

MOSCOW (AP) - German and Russian infantrymen battled in the attics and cellars of a northwestern section of Stalingrad Thursday after the gates of the city finally had been opened to the invaders by massed tanks.

Bombs rained down without a letup upon the defending army-made up of soldiers, Red marines and armed civilans—and buildings within the smoking city on the elbow of the Volga as waves of Nazi divebombers hurled themselves into the assault.

to combat labor shortages. Wendell Lund, director of War Production Board's labor division, reported government agencies were preparing a decision "on the largest and most efficient possible by those who are left outside the Armed Forces."

"Until that decision is made, twin dangers face the nation's war effort," he said in a statement submitted to the House committee on defense migration. War Production Chief Donald Nelson also was scheduled to appear before the com-



Canada Puts All Citizens To Work In War Program

By James Montagnes.
OTTAWA. — Everybody in Canada must now work, except the very old, the very young and the disabled.

A severe manpower shortage brought job freezing and strict man power and woman power employment regulations aimed to provide "the largest armed forces possible, the optimum of war production, the minimum of civilian services, and the minimum of agricultural production in keeping with the needs of Canada and of Britain," according to Labor Minister Humphrey Mitchell. Little Idle Labor.

There is little idle labor left in the Dominion. Only 80,000 men between 16 and 69 or not employed, and about one quarter of this number are unemployable Few of the remainder can be used in war work.

More than 250,000 persons are to be added to the fighting services and war industries before the end of the year. All men have been registered and complete control is now exercised over labor to place workers in jobs essential to the war effort.

All Women Registered

Service reguations affect practically all Canadians, exceptions being women domestic servants, provincial government employees, fishermen, hunters and trappers, teachers, nurses and probationers, and students.

Defense Records

WASHINGTON — Without fear of contradiction from the Army, Navy or war industries, it may be said flatly that the Civil Air Patrol is hanging up the most remarkable record of any of the civilian de-

fense groups.

There now are nearly 59,000 volunteers in the CAP; probably close to 15,000 planes; perhaps 30,000 nilots and almost an equal number of mechanics, radio engineers, and sundry office and air base ground workers. 
present parity estimates.

Wages would be considered in the future under a farm bloc stabilization bill by Rep. Steagall (D-Ala) which comes up for a hearing before a House committee Wednesday. Then beat in corn syrup gradually. Beat in eggs vigorously. Add flour mixture alternately with 3 tablespoons milk. Beat until smooth after each addition. Begin and end with flour mixture. Divide batter into 3 equal portions. Drop one portion by teaspoons onto greased baking sheet, leaving a 2-inch space between each. Bake in moderate oven (375°F) on oven shelf slightly above center 12 minutes, or until brown. Mix cinnamon into second portion of batter, then bake as directed above. Mix into third portion of batter the remaining 1 tablespoon milk, the cocos, and the remaining 2 tablespoons corn syrup. Bake as directed above. The 3 portions make about 4 dozen. Plain cookies may be garnished with checolate decorettes and cinnamon cookies garnished with halved raisins before baking if desired. 
