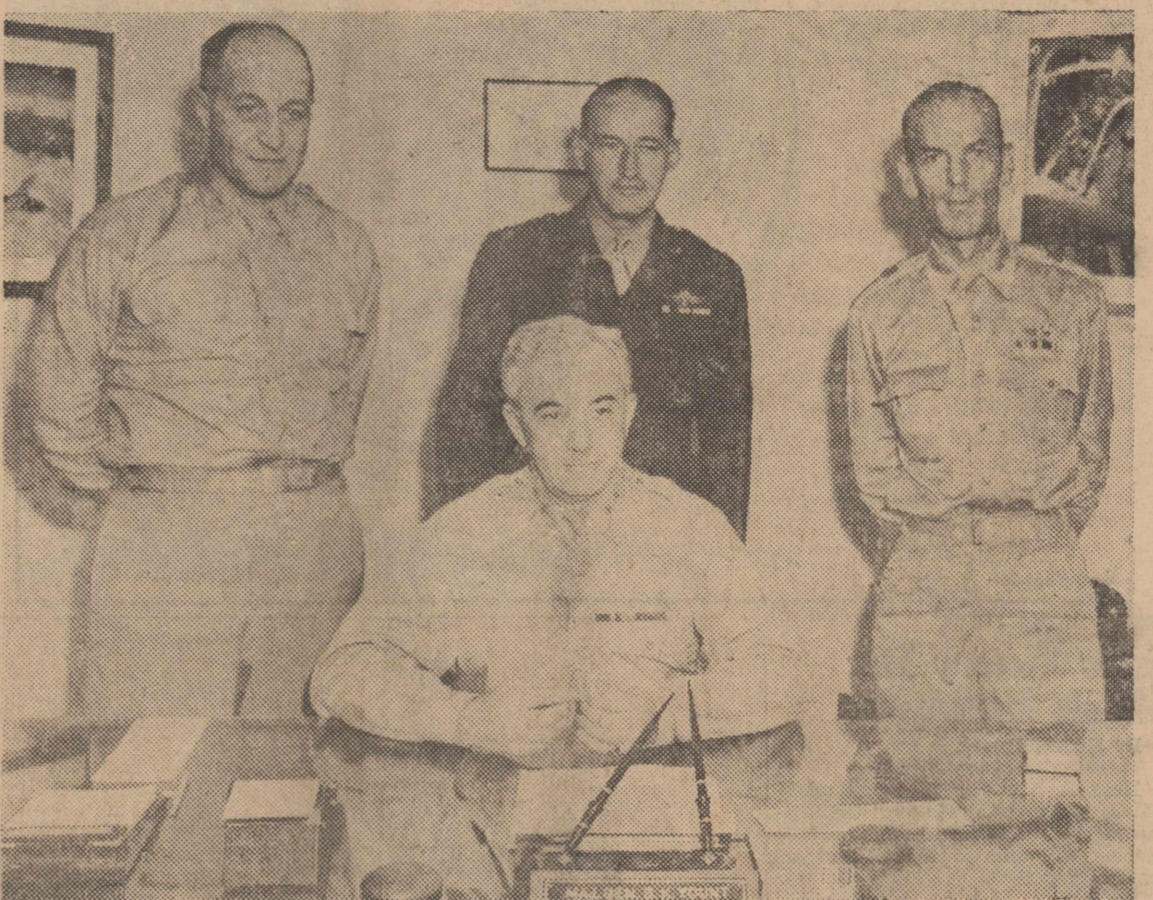
T&P FREIGHT TRAIN IS DERAILLED AT WEATHERFORD

Union Pacific President Steps In Swinging As Nation's Rubber Czar

WASHINGTON. (AP) — William M. "Bill" Jeffers, bald, stocky, office boy to president of the Union Pacific Railroad, stepped in swinging Wednesday as the nation's new rubber czar.

"I am already at work," the 66 year old railroad declared Tuesday night, as Production Chief Donald M. Nelson announced Jeffers had been picked for what Nelson called "one of the toughest" jobs in the war program.

Charged with reorganizing, consolidating and administering the government's efforts to alleviate the rubber shortage, Jeffers is expected to become, in effect, complete boss over the Rubber Reserve Company and all other government agencies in matters affecting the rubber program.

Will Take Quick Action
"I am placing Mr. Jeffers in this post with the approval of the President," Nelson declared, "and I am delegating to him all my authority. From this point on, any problem connected with rubber is a matter for Mr. Jeffers' decision, and I know he will do this job."

Indicating he intended to use the authority given him, Jeffers declared he would do "whatever is necessary to carry out the assignment."

"We do not need talk—we need action," he said.

Blunt, outspoken and energetic, Jeffers was regarded here as a choice obviously dictated by Nelson. (Continued on page two)

Maloney Tells Bombardiers That Germany Will Have To Be Defeated On Home Ground

Germany has two million crack troops who have not yet been seen upon any battlefield. The morale of the German people has never been higher than it is now, and Germany will not surrender until she is defeated completely upon her own ground.

These opinions on conditions inside Europe were voiced to the officers and men of Midland Army Flying School by John W. Maloney, of Washington, special lecturer for the War Department. He delivered two lectures Tuesday at the Bombardier College.

Maloney, who left Germany only two weeks before Pearl Harbor after serving with the State Department and the International Red Cross, told the bombardier officers and men that there is currently no chance of a revolt by Germans against Hitler.

Jap Drive On India, Russia Thought Near

Japan hinted boldly at a possible invasion of Russian Siberia or India Wednesday, while elsewhere in the Far Pacific and Indian Ocean theaters of war the surrender of French Madagascar to the British appeared imminent and U. S. Marines battled a major new Japanese attack in the Solomon Islands.

A Tokyo broadcast, picked up by the BBC, quoted Gen. Shunroku Hata, Japan's commander in chief in China, as declaring that "the East Asia war is about to take an important step in cooperation with the European war."

The broadcast said Hata added: "Asia in cooperation with Europe is about to take simultaneous action toward realization of a new world order."

For weeks past, high Chinese officials have declared repeatedly that Japan was preparing to attack Siberia—probably timed to coincide with a Nazi victory at Stalingrad.

Japs Moved To Border
More than 500,000 Japanese troops, many of them withdrawn from the campaign in China, were reported in Manchukuo on the Siberian frontier.

Last week Chinese reports said Russia had rejected "certain suggestions" made by Tokyo, and observers at that time said it was likely Japan had made strong demands on the USSR for control of Russia's Pacific maritime provinces.

With these provinces under her control, guarding against a flank attack, Japan might consider herself in a position to launch a major offensive against the Aleutian Islands, Alaska and even the Western United States.

India May Be Aim
Military analysts did not overlook the possibility, too, that any new campaign by Japan's far-flung invasion armies might be directed against troubled India.

With British troops rapidly overrunning Madagascar, in the Western Indian Ocean, Japan might feel impelled to gamble on an invasion of India to protect the fringes of her "co-prosperity sphere" in East Asia.

As the Far Pacific theater boiled with new activity, American Ma-

Grand Scale Drive To Recapture Islands Is Developing With Fury

WASHINGTON. (AP) — Japan's expected grand-scale drive to recapture the Solomon Islands and again point a dagger at the Australian lifeline appeared developing with do or die fury Wednesday.

Battle-tired American forces were fighting back savagely and thus far successfully.

The Navy reported Tuesday night that "heavy fighting" had been in progress by land, sea and air since Saturday night and that while details were lacking "reports received to date indicate that the Marines are maintaining their positions."

Creation of a new air command for the United States Pacific Fleet and a shift in command of the Southwest Pacific Allied Air Forces indicated a tightening of grand strategy.

The changes in command gave weight to Admiral Chester W. Nimitz's warning: "Do not for one minute assume that we have the Japanese on the run."

Japs Not Whipped Yet
In decorating 25 officers and men at Pearl Harbor Tuesday the commander-in-chief of the Pacific Fleet declared the Japanese were "dangerous antagonists," but he added "they have learned by now that we also are dangerous antagonists who are willing and know how to fight."

Despite counterattacks on Japanese bases to the north and northwest of the main American stronghold on Guadalcanal Island, the Navy reported the enemy was bringing pressure to bear with apparently increasing force, and had succeeded in landing small detachments of troops who tried vainly to recapture the Japanese-built airfield under cover of shelling by surface craft offshore.

While his bombers sought to distract possible supporting moves by attacking enemy shipping and supply bases over a wide area from New Britain to the Tanbar Islands, but 300 miles north of Darwin, General Douglas MacArthur announced (Continued on page seven)

Primary Returns From Five States Show Few Upsets

Returns from primaries in five states disclosed Wednesday relatively few upsets with most incumbents winning party renomination including Senator Henry Cabot Lodge (R-Mass) and apparently Republican Governor Julius P. Heil of Wisconsin.

Tuesdays balloting which virtually completed the nation's primary voting also gave Homer Ferguson of Detroit the Republican senatorial nomination over Gerald K. Smith, former lieutenant of the late Huey Long and an advocate of "fires for all."

The Massachusetts Democratic primaries brought victory to U. S. Rep. Joseph E. Casey and Mayor Roger L. Putnam of Springfield for the senatorial and gubernatorial nominations.

Former Governor James M. Curley, one of the bay state's most colorful political figures, staged a comeback after four straight political setbacks to capture the Democratic congressional nomination in the 11th district.

On the Republican side, Governor Leverett Saltonstall was unopposed for renomination.

The unofficial returns gave Ferguson a lead of nearly two to one over Smith in Michigan's senatorial contest with a third candidate, Elton R. Eaton, Plymouth weekly newspaper publisher, far in the rear. In the Nov. 3 election, the winner will face U. S. Senator Prentiss M. Brown who was renominated. (Continued on page two)

Navy Reveals Aircraft Carrier Yorktown Lost At Midway With Very Few Casualties

WASHINGTON. (AP)—The Navy announced Wednesday that the United States aircraft carrier Yorktown had been sunk after the Battle of Midway as a result of Japanese bombs and torpedo attacks.

Loss of the 19,900-ton carrier, with very few casualties, had been a well-kept naval secret.

The department said that destruction of the ship apparently was not known to the enemy and that the knowledge was vitally linked to the operations which have been in progress in the South Pacific since early August.

First Attack
The Yorktown first was successfully attacked by enemy aircraft with bombs and torpedoes on the afternoon of June 4, after the Battle of Midway Island—a great American victory—had reached its full fury.

The vessel, which had a normal complement of 85 planes and 2,072 men and was only five years old, (Continued on page 7)

If we were inclined to bet on hunches, it wouldn't be a bad idea to wager a few coins that the Anglo-American assault on Nazi Marshal Rommel's supply base at the port of Tobruk was the forerunner of the anxiously and not altogether patiently awaited Allied offensive to liquidate the Axis threat against Egypt.

I'm sufficiently phobic to be able to suggest that Britain's new middle east commander, General Alexander, a fighting Irishman of great capabilities and hard-boiled characteristics—is maneuvering in preparation for a house-cleaning. Certainly we can at least say that this destructive operation by sea, air and

Commando forces was a heartening exhibition of initiative in the very midst of the enemy camp.

Ready For Action
This means that the British Eighth Army, which is drawn up opposite Rommel's forces in the narrow confines between the Mediterranean and the great Qattara depression in the flaming desert, has passed from the stage of back-to-the-wall defense to aggressive initiative. Alexander is flexing his muscles.

Of course it doesn't necessarily follow that the British intend to launch a drive within the next twenty-four hours. It wouldn't be surprising to see it come before long, however. General H. S. (Continued on page 2)

LONDON (AP)—A new British landing on Madagascar has caused the surrender of remaining French forces in one northwest coast area, the British East Africa Command announced Wednesday.

ANKARA (AP)—A Turkish newspaper said Wednesday Vice Admiral Naokuni Nomura and Rear Admiral Katsuo Abe, Chiefs of the Japanese Coordinating Committees in Berlin and Rome, would arrive in Turkey Thursday.

LONDON (AP)—A British convoy in the Atlantic has been under heavy attack by German U-boats, an authoritative source said Wednesday, but no indication of the Allied losses was given.

The German High Command has claimed the sinking of 19 ships from a convoy.

BERLIN (From German Broadcast) (AP)—The Berlin radio broadcast Wednesday the following Transocean Agency Dispatch, datelined Vichy: "French quarters deny the correctness of British reports apropos the surrender of Madagascar."

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — President Getulio Vargas ordered general mobilization Wednesday throughout Brazil.

It is fortunate that Wendell Willkie took a trip to Egypt. Thus we, the American public, were able to learn that more than a third of General Rommel's first-line tanks were knocked out in the recent fighting. Apparently it was a real offensive which the Anglo-American forces stopped, and not a mere raid in force.

There were many first line reporters in Egypt, competent, alert, intelligent, aggressive, competitively eager. Yet it remained for Willkie to break this news to the home front. Two possibilities are apparent. One is that Willkie has betrayed secrets of value to the Axis by telling this news. That we doubt, first because of Willkie's common sense, and second because of the character of the report itself. The other is that an incompetent censorship prevented press men from sending this news, but had no control over Willkie.

Hard-Boiled Does It

Robert E. Harvey, Denver's liaison agent with the growing Colorado military establishment, recently gave a little demonstration of one way to handle a slowdown.

Some 49 truckdrivers employed on a new runway at Lowry Field, the Air Force's important technical school, became disgruntled and started driving at from two to five miles an hour. (There wasn't a strike).

Harvey demanded that all automobile tires issued to the slowdowners be recalled, on the ground that they had been obtained for war production purposes only, and that the men's names be removed from all lists for future war jobs. The slowdown ended—fast.

arranging the exchange of Finnish and Russian prisoners, and later were stationed in the Balkans, Holland, Belgium and Occupied and Vichy France.

"The Germans have confiscated virtually every property of any value in all the occupied countries," Maloney declared, "and use the most arbitrary methods to oust rightful owners from homes, farms and industrial establishments coveted by members of the Nazi Party."

"The Germans in occupied nations have no laws to govern them except their own desires," he pointed out. "Whenever they want something, they simply tell the gestapo, a truck backs up to the place in question, and the owners are given a few minutes to leave."

In the seizure of factories, Nazis take a gestapo agent along with them and tell the owner that he will accept a given sum of money—usually in occupation marks which are worthless outside Germany.

Goering Getting Richer
Field Marshal Herman Goering is the Nazi who has profited most from seizure of conquered property, Maloney stated.

As head of the vast Herman Goering Werks which includes steel, chemical, dye, munitions, airplane and other factories, Goering is now the possessor of the greatest industrial holdings in the world, greater even than those of Henry Ford," he said.

Maloney devoted a considerable part of his talk to an outline of methods of sabotage employed by citizens of occupied countries. Despite the fact that the Nazis will take food cards away from anyone who does not collaborate, vast underground movements have been organized against the day the United Nations begin their anticipated invasion, he said.

Allies Must Plan Well

"But when we do start, we've got to make sure that our invasion sticks," he warned. "Otherwise, the Nazis will show no hesitancy whatever about mowing down all the thousands of men, women and children who turn out to help our men."

He estimated that at least 500,000 Poles have been slaughtered outright by the Nazis. These include most of the leaders of the conquered nation, clergymen, educators, engineers, professional men and others who might be capable of stimulating revolt. Hospitals are barred to Poles, he said, and conditions of nutrition and sanitation "are beyond description."

More than 5,000,000 men of occupied countries have been made victims of the Nazi system of slavery, Maloney said.

Describes Slavery

"When they say slavery, they mean slavery, he emphasized, quoting a speech made by Walter Darré, Hitler's minister of agriculture, in which the Nazi official stated plainly that the Germans had evolved a streamlined method of slavery under which non-Germans are forced to perform all menial field and factory chores at little or no wages.

"The Germans sincerely believe that because they are Germans, they have a God-given right to do what they please with other people," he said. "They have become so obsessed with their power that they have now even decreed that all sows must litter at least eight piglets per season. They are ser-

Talks Over Rubber Funds
If the recommendations of the President's Rubber Committee, headed by Bernard M. Baruch, are carried out in full, Jeffers will take over control of funds for the program, thus far handled by the Federal Loan Agency.

Among other things to carry out the Baruch Committee proposals, Jeffers must work out a 100,000-ton increase in butadiene output, to come into production in six months; build facilities for production of 100,000,000 gallons of alcohol for use in the synthetic rubber program; boost synthetic production to the point where it will be possible to relax restrictions somewhat on civilian driving; and increase the total annual output of bunas all-purpose rubber from 705,000 to 845,000 tons.

How Victory Tax Would Hit Doakes

Here is how the proposed additional 5 per cent "victory" tax, approved by the Senate Finance Committee, will work if the tax becomes official for 1943.

On Jan. 1, 1943, Joe Doakes' employer would deduct 5 per cent from his weekly pay check, over and above his exemption of \$12 a week. Saying that Doakes made \$50 a week, the employer would calculate 5 per cent on \$38. That comes out \$1.90 per week.

At the end of the year, Doakes' boss would have escrowed \$98.80 as advance payment on Joe's victory tax liability. This is calculated thus: Doakes' annual salary is \$2600, and his victory tax exemption is \$624, or 52 times \$12. His victory tax would thus be 5 per cent of the balance of \$1976, or exactly \$98.80.

No Worry For Doakes
But Doakes doesn't have to worry about that \$98.80, since it has been paid more or less painlessly from his weekly wages. And he's really banking money. For instance:

If Joe is a bachelor, he is entitled to a 25 per cent refund, or \$24.70, after the war. If he's married, he gets a 40 per cent return, or \$39.52.

However, if Joe is a thrifty soul, and buys war bonds or makes payments on previously contracted mortgages, life insurance or back debts during 1943, he can take all or part of his post-war credit off the bat without waiting for the war to end.

well, British military expert, remarks with customary reserve:

"Morale is high and the soldiers of the desert army are thinking in terms of attack."
Well, soldiers don't think in terms of attack without good reason. The indications are that the British are either set for action or rapidly nearing preparedness. It's no secret that they have been receiving reinforcements and supplies.

Cleanup Is Needed.

With the fighting in the Caucasus in such a critical state, it's vital that the British break off the Libyan claw to the pincers which Hitler is trying to close about the whole Middle East. It can't be over-emphasized that Egypt is the key-stone of Britain's control of the Eastern Mediterranean, and that the loss of that country might spell Allied disaster.

This being the case, it's vastly encouraging to see the Allies demonstrate the strength and assurance necessary for an attack against the strongly defended port of Tobruk, which lies on a coast that is held by the Axis for many miles east of the base. The British warships had to run their noses up against the enemy artillery, and land-based airplanes.

Now Alexander wasn't compelled to carry out such an expedition. That is, it wasn't by any means an act of despair in which a commander takes terrific risks. Undoubtedly the British leader flourished on carrying out further destruction in this badly-bombed stronghold, but it looks very much as though his main purpose was to conduct a big scale action of reconnaissance. And the idea of that likely would be to prepare for further major operations.

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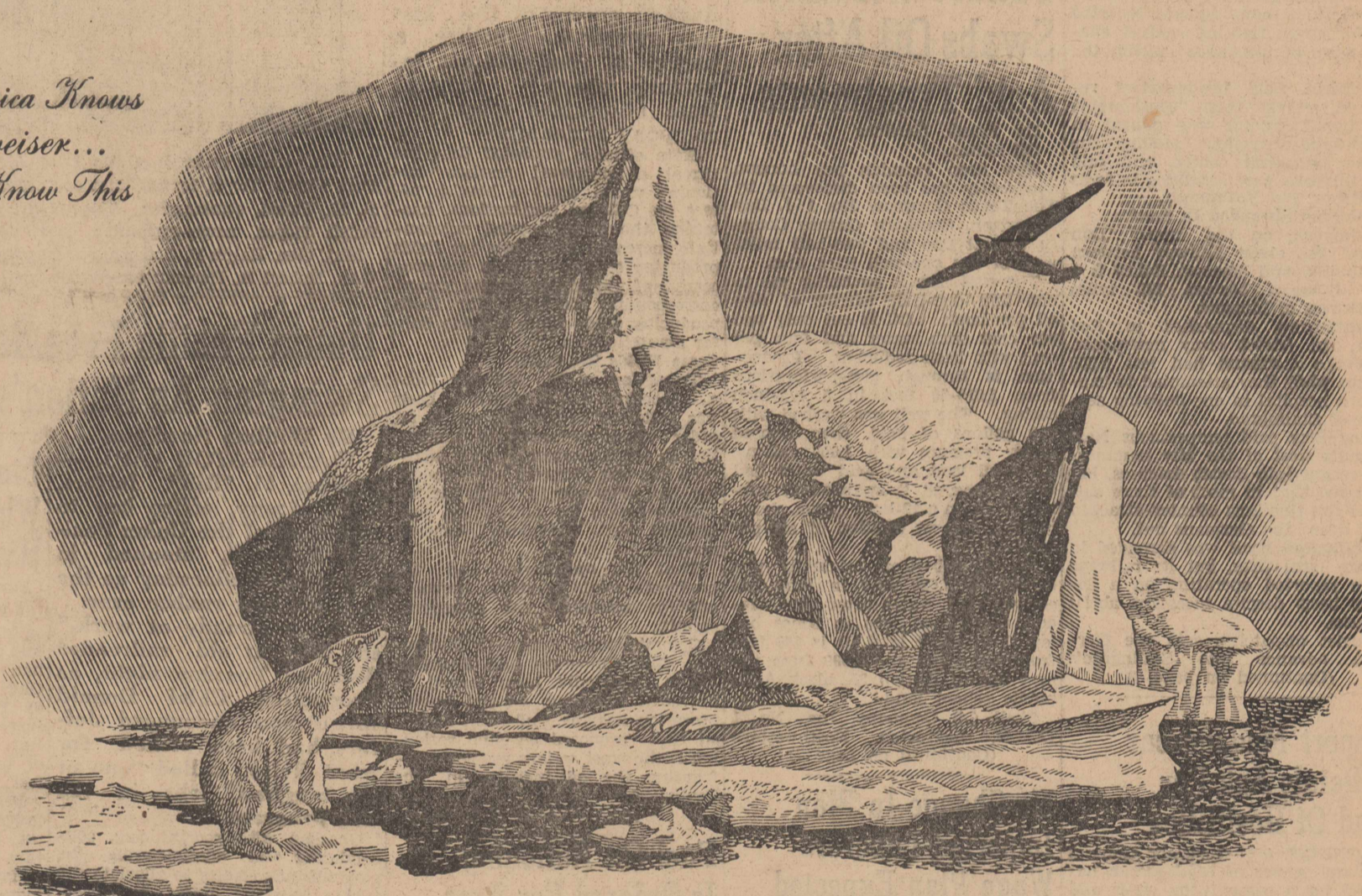

Navy Seeks To Step Up Daily Average September Recruits

Five Midland men have joined the Navy since September 1, it has been announced by the Dallas office, which states that an average of about 120 men per day are being enlisted in the district.

"We are handling more men per day than ever before," said Lieutenant L. R. Rideout, Jr., officer in charge, "and we are deeply grateful for this response by men both skilled and unskilled."

"However, to attain the month's goal of 3,000 men we need exactly 190 men per day, average, and that means that we must step up our efforts a bit. With the help of every patriotic American we can do that."

"In view of current predictions that men with children may be called for service with the armed forces by 1943, the only logical reaction for any family man is to investigate immediately opportunities offered by the Navy before it's too late to choose the branch of service he wishes to enter."

Opportunities to enter the Seabees, overseas construction regiments, are also open for cooks, clerks, sheet metal workers, wharf builders and others.

Give Civil Service Power To Transfer Government Workers

WASHINGTON. (AP)—Power to transfer any of the nation's 2,300,000 federal workers from one agency to another whenever it would bring "a more effective contribution to the war program" will be granted the Civil Service Commission beginning Sept. 27.

The directive, issued Monday by Manpower Chairman Paul V. McNutt, authorizes the commission to act without the consent of an employer or his superior.

The commission also may direct the transfer of a government employee from an agency to a private war industry job "whenever the commission finds that the employee is qualified to perform work in a critical occupation" and provided the employee consents.

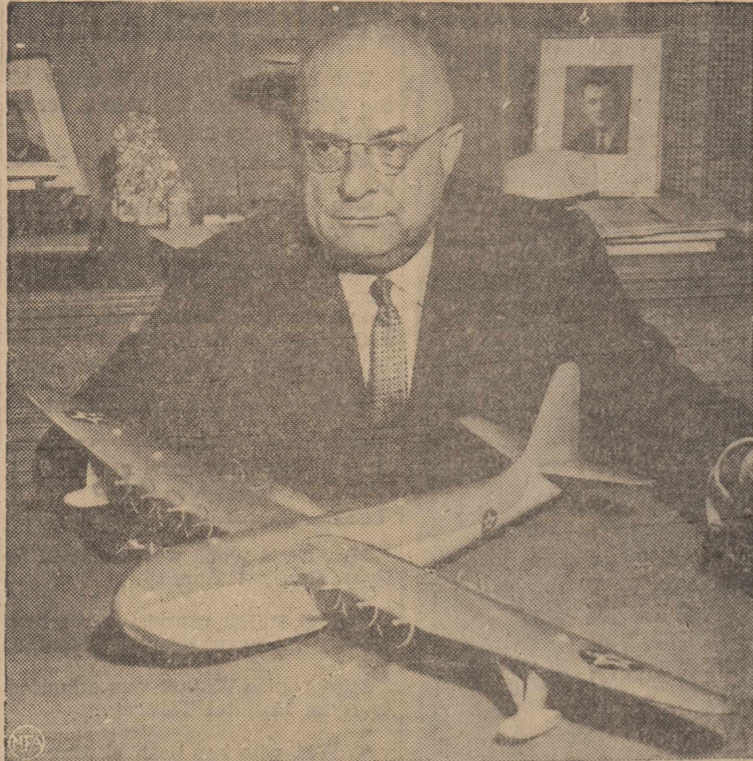

Aviation Cadets Apply At Midland

Young men of West Texas and especially in the Permian Basin near the Midland Army Flying School, between the ages of 18 and 26 years inclusive, who want to become bombardiers, pilots or navigators in the Army Air Forces, now can apply at the bombardier college, Lieut. Phillip A. Perkins, recorder for the cadet examining board, announced.

The Midland Army Flying School is one of 55 units in the Eighth Corps Area where aviation cadet examining boards are located.

Lieutenant Perkins pointed out three ways qualified young men can enlist for aviation cadet training: 1.—enlist as privates in the Army Air Corps (unassigned) and serve there until their turns come for cadet training; 2.—enlist in the Air Corps enlisted reserve and wait until they are ordered to report for aviation cadet training; 3.—college men (and high school seniors about to enter college), age 18-26 years inclusive, may enlist in the Air Corps enlisted reserve and continue their schooling, provided they maintain satisfactory scholastic records. Upon graduation or withdrawal from college, men in this category will be assigned to active duty at training centers as facilities become available.

Each applicant must appear in person before an aviation cadet examining board. At the Midland Army Flying School, the board consists of Lieutenant Perkins, recorder, and Lieut. Col. John K. Brown, president, and Lieut. Col. John D. Ryan, Capt. Paul Rankin, and Lieut. Raymond A. Fitzlar.

Candidates for commissions as ground officers in the Army Air Forces also may apply at Midland Army Flying School. College engineering is required.

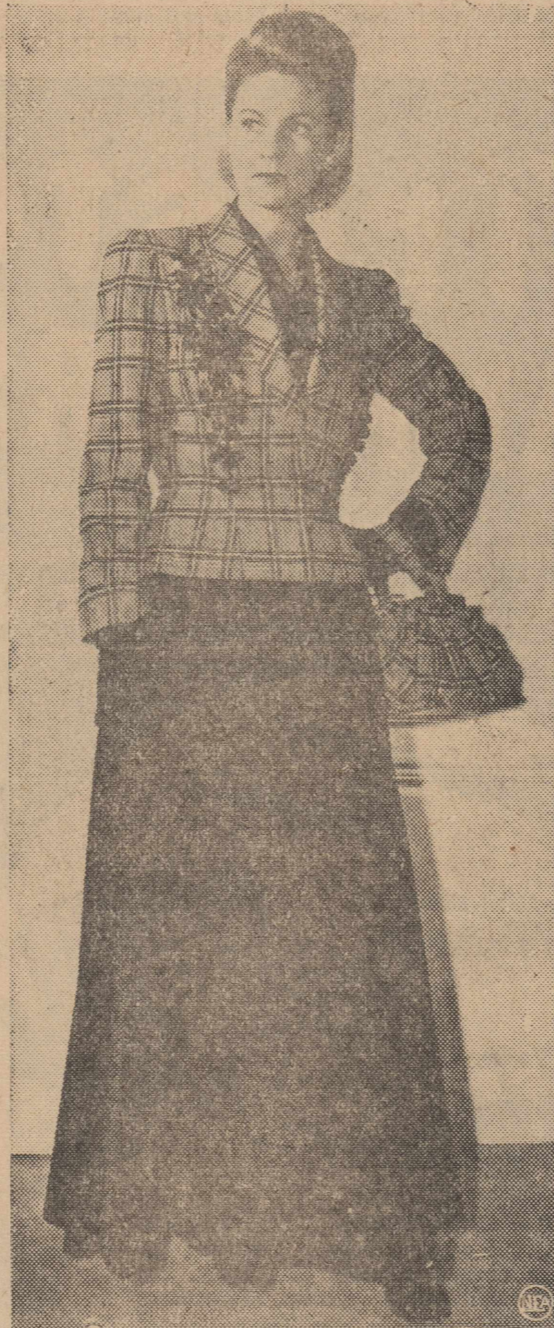

This was because the fiercely fought series in Philadelphia took so much out of the Cardinals that they appear groggy even though

they dragged down a 2-2 victory over the phils in 14 innings with the veteran St. Johnson hurling all the way for the losers.

The Dodgers have now had time to relax before taking on the Pittsburgh Pirates Wednesday and Thursday at Ebbets Field. If they are able to snap out of their five-game losing streak with a strong front against the Pirates, then the layoff will have proved beneficial.

Besides the Cardinals' contest the only other major league game Wednesday brought together the Boston Red Sox and Chicago White Sox in the American League, but weather halted play in the fourth inning, forcing cancellation of the game. Chicago was leading 4-3 at the time.
