British Accelerate Flight Of Axis Armies In Africa

American Forces Pierce Jap Line

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hard-pressed American forces stabbed at bolstered Japanese troops on Gudalcanals' broadening battlefront Friday in a two-pronged attack that pierced deeper into one flank and threatened another.

To the west of the island's American-held airbase, Marines and soldiers successfully attacked enemy positions, the Navy reported, slaying 350 Japanese and capturing 12 37 mm. light artillery guns, three field pieces and 30 machine guns.

The offensive drive on Nov. 3* gained the American troops two additional miles of jungle. But a similar attempt to smash enemy concentrations to the east of the airfield on the following day was repulsed.



500 German Planes Rush Troops From Greece To Aid Rommel In Attempt To Avert Utter Disaster

British tanks pursuing the broken Axis armies in Egypt were reported rolling along the Mediterranean Coast Friday within striking distance of Matruh, 104 miles west of El Alamein, while dispatches from Greece said Adolf Hitler had sent a fleet of 500 planes to rush fresh troops across the sea in an attempt to avert utter disaster.

A British communique said the triumphant 8th Army was attacking Axis rearguards well beyond El Daba, 33 miles west of El Alamein.

German field headquarters acknowledged that the battle was raging 'in the area of Fuka and Matruh."

Fast-moving British armored forces were said to have advanced at least 60 miles since breaking through the enmy's defenses at the El Alamein front, 80 miles west of Alexandria.

This made a total of at least 13,000 German and Italian prisoners rounded up so far in the 14-day-old British offensive as the 8th Army swept through Axis minefields and rolled back the German-Italian invaders along a 40-mile front.

"A further large number of Italians is being rounded up in a southern sector of the battlefield, where they appear to have been abandoned in the desert by the German mechanized formations," the British communique said.

Left to their fate by the fleeing Nazis, the Italians apparently were surrendering in large numbers.

The communique said the commanders of the Italian Trento Division and his chief of staff were among the prisoners and reported at least 59 more Italian and 20 German tanks were captured.


Retreating Axis columns were pictured as clogging the Mediterranean coastal road, under a tempest of bombing and machine-gunning attacks by Allied warplanes.

Dispatches reaching Ankara, Turkey, from Greece said Hitler was desperately attempting to bolster Rommel's shattered forces with troops hurriedly shifted from the Russian front via transport planes across the Mediterranean to North Africa.

These reports said four trainloads of German soldiers from the eastern front passed through Athens Monday and trans-

Earned Income

It has long been a fundamental of American income taxing policy to encourage the earning of income in the form of wages, salaries and other payments for services rendered.

Thus the personal income tax still grants a 10 percent credit against net income which is "earned" as distinguish-'ed from that arising out of inheritance or investment.

But the new federal wage-and-salary policy, enacted by Economic Director Byrnes into administrative law over the refusal of Congress, reverses this established policy. Nobody, whatever his contribution to industry, is permitted to net more than \$25,000 a year. But the beneficiary of inherited wealth-whether or not he plants, harvests or spins-can keep as much as the income tax may Jeave to him.

Consider the President himself-not in anger or in pity, but because he provides an excellent text. As President, performing the most trying task in the world today, he was getting \$75,000, which he has ordered cut to \$25,-000. As heir to a fortune left by his forebears, which is his by coincidence of birth, he will collect each year many times the net income he will receive from the United States for his services as President.

We doubt that such a reversal of American tax philosophy will meet with the approval of the American people. But that is by no means the only injustice contained in the salary limitation law.

Consider the man whose income varies from year to year. Over a period, his income averages well under \$25,000 but to maintain that average he must receive well above \$25,000 in some years.

Let's be more specific. Let's take an athlete, an actor, or any man who has to cram a lifetime's earnings into a dozen years or so. Like many of his kind he has just one thing to sell—ability to hit a baseball 400 yards, perhaps or a profile that makes the girls that way.

Such a person receives no special consideration, says Director Byrnes. No exceptions. Herd the sheep and the dozen and shoot them all as they note in white.
