The armed forces, through undersecretaries, are trying to make the Battle of Rubber look like a grabbing contest between military necessity and civilian conven-

Undersecretaries Patterson of War and Forrestal of Navy have told a Congressional subcommittee that Rubber Director Jeffer's demands would rob the fighting forces of 15,000 airplanes and of badly needed anti-submarine craft because certain equipment, instruments and materials are needed for all of these and for 100 octane gasoline.

The layman accepts at face value the statements of experts that for the moment we must choose among these Former Midland desirable instrumentalities-planes, high octane gasoline, escort vessels, and synthetic rubber. Apparently we can't Man May Become

Point rationing covers a whole group of these foods, some scarcer than others. Each person starts with the same number of points he can use. If he buys very scarce kinds of things, he uses up a lot of points, if he buys less scarce things he uses fewer points and so he can buy more goods. But all foods in the group are under control because they represent a supply of interchangeable things and everybody must get a fair share of the total. Point rationing leaves civilians that freedom of choice which Americans value so highly.




You can save time and inconvenience by keeping a supply of fuses on hand (15-ampere for branch circuits and 30-


ampere for the main circuit). Then when a fuse "blows out," you can replace it with a new one quickly by following the six suggestions of Reddy Kilowatt, shown at the right. If some, but not all, of your lights go out, this indicates that a branch circuit fuse has blown. If all your lights go out, and lights next door are on, the trouble likely is a blown main circuit fuse.




