Lend-Lease Meat

There is a growing feeling that the eating public is entitled to a full, fair and impartial statement, supported with figures, from a source in which the public has confidence, about the causes of the complete breakdown in meat distribution. Most explanations thus far have left the harrassed housewife feeling that they really

About the only excuses advanced are that lendlease plus needs of the armed forces account for the shortage. Now lend-lease Administrator Edward R. Stettinus knocks out the first with figures and casts doubt upon the second.

The first two months of this year, reports Stettinus, shipments on land-lease took only 10 pounds out of every 1000 of our beef, and even this was five times the rate in 1942, at the end of which decent beef was almost unobtainable by civilians.
