George Fields, authorizes the Free Press this week to make his announcement as a candidate for public weigher of Precinct No. 1, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July.

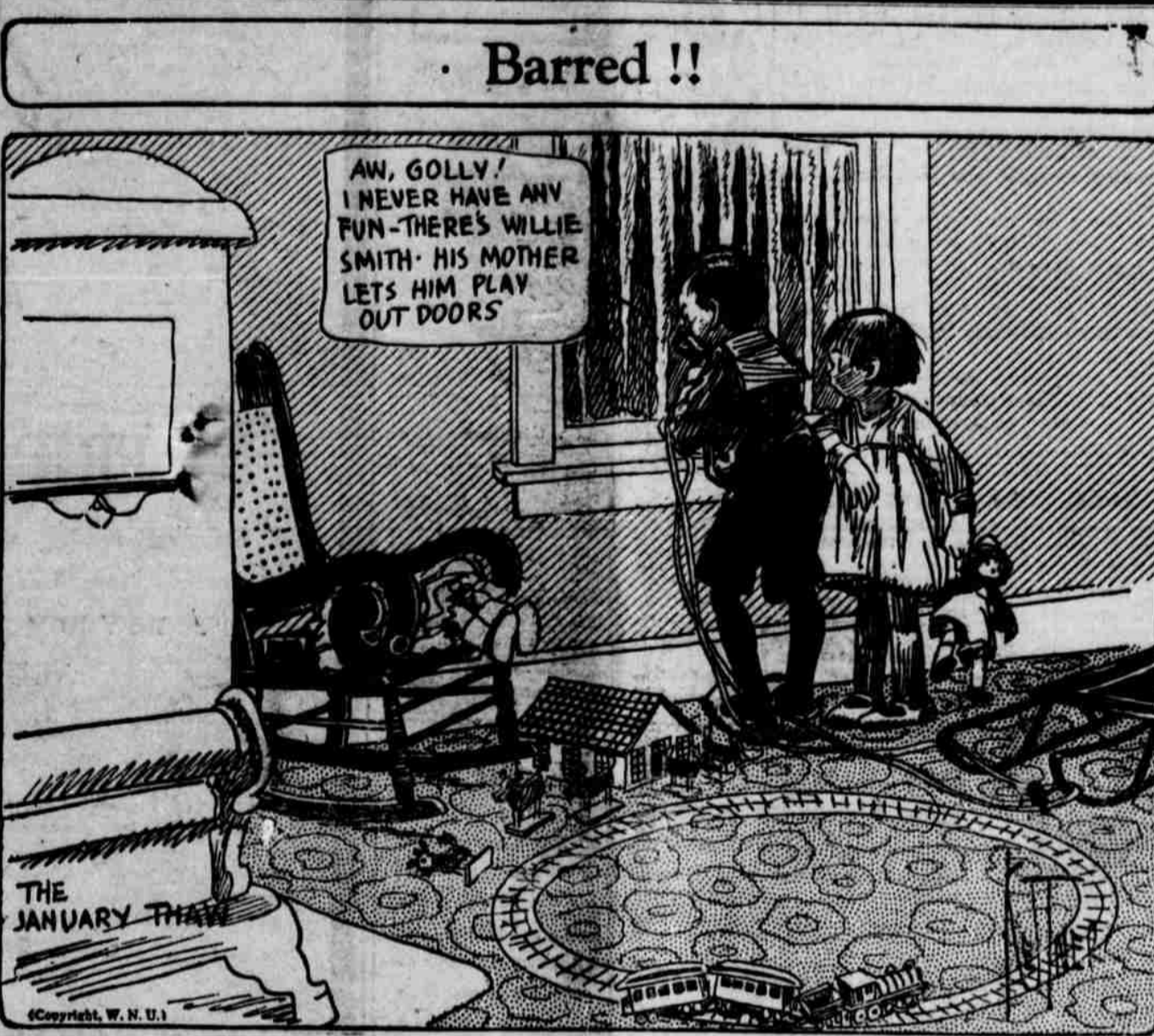

## HASKELL MILL & GRAIN COMPANY HAS ENJOYED PHENOMINAL GROWTH

Present Large Plant is the Outgrowth of The Ambition of Two Farmers Back in 1919, Who Saw in Haskell the Ideal Location for the Realization of Their Plans.

One of the best known and most extensively patronized industries of our city today is the Haskell Flour Mill which began operation in August, 1920, and from the very first enjoyed a satisfactory patronage.

The mill was first installed in a building just across the track from the Valley Depot and after three years of successful operation the building and machinery were moved a few blocks north to the site of the Sherrill Elevator which was purchased and given the new name of the Haskell Mill & Grain Company, under which it is operated at this time. In addition to the production of wheat flour and corn meal, many different kinds of feed are ground, mixed and sold to the trade. The most extensively distributed is a cotton seed meal and hulls product used for cow feed and more than 100,000 sacks have already been sold with a daily increase in sales.

**A Dream Comes True.**  
In 1919 while E. C. and E. I. Christian, founders of the mill, were picking cotton in a field near the city of Rising Star, E. C. Christian drew the plan of a mill on his cotton sack while he was resting his tired muscles after the strenuous exertion of chasing the scattered bolls of cotton which still remained unpicked. The possibility of building and operating a mill was discussed by these brothers and then and there, the plans of a mill were formulated and at the earliest possible moment they set out to find a location for a mill.

**Haskell Proved to be Ideal Location.**  
After investigating various cities and towns, Haskell was chosen as the ideal place for the mill, and in April, 1920, after purchasing a lot near the Valley Depot the grounds were cleaned and the foundation of the building was laid, which was rushed to completion

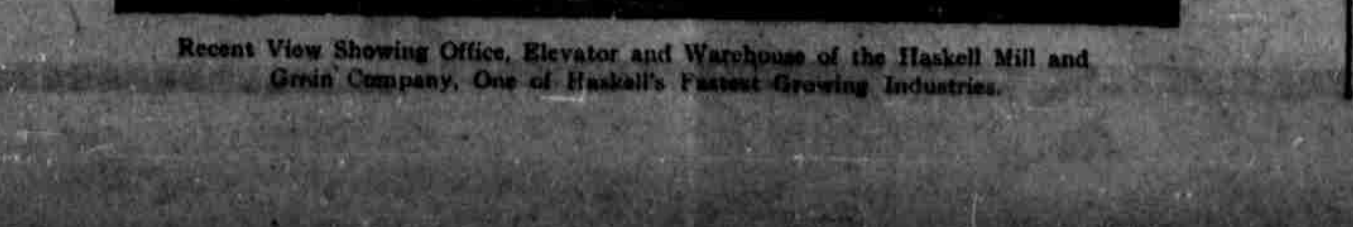
and in August the same year the mill began operation.

**Plans Perfectly Drawn.**  
The plans of this mill was so perfectly studied and drawn that when the mill was erected and the machinery installed everything needed was included in, the first order and it was completed with everything at hand. Not even a piece of extra belting was needed to start the mill in operation after it was completed.

**Moves to New Location.**  
After three years of successful operation, in August 1923, Christian Brothers and F. T. Sanders purchased the Sherrill Elevator and moved the Mill to the elevator site and began operation in their new location. In beginning the new year of 1926, greater expectations for the success of the mill is anticipated and the trade territory of the mill and its products is expanding with every passing day. Quite a number of customers have been patronizing the mill from as far as the south plains country and a number have brought corn to the mill from Dickens county. Many farmers moving from Haskell to New Mexico and other sections of the northwest have taken mill products in large quantities with them and quite a number bring or send their grain back for grinding.

Christian Brothers have not left the operation of the mill in the hands of others but have put their shoulder to the wheel and have had personal charge of the building, operating, and managing.

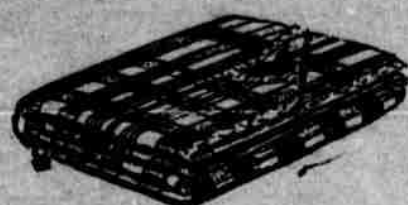
