West Coast Pipeline Is Suggested

AUSTIN (AP)—Pointing to the October permissive as reflecting continued increasing demands on Texas for crude and petroleum prosucts, Chairman Ernest O. Thompson of the Texas Railroad Commission predicted that West Texas and New Mexico could look for relief from their depressed market outlets to California.

By re-laying one of the three West Texas-Gulf Coast oil pipelines to the Pacific Coast, Thompson declared Monday, Texas can help break the oil transportation bottleneck and meet a deficiency in California's petroleum requirements.

Citing figures from the Office of the Petroleum Coordinator stating that California's production was running about 50,000 barrels a week under OPC recommendations. Thompson declared that Texas alone could bridge the gap between Pacific Coast production and war-
