Foods Go To War

United States foods have gone to war, but not as yet to the extent that certain shortages may lead some citizens to believe, the Office of War Information pointed out in a statement showing how Uncle Sam is steadily increasing food production and sharing with his allies.

This does not mean, OWI added, that in 1943, as the balance of lend-lease food shifts rapidly from the United Kingdom to the food-devastated Soviet Union, much greater demands will not be made than in 1942.

But as the greatly increased production of 1942 more than made up for shipments to other United Nations, so, OWI stated, goals for 1943 have been set at the same record level, and in some cases even higher, for some types of food products.
