

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States has reached a satisfactory agreement with Martinique, Secretary of State Hull said Monday, as a result of which there is not likely to be any necessity for American occupation of the French Caribbean possessions, Hull said. The new agreement covered all French possessions in the Western Hemisphere, including French Guiana.

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts)—(AP)—Marcel Deat, leader of a French political party favoring collaboration with the Nazis, said Monday that "France is in a state of war with Great Britain and the United States," the Berlin radio reported.

LONDON-(AP)-The Italian High Command said three merchant ships were sunk in Algiers harbor by bombers, a big merchantman and a warship were torpedoed in an attack on a British convoy in the Mediterranean, and other British and American naval units were hit in a German bomber attack on another North African harbor. None of these claims had any confirmation from Allied sources.

The Comintern is located in Moscow, in a Soviet government building. Its members serve during Stalin's approval. Their activities are financed out of the Soviet treasury.




