President Roosevelt said Friday dollars-and-cents ceiling prices probably would be placed on all food commodities which affect living costs, while James F. Byrnes, economic stabiliation director, said the Office of Price Administration might be able to present specific ceiling price plans Saturday, following those now laid down for meats

Byrnes was sitting in on a presidential press conference, which dealt largely with the chief executive's new order designed to help combat inflation through more rigid restrictions on prices and wages.

When a newspaperman inquired whether the sweeping Presidential order meant that workers were more or less frozen in their jobs in essential industries.
