Japanese Fliers Harass Allies In New Guinea

Japanese forces continue to fall ana. back toward Buna but their air force has re-emerged in an effort to harass Allied columns closing relentlessly on that Papuan base

Wednesday's communique reported. Latest reports from the New Guinea front said advanced Allied ground units, new directed in the field by General MacArthur, were pushing on toward the coast from Awala, only 30 trail miles from Buna, without meeting serious op-

In their first attempt in some weeks to challenge Australian and American air command over New Guinea, a formation of 18 bombers and fighters attacked advanced Allied ground units Monday in the Buna area and sank two srawlers along the coast.

But the Emperor's airmen got better than they gave as American B-25 medium bombers, P-40 fighters and attack planes twice swept over the enemy airfield at Lae, northwest along the coast from Buna and destroyed seven bombers and seven fighters on the ground and one Zero that attempted in-

Arrangements With Admiral Darlan Are Temporary Expedient

WASHINGTON-(AP)-Free and fighting Frenchmen had President Roosevelt's categorical assurance Wednesday that political arrangements with Admiral Jean Darlan in North Africa were "only a temporary expedient," dictated by mili-

In a statement obviously designed to allay mounting unrest over the part being played by Darlan, who was a Vichy collaborationist until he was captured by American troops, the President said the 'present temporary arrangement' in North Africa was "justified solely by the stress of battle."

The statement drew prompt expression of gratification from fighting French spokesmen.

"I thoroughly understand and approve the feeling in the United States and Great Britain and among all the other United Nations," Roosevelt said, "that in view of the history of the past two years no permanent arrangement should be made with Admiral Darlan.

"We are opposed to Frenchmen who support Hitler and the Axis."

WASHINGTON. - (AP) - Presi dent Roosevelt sized up a fortnight's "good news" from the battle zones Tuesday night as indicating that the turning point of the war

had been reached. But he tempered his analysis, presented in a radio speech to The New York Herald Tribune's Annual Forum, with cautious phrases. He said it would continue to be an up-hill fight—"all the way"—that there could be "no coasting to victory. and that it was no time for exul-

"There is no time now," Roosevelt said, "for anything but fighting and working to win." He described the encounter be-

tween Japanese and American war-

ships Nov. 13 to 15 as "one of the great battles of our history."

Despite this crushing blow administered to a numerically superior Japanese fleet, the President said in his speech that a "gigantic job" remained to be done. He said battle lines stretching from Kiska to Murmansk and from Tunisia to Guadalcanal would lengthen as our

forces advance The President paid tribute to his formal naval aide, Rear Admiral Daniel J. Callaghan, who was killed in last week's battle.

Hitler Masses Fleet Of 1,000 Planes In Effort To Hold Base

Adolf Hitler was reported massing a fleet of more than 1,000 planes in Southern Italy, Crete, Sardinia and Sicily in an attempt to defend the last Axis bases in North Africa Wednesday as the Nazi-controlled Paris radio announced that German troops had "cap-

Use of the word "captured" appeared to refute previous Berlin assertions that the Germans moved in "to defend their French compatriots in Tunisia" and met only cooperation from French soldiers in the vital North African buffer state.

Simultaneously, British parachute troops borne by huge American transport planes were reported swarming down on key points in the Mediterranean coastal colony, spearheading an advance by perhaps 150,000 Allied soldiers from Algeria.

Military secrecy hid the extent of the Allied thrust into Tunisia, but a British broadcast quoted Lieut. Gen. Kenneth A. N. Anderson, commander of the British 1st Army, as declaring himself satisfied with

German broadcasts boasted that Axis troops were well established and ready to meet the Allied offen-
