In terms of utmost restraint, Washington official quarters said air and surface engagements "are con-tinuing" and indicated that the big armadas had not yet joined in a decisive battle



Better Living Is On The Way

A surprising array of new, post-war industries may be a-bornin' in—of all places— the war plants that are now devoted to turning out tons of poison gas, incendiary bombs and the non-toxic smokes which will play an increasingly important part in this global ruckus.

Take the gas masks themselves. At least 10 million of them will have to be made for the armed services, to say nothing of the millions made for civilians. The important part of the gas mask is the filter that absorbs the poison gas. The important element of the filter—the stuff that goes in the can that hangs below the mask-is activated

In the last war, that filtering element had to be highgrade charcoal and it was a considerable problem to produce this gas absorbing material in sufficient quantities. Today this activated carbon can be made from almost anything, including coal or sawdust, and there is no shortage.

When the war is over the plants making this activated carbon may be kept right on going, say the chemists, in a new peacetime industry. The thought is not to provide every cook with a gas mask to protect her from the fumes of her own sauerkraut, kidney stew or fried onions, but it's



Fairer Allotting Of Meat Predicted By OPA Officials

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Fairer distribution of meat among stores within a few weeks was predicted Thursday by officials of the Office of Price Administration.

They expressed confidence that this would result from the promul-gation of their new standardized retail meat prices. The first of these, on pork, will be issued in two weeks, and subsequent rules on beef, yeal, lamb and mutton are scheduled to follow between that date and the beginning of meat rationing, approximately April 1. The new prices are expected to

cuts in March, 1942. This has "squeezed" those stores—particu-lar chain stores and other cut-rate establishments—whose March, 1942, retail prices weren't high enough to cover present wholesale costs. Under the new rules, every store of the same type in the same community will have the same prices. The nation will be divided into 10 zones and in each zone the govern-ment will specify, in cents per pound, maximum retail prices for every cut of meat. Slight differentials will be maintained between independent stores, and supermar-

OPA spokesmen believe that rationing will solve most of the other problems, but a spokesman for the meat industry expressed doubt. The packer representative urged more vigorous prosecution of the "black market in meat"-surreptitious and illegal slaughtering of meat animals, and conspiracy with small packers, wholesalers and some stores to sell meat at illegal prices.


