In Tunisia Totaled 2,184 Soldiers Killed

WASHINGTON—(P)— American army casualties in North Africa from November 8 to May 15 totaled 2,184 killed, 9,437 wounded and 6,937 missing or prisoners, Secretary of War Stimson said Thursday. Total Allied casualties in the Tunisian campaign, including British and French figures not reported in detail, were "less than 70,000," Stimson said. By contrast, he said the Axis lost 30,000 killed, 26,400 wounded and 266,600 prisoners.

When the conferees announced a compromise agreement Tuesday, a spokesman said the measure provided cancellation of a whole year's personal income tax liability for taxpayers owing \$50 or less, and 75 per cent abatement for all others.

Later, however, some conference members said they understood the compromise stipulated not only that persons owing more than \$50 would get a 75 per cent | ities.

Unharvested Potato Racket

Certain smart California dealers are credited with a new cute trick to beat the maximum ceiling price on potatoes, but they may not get away with it. The case is interesting though, because if unchecked, the racket might have spread to other food commodities. It shows the ingenuity of some of these operators in evading price regulations, and it's a good example of why bureaucrats are gradually going daffy trying to keep ahead of the chiselers.

The story begins with Maximum Price Regulation No. 271, covering potatoes and dry onions. The onions are just for seasoning as far as the story goes, potatoes being the principal dish under discussion. MPR 271 sets specified dollars and cents ceiling prices on potatoes at the country shipper level, packed and loaded on a carrier, plus specified fixed markups for transportation to market, plus wholesalers' and retailers' profits, giving in the end a maximum price for consumers. But at the beginning, the ceiling is an F.O.B. price at the growers'

Out in the California potato country, certain slick citizens read over this regulation and they say, "Hmmm! What's to prevent us from buying potatoes in the ground? There isn't any ceiling price on potatoes in the ground. So we could buy the potatoes before they're dug, before they're sacked, before they're loaded on a truck or freight car at the country shipper's F.O.B. point. We could pay the farmer above the ceiling price, which will make him happy. We'll be happy because we'll have potatoes to sell. We can bypass the wholesalers' markup, sell directly to the consumer at ceiling prices if we have to, or at black market prices if we can, and boy how the money will roll in.

As a smart dodge to beat the price ceilings, this is about as neat a trick as the Office of Price Administration enforcement officials have run into yet. It isn't legally wrong perhaps, but it is a technical evasion of the OPA regulations prompted only by greed, and the most vicious kind of war profiteering at the expense of the potatoconsuming public. It is dirty pool in war-time, but what can be done about it?
