Their gains in the congressional and state contests exceeded the brightest hopes of Republican fore-casters and almost turned the Democrats out of even nominal control of the House.

With only five House races undecided, the Democrats had elected a bare majority of 218; the Republicans 208, Progressives two, Farmer-Labor and American-Labor one each. The Republicans showed a net gain of 43, the Democrats a net loss of 42, and the Progressives a loss of one.

In the present House, which continues until the end of the year, the Democrats have a majority of 93 over the Republicans and five minor party members. Their peak

was in 1937, with 33 3to 89. With only one Senate contest outstanding, that between Senator Murray (D-Mont) and Wellington D. Rankin, (R), the Republicans had gained nine new Senate seats without losing one to the Democrats, and the latter had lost eight. Independent George W. Norris, Nebraska, also lost out to a Republican, Kenneth S. Wherry.

The Democrats elected 15, which with 41 holdovers, gave them a total of 56 in the new Senate start-(Continued on page 8)

# Worst Axis Defeat Of War Is Expected In African Battle

Official British quarters late Thursday declared the Axis armies in North Africa were "busted" and predicted their early destruction as the worst military defeat in Adolf Hitler's career of world conquest unfolded on

the sands of Egypt.

These quarters said the British 8th Army and Navy, supported by United States and Allied warplanes, were now engaged in what amounted to a mopping up process of the shattered German and Italian armies, and added:

"This is only a prelude to what the Germans and their Italian lackeys can expect in the next few months."

Simultaneously, fresh talk of an Allied 'second front" reached a crescendo in Lon-

As the Axis staggered in retreat, fighting only rearguard actions, Lieut.-Gen. B. L. Montgomery sent the following message to

"The enemy is in our power and he is just about to crack . . . we have the chance of putting the whole Panzer army in the bag and we will do so. Complete victory is almost in

With the British in swift pursuit, Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's broken armies were reported fleeing westward across the Egyptian desert amid wild confusion, and early unofficial estimates placed Axis

losses at 40,000 troops killed, wounded or captured. Front-line dispatches said 9,000 Axis prisoner had been taken, including Gen. Ritter Von Thoma, commander of the German North Africa Corps, and that 260 tanks were knocked out of action.

To the victorious British 8th Army, King George VI sent a message declaring the importance of their feat "cannot be exaggerated."

Italian Losses Severe

Italian field headquarters tersely acknowledged that German and Italian troops had withdrawn to new lines after violent dawn-to-dusk tank battles Wednesday, and added:

"Our losss have been severe." The Fascist war bulletin said the collision of armored forces

raged over the desert between El Alamein and Fuka. Fuka lies 70 miles west of the old El Alamein front.

The Berlin radio likewise conceded that Axis troops "have been withdrawn to a prepared second line." Nazi broadcasts insisted, however, that "there can be no

talk of a breach of the German-Italian front" by British troops and asserted that despite British superiority in numbers, Axis troops were putting up the "fiercest" resistance. 'Rommel still has plenty of room on his chessboard and can

"I never thought to see the day that weeds would be cultivated!" Dr. Hammond believes goldenrod is the best immediate source of natural rubber. It's a one-season crop and reproduces easily. Guayule, another rubber - bearing native shrub, for example, must be cultivated from four to seven years to be productive.

Goldenrod is harvested in September and October, and grows best in the Southeast. At this station seed is saved from the heads, stems are cut up for rooting purposes, New Orleans. Dried leaves may be kept indefinitely with no loss of rubber properties.







Dispatches from Greece said the Germans were frantically rushing three or four divisions from the Russian front in an attempt to reinforce Rommel's battered legions. Four trainloads of Nazi troops were said to have passed through Athens en route to embarkation points.

Official British dispatches said the Axis was "in full flight" with the smoking hulks of Axis tanks littering the desert and street, just above the tree tops and from 7.75-11.50. More than half of Rommel's tanks were reported to have been destroyed in the climactic break-through as Lieut.-Gen. B. L. Montgomery's Army bolstered by American-made General Grant and General Lee tanks, rolled back the Axis line beyond El Alamein, 80 miles west of Alexandria.

Following up Wednesday night's communique reporting the sudden collapse of Rommel's once proud Africa Corps—the armored invasion force which only a few months ago threatened to overrun the Valley of the Nile-British headquarters Thursday announced:

"The 8th Army continued to advance over the whole front Wednesday.

"In the South, the enemy is still holding out in a few scattered positions. "In the North, he has a screen of anti-tank guns and



If you go to bed at the outset, you needn't worry if you cannot have a doctor's care right away, Take hot drinks and some fruit juice, and keep warm. If the cold langs on, however. it's worthy of a physician's attention, even nowadays when people are expected not to run to the doctor for advice about trifling complaints.

Rest - regular rest and enough of it - is also one of the chief means of preventing colds. Likewise, some exercise, and balanced In short the answer is to keep in good condition. A few specific suggestions:

1—Stay out of drafts. With fuel down, this is especially important. Move your desk or workbench or sewing table if necessary. Rememcreate a draft in the house. If you cannot avoid sitting in a drafty room otherwise, it might be worthwhile to put up a portier to make a room with a fire in it snug.

2.-- Avoid quick changes of temperature by reason of clothes changes—it you've adopted wooly under-wear, don't suddenly wear light lovelies on a cold day.

18 and with 20 incumbents not up for reelection gave them a total of 38. The Senate's lone Progressive LaFollette of Wisconsin, was not up

This Democratic majority of 17 or plurality of 18 over the Republicans compares with an existing majority of 34 or plurality of 36. Lowest majority in recent years was in 1933 when the division was 59 Democrats and 36 Republicans. Highest was in 1937 when it was 75 Democrats to 17 Republicans.

Seventeen Republicans Elected Of the 33 governorships at stake, including that in Maine which elected Sept. 14, the Republicans won 17 the Democrats 13, and Progressives one. Two were still in doubt—in Idaho and Wyoming. Counting holdovers, the Democrats now will have at least 23 governors, the Republicans 22, and Progres-

Technically of course the Democrats retained control of both houses of Congress. However, dependable working majorities cannot be counted on by the administration at all times when it is considered that party members do not vote solidly, particularly on domestic questions.

Besides the veteran Norris, the New Deal lost in the elections such supporters as Senators Herring of Iowa, Lee of Oklahoma Brown of Michigan, Smathers of New Jersey, and Schwartz of Wyoming. Other Democratic seats won by the Republicans were in Delaware, West Virginia, and South Dakota. Says Less Politics Wanted

Rep. J. William Ditter, of Pennsylvania, chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee, in a statement issued at Philadelphia, viewed the party's House gains as resulting from "public demand for greater effi-ciency and less politics by the national administration in the prose-

cution of this war."

Senator-Elect Wherry attributed his defeat of 81 year old Senator Norris to a "repudiation" by Nebraskans of the New Deal, dissat-isfaction over the drafting of labor from farms and ranches, and administration of the farm and food
