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British Capture Tobruk

May Beat **Axis Army**

By The Associated Press LONDON - A powerful striking force of Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's combined British-American Army swept toward Tunisia Friday in strength which suggested that it might break on through and beat Field Marshal Rommel to Tripoli, the last major port of escape left after his headlong flight west of Tobruk.

There were many indications that this time the Axis was too late with too little in its effort to grab off Tunisia—and was well aware of it.

A British announcement that RAF fighters had shot down six big Italian troop-carrying planes filled with German troops and "flying north, probably from Tunisia," indicated that the Nazis might be hastily pulling out the garrisons they had rushed to that French protectorate.

pattern of developments: 1.—American assault troops leadin the new British First Army were expected to cross the Tunisian frontier Friday, coming within 400 airline miles of the great Lobyan port of Tripoli, with little prospect of any resistance in Tunisia that they cannot handle.

2.—Racing for safety, Rommel abandoned the historic siege port of Tobruk to the British, too hardpressed to put up a fight, with fully 500 airline miles of desert trail between him and Tripoli.



Axis Armies Now Are In Wild Flight; May Be Quitting Tunisia

British headquarters Friday announced the capture of historic Tobruk, 80 miles inside Libya, and at the same time there were indications the Axis might be quitting Tunisia in Northwest Africa.

Britain's victorious desert armies, climaxing a 305-mile sweep in 22 days, entered Tobruk Friday morning, it was announced officially.

They previously had captured Bardia, 115 miles inside Libya, and Halfaya ("Hellfire") Pass on the Egyption-Libyan frontier.

Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's broken armies now were apparently in wild flight as the British reported waves of RAF planes swept low over retreating Axis truck and troop columns fleeing from Tobruk to Gazala, 30 miles further west.
