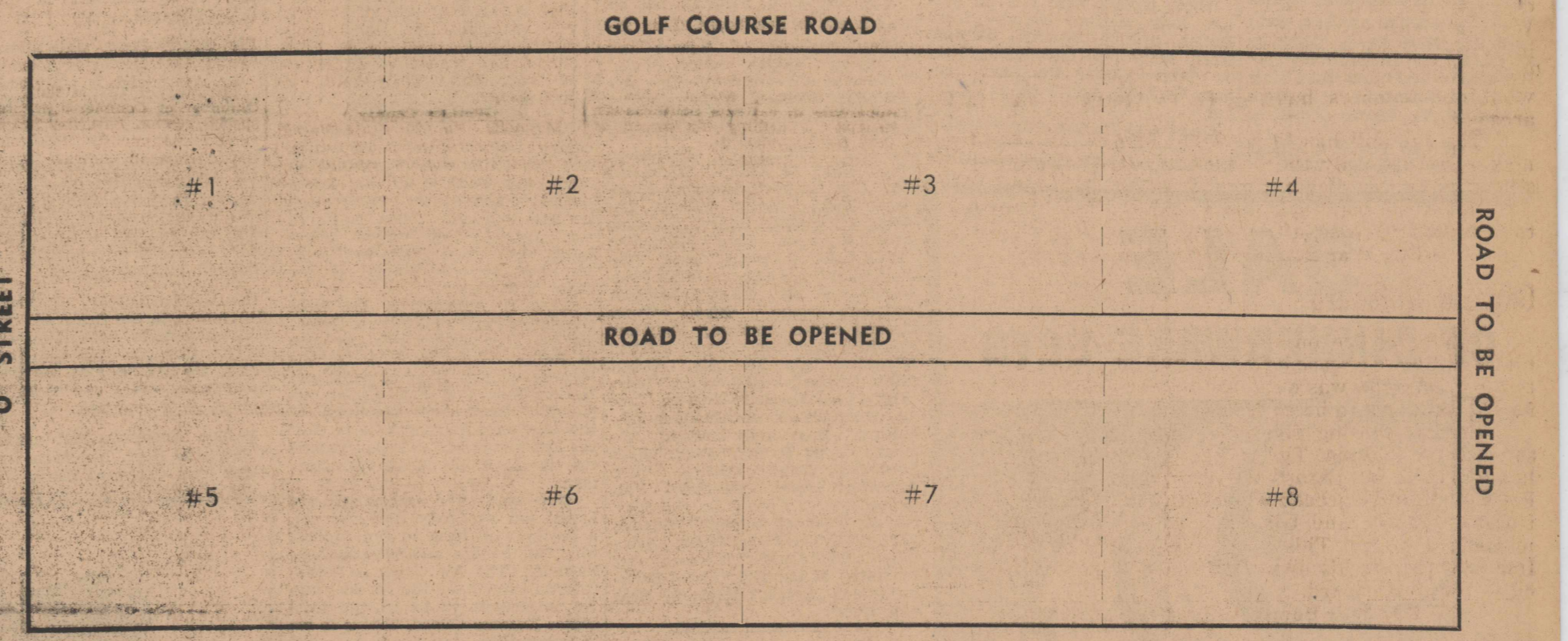

Murray Howell, who graduated in 1941, now is an aviation radioman third class, and is stationed in Jacksonville, Florida.

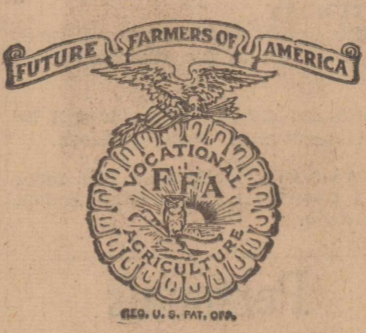
Temple Harris, a 1940 graduate, left March 17 to be an aviation cadet. He is stationed in Santa Ana, California.

Cain jumped to three no trump, which Sobel doubled, and Cain redoubled.

Now, to complete the story, I should be able to say that Sobel took the first seven tricks, but that "ain't the way I heard it." Upon completion of the bidding, East led out of turn! Thus Cain was able to call for a heart lead and cashed the first eleven tricks, making three no trump doubled and redoubled, with two over-tricks.

That's the rule! If the wrong opponent leads the declarer can either treat the card led in error as a penalty card, or he can tell the player to pick it up, and call for the lead of any specified suit by the proper leader.
