Members of the American Legion Auxiliary Tuesday began the work of preparing the little red flowers

for Poppy Day, Saturday.

The poppies, many hundreds of them, were in boxes shipped from Legion, Texas, where they were made by disabled war veterans. Legion is located near Kerrville, where war veterans from this district are sent. Shaped patiently by hand, each little flower is a replica in crepe paper of the flowers that bloomed on the battle fields of the first World Wr. Each is slightly different, but all have the same meaning. Flanders Fields are on the other side of the world from Guadalcanal and a quarter of a century distant in time but the little wild poppy of Flanders speaks for the dead of both battles. The poppy is the memorial flower for all who have died in America's struggle against world slavery, wherever or whenever they fell. It is worn to show that Americans remember them, honor them and are continuing to fight in the cause for which they died.

The poppies are being sorted and counted ready to go into the baskets of the Auxiliary volunteers who will distribute them throughout the city Saturday. Contributions received for them will aid the Legion's and Auxiliary's work for disabled veterans and families of service men.



The layer of frost that forms on the freezing unit of your electric refrigerator actually acts like a blanket, for it keeps the cold from reaching food that you want kept fresh and wholesome. This frost layer also harbors food odors, and should be removed when it becomes about 1/4 inch thick, about the thickness of a

Pick one day in the week to defrost your refrigerator. A freezing unit free from a heavy layer of frost makes ice cubes faster and maintains a lower chilling temperature in the food compartment. Consult your refrigerator instruction book for a recommended method of defrosting or try the quick method explained below if you are storing frozen toods.

*HOW TO DEFROST YOUR REFRIGERATOR QUICKLY



Turn the control switch to "off" and remove everything from freezer compartment. Wrap any frozen foods with several thicknesses of paper and put them on a refrigerator shelf. They won't thaw out in the short time required to complete the defrosting. Fill a pan or baking dish with hot water and place on the bottom shelf of the freezer compartment. Do not use the quick-release type ice trays for this purpose, as they are coated with a thin film of wax that will wash away

3. Clean the food compartment and racks with a solution of one quart of cost water and a teaspoonful of baking soda. By this time, the layer of trost

should be melted from the freezer compartment, which also should be cleaned with the soda solution.

4. Wipe the refrigerator dry and refill the ice trays. Old ice cubes collect food odors and sometimes acquire a stale taste. Then turn the control switch



Delivery Service In East Sharply Cut By ODT Order

WASHINGTON -(A)-More bun dle-toting for the East was decreed Tuesday in an order sharply curtailing delivery services and in the case of many luxury items prohibiting them entirely. The order was coupled with a warning that the already critical gasoline shortage along the Atlantic Seaboard would grow worse.

The order, effective at 11:01 p. m (CWT) Wednesday, was issued by the Office of Defense Transportation Monday night for 13 Northeastern states and the District of Columbia.

Limitations were placed on both wholesale and retail deliveries. The ODT listed the maximum number of deliveries which may be made in one week between two given points for certain commodities. All Sunday deliveries except ice, fresh milk

and cream, were forbidden. The order came on top of a 40per cent cut in mileage rationing for bus, truck and taxi travel.

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'Wandering Cue' Does Talking For Charley Peterson

ST. LOUIS (P) — A slender shaft of hardwood, glossed with the patina of much handling, probably is the most traveled bit of sports

equipment in the world. It's the billiard cue used by Charley Peterson, veteran ace of the trick shot artists. Charley has been at the business of amazing the billiard public for so long a time many contemporaries were doing tricks with nothing more difficult than glass nursing bottles when the St. Louisan first began touring.

Back in 1921, when the cue was just a youngster, Peterson, then touring the country with Willie Hoppe, originated in Boise, Idaho his most famous trick, the "dollar shot." Placing a silver dollar on edge between two chalk cubes at one end of the table, Peterson cues the coin so it rolls to the table's other end, rebounds from the cushion and rolls back between the two cubes-without touching Makes Annual Tours






