

What happened to Edward J. Flynn, aspirant for the Australian diplomatic post, is one of the healthiest signs of the current times. The episode has unfortunate undertones, cf course. Within the past fortnight it appears MacArthur has established a strong concentration of air and land forces just to the southwest of Lae-Salamaua.

There is no doubt this has the enemy badly worried. He showed this Saturday when he sent some 70 planes-a formidable force for that theater-against the Allied base at Wau, 35 miles southwest of Salamaua. They were crushingly defeated by American Lightnings, Airacobras and Warhawks, which downed or damaged 41 of the enemy fighters and bombers without loss of their own. U. S. Has Upper Hand

It was the most striking demonstration yet given of American air superiority in the Australian-New Guinea war zone, a superiority wholly qualitative in this case, due to better planes and better pilots since the Americans were outnum bered.

Now that General MacArthur ha. been able to move his air bases farther north future attempts to reinforce and supply the Japanese forces holding the Lae-Salamaua area are likely to be still more costly

At the end of the Papuan cam paign General MacArthur declared that the union of air and ground strength achieved therein pointed 'the way to victory through broadened strategic and tactical conceptions." This air-land coordination he said, "will permit the applica-tion of offensive power in swift, massive strokes rather than th dilatory and costly island-to-island advance that some have assumed to be necessary" in the Southwest Pacific


