New Test In Middle East Coming Up

Armored Tanks Set For Crucial Battle; Unabated Air Attacks

CAIRO (AP)—The next phase of the new battle for North Africa was shaping up Wednesday in the widening gaps of the Axis desert defense line as Britain's army of the Nile and Field Marshal Rommel's invaders rolled on increasing weight of tanks into the first clashes of an expected crucial test of armored power.

A British communique which reported "further progress" Monday night and unabated attacks on the German-Italian line throughout Tuesday said the British came out on top in the first main test of armor.

"Tuesday," it declared, "an armored clash on a larger scale than hitherto developed. After considerable fighting the enemy was driven off with considerable loss. Our own losses in tanks were light. Fighting continues."

Dispatches from the front indicated Axis tank losses already had been considerable, although it was clear that by far the main mass of Rommel's tanks still were poised back of the battlefield, where they have been under continued bombing and strafing by United States and British bomber squadrons.

Prisoners who streamed back along the British supply lines said they had been under a deadly battering by the Allied artillery barrage which has been thundering since the outset of the British push.

In London, Lord Croft, parliamentary secretary for war, said the British Eighth Army had made "good progress in the north, the seaward flank of the El Alamein line, where three objectives allotted to them mostly were gained and held."

Commission; OPC Agree On Selectives

AUSTIN (AP)—The agreement between the office of Petroleum Coordinator and the Texas Railroad Commission discontinuing the federal agency's monthly requests for selective crude types from selective fields was seen here Wednesday as a significant step toward maintaining an adequate reserve of crude in Texas for a prolonged war.

"Texas' production of essential crudes henceforth will be determined by the availability of crudes available to war purposes and by available transportation facilities," one expert who asked not to be quoted by name asserted.

Shift Production
Heretofore the OPC in certifying its monthly recommendations for Texas specified an overall production figure which included specific recommendations for certain fields producing vital war crudes. At recent oil proration hearings producers have suggested that key fields were being depleted under heavy war-stimulated production requested in OPC directives. The new agreement will permit shifting of production from fields with low reserve levels to other fields producing crude grades which meet war specifications.

Commissioner Beauford H. Jester of the state oil regulatory agency announced the agreement Tuesday upon returning from conferences with officials in Washington. The agreement as outlined by Jester will permit the commission to (Continued on Page 5)

Crabb, Byerley And Shipley Will Ration Gasoline Here

Members of the gasoline rationing panel of Midland County's War Price and Rationing Board were named Wednesday.

R. C. Crabb, a member of the rationing board, has been appointed chairman of the gasoline rationing panel. Other members of the panel are L. G. Byerley and John Shipley. The panel will be under the control of the rationing board and is making plans to ration gasoline properly and efficiently according to Federal rules and regulations.

Registration for mileage rationing in the county will be conducted November 12, 13 and 14. Crabb said actual rationing will begin November 22.

Get Applications Soon
Applications for rationing blanks are expected within a few days and will be available at the following service tire inspection stations:

- Broadway Garage,
- Fulton Tire Company,
- Low's Service Station,
- Ever-Ready Auto Service,
- Firestone Auto Supply and Service Store.

Motor car owners will fill out the blanks at the station and then register at the schools. Commercial vehicles will be registered with the Office of Defense Transportation, but owners of passenger cars must file applications to the gasoline rationing panel through the regular channels.


Don't Waste Blanks
Car owners were cautioned Wednesday not to waste application blanks as the board received notice of a shortage.

Which schools will be designated as registration points had not been decided Wednesday. Crabb doesn't believe it will be necessary to use all school buildings here for the work.

"We have been advised that Washington expects to have the application blanks available by November 7," Crabb said, "but everyone should watch this newspaper for our announcement when these application forms are available. We will see that they are distributed at service tire inspection stations where every passenger car owner can obtain an application form conveniently."

Salaries Frozen For The Duration

WASHINGTON (AP)—That joyous cry "I just got a raise," probably will be heard much less frequently during the wartime emergency due to new federal regulation of all wage and salary increases.

Under rules announced Tuesday the captains of industry and the lowliest wage earners both become subject to control—and even salary or wage decreases must be justified in certain cases.

In cases where salaries were less than \$5,000 a year on October 3, no decrease may be made by the employer below the highest salary paid between January 1, 1942, and September 15, 1942, "unless to correct gross inequities or to aid in the effective prosecution of the war" except with government approval. In cases where salaries exceeded \$5,000 a year on October 3 any cut must be justified to the government if it reduces the level below \$5,000.

WLB Enforcement
The regulations issued by Economic Director James F. Byrnes and approved by President Roosevelt generally limit public and private salaries, except those fixed by statute, to a top net of \$25,000 a year with no changes to be made in general. (Continued on page 6)

Bureau Of Mines Is Testing Oil From West Texas

The Bureau of Mines is testing samples of oil from a number of West Texas fields, possibly with a view to employing Permian Basin crude in synthetic rubber manufacture and as special fuels and lubricants.

The District 8 office of the oil and gas division of the Texas Railroad Commission, headed by S. Ross Carr, deputy supervisor at Midland, is cooperating with the federal government by gathering the oil samples and shipping them to the Bureau of Mines testing laboratories at Bartlesville, Okla.

Carr said one-gallon samples are being sent of oil discovered in each new field. The office here recently has shipped special samples of crude (Continued on page five)

Reds Smash At Germans Near The Black Sea

MOSCOW (AP)—Red army defenders of the cliff-sided mountain road to the Black Sea port of Tuapse have turned the tables on the Nazi in the Western Caucasus with a smashing counter-assault which forced the Germans into a retreat that started several days ago, battlefield dispatches reported Wednesday.

In Stalingrad, a German onslaught renewed at deadly cost gained the invaders two more debris-littered streets, but the main Russian lines held, and northwest of the besieged city the Red Army's relief offensive bit menacingly deeper into the German flank across the sodden steppes.

Giant Slugging Match For Control Of Seas And Solomon Airport

WASHINGTON (AP)—American and Japanese warships boiled through the Southwest Pacific in a titanic slugging match for control of the bomb-scarred Guadalcanal airfield Wednesday while on the island itself land forces were locked in mortal combat.

Latest reports from the battle zone showed action was continuing at a furious pace over a wide area and both President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Navy Knox said the results were not yet clear.

Two Japanese destroyers have been sunk, Tuesday night's Navy communique reported, one enemy battleship has been hit, a cruiser badly damaged and a destroyer hurt.

In the epic battle on the north shore of Guadalcanal, Japanese forces broke through the American south flank during the night of Oct. 25-26, but were thrown back by Army troops who regained their temporarily lost positions.

Sink Two Jap Destroyers
On the west flank, held by Marines against a smashing series of attacks that have been under way since last Friday, the Navy reported the enemy was forced to give ground in "heavy fighting."

At the Americans' backs was the prized airfield, built by the Japanese and captured by the Marines last August, from which United States bombers have been able to hammer at enemy shipping for miles around. In Japanese hands, the field could be used as a springboard for an offensive against Australia.

Tuesday night's communique told of Navy and Marine Corps dive bombers, apparently dispatched from this same field, flying to the aid of two United States minesweepers which were set upon by three enemy destroyers. Two of the destroyers were sunk.

Another enemy destroyer brought a pack of Grumman "Wildcats" from the Guadalcanal field down on it after it sank the U. S. Fleet tug Seminole and a small harbor patrol boat near the island of Tulagi, about 13 miles north of the field.

Jap Carrier Hit
During the night of Oct. 26-27, Navy Consolidated "Catalinas" renewed an attack on an enemy force 400 miles northeast of Guadalcanal. They succeeded in putting a torpedo into an enemy plane carrier and scoring two hits on a cruiser before heavy antiaircraft fire, which damaged one of the attacking planes, drove them off.

President Roosevelt, declining to predict the outcome of the struggle, pointed to a headline in the Washington Evening Star at his press conference Tuesday and indicated that it told the story accurately. The headline was: "Battle rages in Solomons," but the President added he did not know whether he would use the adjective "decisive."

Steel Allocated For Completion Of Largest Oil Line


WASHINGTON (AP)—Some easement for the Eastern petroleum emergency was assured for the future as an official of the Petroleum Coordination Office said the War Production Board had allocated the necessary steel for completion of the world's largest oil pipeline system from Texas to the Philadelphia-New York area.

The 850-mile extension, from Norris City, Ill., to the Philadelphia-New York area, would cost approximately \$60,000,000, said the spokesman, who declined to be quoted, and would be completed next spring or summer.

The 530-mile first link of the huge war product, from Texas to Norris City, Ill., is expected to be completed in December, and will move 300,000 barrels of petroleum daily for transshipment by rail, barge and truck on to the Eastern shortage area.

Construction of the Eastward extension would establish a direct pipeline delivery of the 300,000 barrels daily to the Bayonne, N. J., refining area, the OPC official said. WPB was reported to have granted priorities on 224,000 tons of steel for the extension.

The Fighting Fronts in the Southeast Pacific



Bombs and battle have spotlighted a half dozen southeast Pacific areas, with Guadalcanal the principal center of fighting. Japs, probably operating from the Caroline Islands, have sent strong reinforcements to their bases in New Guinea and the Solomon Islands to continue the fight against Australian and U. S. forces. Meanwhile allied bombers have blasted nearby Jap bases.

WAR BULLETINS

CAIRO (AP)—United States fighter pilots bagged seven of the 18 Axis planes shot down Tuesday over North African battle area, for their best score since the start of the new Allied offensive in Egypt.

MOSCOW (AP)—German shock troops were reported Wednesday to have moved up along two streets of embattled Stalingrad at a cost of heavy losses, while large-scale infantry and tank assaults were repulsed elsewhere in the city.

STOCKHOLM (AP)—A doctors' bulletin on the condition of King Christian X of Denmark, seriously ill from pneumonia after a fall from his horse ten days ago, said he was resting well Wednesday after two blood transfusions given during the night.

All Mixed Up

The morning news columns quoted Draft Director Hershey telling a Senate committee that married men with dependent children probably would be called into the Army during the final quarter of 1943. This was after Chief of Staff Marshall had announced that the 1943 goal is an Army of 7,500,000 instead of the 10 to 13 millions previously mentioned.

The afternoon news columns quoted General Hershey as having revised his estimate on the basis of overnight study, deciding that married men with children will not have to be called in 1943—and might not be called in 1944 provided the Army remains at around 7,500,000.

Both estimates presupposed that Congress would authorize the conscription of 18- and 19-year olds.

General Hershey is doing such a good administrative job with the draft that it seems to bad to pick flaws. But this was only one recent instance of the general's tendency to say publicly things which later would have to be corrected.

The draft is one governmental activity which comes distressingly close to individuals and families. It takes sons from their parents, brothers from their sisters, men from their sweethearts, husbands from their wives, and ultimately it may take fathers from their children. Many never will come back alive. More will return maimed in body and broken in mind and soul.

Above all things the draft is the last in which the people should be troubled by conflicting, confused, inadequately considered "information" from governmental sources.

In fact, General Hershey is merely administrator of the draft. He did not make the law. He will not amend the law. He does not decide how many men to call up at any given time.

But when General Hershey, director of the draft, speaks publicly people do not remember those qualifications. His words carry much weight. Therefore they should be considered with the greatest of care.

General Hershey originally suggested that married men with dependent children would be called in the final quarter of next year, at a time when he supposed the Army would continue building rapidly until it had at least 10 million men.

When this was cut by 25 per cent, common sense would have suggested a reevaluation of the situation, indicating that the drafting of men with multiple dependents would not come soon.

There has been too much loose talk about important matters. The public is all mixed up, and with good cause.

Pennies Are Made Of Copper

Copper is probably our most critical metal. It is so vital that the Mint has curtailed the coining of one-cent pieces by half. But business activity is making the available supply inadequate. Therefore Mrs. Nellie Tayloe Ross, director of the Mint, appeals for the unfreezing of millions of pennies now stuck away in American homes.

If every American family would release 10 pennies, this would make available as much copper as one-third of the 1941 record production.

The ideal would be investment of these hoarded coppers in War Stamps. Alternatives would be their conversion into less rare coins, or, where there are enough, into paper money; or their deposit in savings accounts.



Peacetime Luxury Yacht Converted To Merchantman Convoy Ship Escort

ABOARD A U. S. NAVY ESCORT VESSEL.—When they drew plans for this ship, they never thought she'd wind up as a naval escort for merchant convoys along the Eastern Sea Frontier.

She was built as a yacht, for pleasure cruising in summer and placid southern waters in winter. Only her lines are yacht-like now as she rides gently at anchor off an East Coast port, ready to join the vessels that today will guard a northbound convoy.

Skipper Checks Course
In her once-luxurious cabin, now the wardroom for the handful of young reserve officers who fight her, her skipper is studying the briefing of today's run. It's still hours before dawn. All is quiet save for the monotonous, rhythmic breathing of the never-silent blowers that force fresh air into the ship's innards.

The captain checks the zig-zag course of the channel through the anchorage's protecting mine fields. Mine sweepers have already brushed this channel, scouring it for possible drifter mines.

The skipper climbs to the bridge. Engines snap to life, and we start slowly for the rendezvous.

The merchant ships burst out of the gray mist like a movie fade-in—diaphanous and ghost-like at first, they suddenly materialize. They take on a multitude of shapes: sleek, new U. S. "Liberty ships"; sturdy old freighters; veteran merchantmen.

Blimp Protects Route
The escort vessels, in addition to U. S. Navy craft, include sea-scoured British trawlers and tiny U. S. Coast Guard vessels which fan out to become specks bobbing on the horizon.

Then, with all ships in position, we take our place—well forward

ing over the convoy and then peeling off to box the compass around it; Army bombers, flashing along the crests of the sea; small Civil Air Patrol planes, taking their turns with the service veterans.

Plenty Of Popcorn For Hallowe'en Means Plenty Of Fun

This Hallowe'en, Hitler and Hirohito are the spooks haunting the homes of all Americans.

Blame them for your having to stay home more. Blame them for not being able to make candy at home—or buy gum and candy at stores. But blame yourself if you don't have a good time on Hallowe'en, even with Axispooks on the loose, because Hallowe'en at home can be made more exciting with well-planned ideas, some apples and pumpkins; above all, plenty of pop corn.

Of course, just piling up a package or two of pop corn in paper or cellophane bags or cardboard cartons won't do the trick. You must have pop corn that really pops, and that's the kind that comes in perfect popping condition in airtight cans.

Imagine what a let-down you'd get if all the pop corn fizzled and went P-ftt—just when you were expecting some merry excitement.

Pop corn, you see, provides action as well as food. Salted, sugared, made into balls, as fudge—oh, in dozens of ways, pop corn can be King of your Hallowe'en festivities. So have a plentiful supply on hand—for this Hallowe'en. It makes inexpensive fun and is a welcome confection to revelers of any age.

Here are a few recipes for pop corn dainties which are quite appropriate for any party. Pick the ones that appeal to you most, and pop into the Hallowe'en party headlines with Pop Corn.

Orange Cream Pop Corn Balls
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup cream
1/3 cup orange juice
1 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
2 quarts popped Jolly Time Pop Corn

Combine the sugar, cream and orange juice and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until the sugar is dissolved. Increase the heat and cook to 290 degrees F. or until a hard ball forms when a little of the mixture is dropped in cold water. Remove from heat and add butter and orange rind. Pour slowly over Jolly Time Pop Corn, stirring and turning the corn so that it is evenly coated. Shape into balls and wrap in cellophane or waxed paper.

Garlic Pop Corn
Good served with hot soups, especially cream soups. Melt butter and let a clove or two of garlic simmer in the butter while it is frothing up. Take out garlic before buttering corn.

For something different, when melting butter or margarine or heating salad oil to pour over hot popped corn, try adding a little peanut butter. Blend with melted fat, then pour over popped corn. Add salt to taste.

Pop Corn Pudding
This is a very old pudding originated by our pilgrim ancestors. Dissolve one and a half ounces of gelatin in two cups of hot water; add a cup of sugar, two cups of milk, a heaping cup of chopped pop corn, and a pinch of salt. Cook for five minutes, then add the strained juice of three oranges, beaten whites of three eggs, a gill of cream, and a tablespoon of ginger syrup. Set aside to cool in a wet mold. Serve whipped cream with the pudding.

Cherry Pop Corn Balls
3/4 cup light corn syrup
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
About 5 quarts freshly popped corn
1 cup whole candied cherries

Mix corn syrup, sugar, water and salt together. Bring to boil, wiping off the crystals from the sides of the pan as you go. Cook to about 260 degrees F. Add butter or margarine. Cook until a little of the syrup forms a hard ball, and will sound brittle when struck against sides of cup—the crack stage, about 290 degrees F. Mix cherries through the popped corn in a big pan or bowl (a pan big enough to mix this quantity or corn). Pour the syrup in a stream over the corn and cherries. Stir all the time so syrup coats them evenly. While syrup is still hot, shape mixture into balls with the hands. If they are to be kept for a day or so, wrap each separately in waxed paper—they draw the moisture and become sticky after a day if not wrapped. If you are the right kind of family, you won't keep these long!

Tuff Pop Corn
4 cups of popped corn
2 cups of shelled peanuts
2/3 cup of molasses
1/2 cup of sugar
1 tablespoon of butter
1 tablespoon of vinegar
1/3 cup of water
1/8 teaspoon of soda

Mix molasses, sugar, butter, water and vinegar. Cook slowly and without stirring, until the crack stage is reached. Add soda and stir well. Add remaining ingredients and mix well before pouring into shallow, well-greased pans. When cold, cut into bars or squares.

The reporters made no comment. One of Texas' most significant industrial developments of the last few years has been the building and successful operation of the first paper mill to make newsprint from Southern Pine.


Sgt. Whittington To Officers School







thrust along the road approaching Tuapse through passes to the northeast, other Russian forces struck determinedly into German-guarded positions east of the port of Novorossisk, 80 miles farther up the coast. Red Star said that in the fight for the approach to Tuapse, provisional base of the Soviet Black Sea fleet, a stubborn Red Army defense forced attacking alpine troops to fan out into the wooded mountains in a flanking attempt.

When the main body of the attackers started to swing southward to follow up the original flanking penetrations, the Russian blow was struck, an important mountain position was wrested from the Germans, and the entire attack force was caught off balance and rolled back with heavy losses, the army newspaper reported.

from the Wasson pool of Yoakum County, the Henderson pool of Winkler County, the Yates pool of Pecos County, the Howard-Glasscock pool of Howard and Glasscock counties and the Goldsmith pool of Ector County. High-octane oil from the Fullerton pool of Andrews County also has been tested.

District 8 engineers now are gathering samples from the Payton pool of Ward and Pecos counties, the Slaughter pool of Hockley, Cochran and Terry counties, and the North Cowden and Foster pools of Ector County. Their latest report is for a 50-gallon sample from the one-well Stinnett area of Lubbock County.

In addition to the samples, the Bureau of Mines asks data on the type of producing formation, thickness of the pay, depth to top of the pay, its geological name and its local name.

ist should present this application form at a school, to be issued a basic "A" ration book for gasoline. Any car owner who is away from home in another county should register wherever he is on one of those three days—November 12, 13 and 14.

Those who feel they are entitled to a supplemental ration provided by 'B' or 'C' books should obtain another application form for this at the place of registration where the 'A' book is issued," Crabb explained.

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Thinks Hi School Sports Essential For U.S. Welfare

By Harold V. Ratliff
DALLAS. (AP)—Everything else is being rationed, why not sports? R. J. Kidd, athletic director of the Texas Interscholastic League, poses the question. He thinks it would be least save the schoolboy sports program—something he considers a major contribution to the war effort.

Kidd is qualified to speak. He administers a high school sports organization that probably is the largest in the world—more than 800 schools with more than 20,000 boys playing football alone.

"Instead of forcing the high schools to quit their interschool contests the rationing board could allow them to play so many games away from home during the season," he suggests.

"This would permit the general program to be carried on, although limiting the number of games and thus conserving transportation facilities."

Must Aid Manpower
"Under the present plan they are not giving the high school boys the advantage of even rationing."


"As important as interschool contests are to physical condition, in my opinion the time has come that some concessions must be made to the agencies that are producing the manpower."

With lowering of the draft age to 18 more attention will be devoted to physical conditioning of high school boys, Kidd added.

"The national leaders will get down to the realization that our greatest reserve now is enrolled in the high schools. They have found that the older men are not fit for the stress and strain of war."

"There is a possibility that many of the boys will be on the front within a year after they reach their eighteenth birthdays. In my opinion this is a challenge to the school and to the physical education teachers of our high schools."

eral pay and wage schedules up to that amount except for such things as increased production, individual merit raises within established salary rate ranges, and individual promotions. The Treasury and War Labor Board will enforce the rules.

The purpose was to discourage wartime inflation and at the same time increase federal tax revenues by causing corporations to retain amounts formerly paid out in high salaries. The corporations thus would be required to pay taxes levied at a higher rate than on individual earned income.

FDR Limits Own Pay
The \$25,000 salary limitation is not effective until Jan. 1, although increases are prohibited meantime. The President, whose \$75,000 salary is the only statutory federal increment exceeding \$25,000, has asked the Treasury, Byrnes said, that his pay be limited within the regulations.

Allowing for tax deductions and other allowances, Treasury officials estimated that a person would have to make more than \$67,000 a year to be affected by the \$25,000 limitation.

Before reaching the \$25,000 maximum, deductions are permitted for federal income taxes, "customary" charitable contributions, payments on life insurance policies and other fixed obligations in effect on Oct. 3, 1942, and for past income taxes due.

The qualified freezing of salaries of \$5,000 or less became effective Tuesday and that of salaries of more than \$5,000 was retroactive to Oct. 3.

Paul McMurge Is Lions Club Speaker

"The Anti-Japanese Sandman", a device for loading bombs at the Midland AAF Bombardier College, was described by Paul McMurge, co-inventor of the huge machine, at the meeting of the Lions Club at Hotel Scharbauer Wednesday noon.

McMurge told of the process used in loading the bombs with sand prior to the time the machine was placed in use and said the old hand method required the services of 55 to 60 men while the modern method requires only 10 to 12 men.

The machine was invented by McMurge and Bruce Goode, both of Midland. It was placed in operation about two months ago. McMurge told how the machine operates and the process followed in drying the sand and in filling the bomb cases. Blow sand is used in the bombs.
