Long-Awaited Offensive In Belgorod Area Costs Nazis Heavily In Men And Materials

LONDON —(P)— Fierce fighting continued throughout the night on the Orel-Kursf-Belgorod front, where the Germans launched their long-awaited offensive Monday, but Soviet troops beat off all attacks and inflicted heavy casualties on the invaders, the Soviet information bureau announced Tuesday.

In one sector between Orel and Kursk, the midday communique said, 4,000 German officers and men were killed in futile assaults and 17 tanks were knocked out of action. Fifty German tanks, including 10 of the Nazis' new giant "Tiger" tanks, were reported disabled in another sector of the same front.

In the Belgorod area, the Russians said, 2,000 German officers and French coast in brilliant sunshine men were slain in one sector and .-

85 tanks were destroyed or burned. The Russians acknowledged that the Germans had broken through their defense lines at one point on the Belgorod front, capturing two populated places, but said the enemy had been dislodged by counter-attacking Red Army forces. Fnemy Losses Heavy

"Hundreds of enemy dead remained on the battleield," said the war bulletin, which was broadcast by the Moscow radio and recorded by the Soviet radio monitor here. Southwest of Mtsensk the Germons flung two degiments of infantry against Russian hill-top positions which the communique described as "of great tactical im-

The Nazi troops succeeded in occupying several Russian trenches. Counter blows strucks by the Red Army flung the Germans back, however, and the Russians degained all lost territory, the bul-

Other Sectors Quiet The communique indicated that the German high command was pushing its offensive without regard to losses of armored equipment. To the 586 enemy tanks reported destroyed in the midnight communique the midday bulleting added 152 more, bringing the total for the first 24 hours of the push

Elsewhere on the Russian front little activity was reported. Russian troops on the Kerelian front attacked two Finnish strong points. One garrison surrendered and the second was routed with a loss of 250 killed and wounded. On the front west of Moscow, both sides engaged in occasional exchanges of artillery and machine-

### Senate Attempts To Put Limit On **Subsidy Payments**

WASHINGTON - (A) - Apparently convinced of congressional inability to block the administra-tion's subsidy-rollback program, the Senate turned Tuesday to installing producer-safeguards and a spending limit to legislation authorizing government payments to push down retail food prices.

Barring a last ditch fight by Born In Texas subsidy foes, the Senate was expected to approve before nightfall | County. a stopgap measure continuing the subsidy payments up to \$525,000,000. Revising a House bill which removes all subsidy prohibitions recently approved overwhelmingly by Congress but vetoed by President Roosevelt, the Senate adopted another amendment designed to prevent subsidy payments from harming the producer.

Forbid Price Cut The proposal would forbid either CCC or the Reconstruction Finance Corporation which would get \$350,-000,000 of the subsidy authorization. from inaugurating any rollback "if in its opinion such program will result in reduction in the price paid to the producers.

Authored by Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo), critic of the subsidy-rollback plan, the measure also would require both agencies to issue "suitable regulations to prevent any such reduction in the price paid to the producers of such commodity as a result of any subsidy

### Vangunu Island Is Captured By American Forces

WASHINGTON —(AP)— The Navy reported Tuesday that on the basis of incomplete information United States naval forces apparently had caused the Japanese very heavy damage in the battle of Kula Gulf.

Details of the action, fought Monday (Solomon Island time) and apparently all over now, still were lacking but there was no disposition in authoratative quarters here to consider it as a major encounter with decisive bearing on the Solomons campaign.

The impression prevailed rather that it was an action between fairly light surface forces of cruisers and destrovers. Whether bombing planes participated was not known. U. S. Destroyer Lost

A Navy commonique said that 'sufficient details have not been received to give the results of this engagement, but it is believed that, while some damage was suffered by the United States force, considerable damage was inflicted on the enemy."

## War Bulletins

LONDON—(AP)—Soviet Russia's announcement of destruction of 586 tanks in the first thrust of the German offenive Monday suggested to London observers Tuesday that the Russians have acquired highly effective new antitank weapons or tactics.

LONDON—(AP)—The Netherlands news agency Aneta reported Tuesday that hundreds of Dutch physicians have been imprisoned in concentration camps by the Germans because they refuse to accept Nazi medical ideologies and practices. Many of them have gone into hiding, it was said, while health services are at an apparent standstill.

STOCKHOLM—(AP)—The Berlin correspondent of the Stockholms Tidningen quoted Major Otto Mossdorf, German military commentator, Tuesday as saying that Gen. Douglas Mac-Arthur's South Pacific offensive "may be the beginning of a decided turn of events for the Japanese." For the past six years, Mossdorf was reported as saying, the Japanese have failed to fulfill their promises "to finish the Chinese war

### Who Won World War II?

A reporter on a midwestern newspaper asked 30 men and women, interviewed essentially at random, which United Nation has made the greatest contribution toward winning this war. Two said Russia, one China and 27 the United States.

Such a question and the answers make an excellent feature, but the results of the poll prove only one thing, which is the willingness of almost everybody to express a firm opinion on matters about which he knows very

To such a question there are at least six answers which can be argued with considerable logic-Britain, China, Russia or the United States, Germany by her errors, or our own favorite—that the war hasn't been won yet, which is not really a quibble.

are not followed to the letter. Proper methods and careful canning will insure excellent results, more important in the present food situation than at any other time.

The glass Top Seal fruit jar cap, a wartime product developed conserve metal, requires careful use, according to the home service departments of fruit jar manufacturers. This cap consists of a netal band, glass lid and rubber ring. With these three widely varied materials making up its component parts, the cap must be used accirding to important but easily followed instructions. Firth of the cap is not recommended for and must not be used in oven

If the food is processed (cooked in a jar), one inch of space must be left in the top of the jar when filled, in order to allow room for expansion. If an open kettle is used, one-half inch space must be left in the top of the jar.



The Army has 130,000 young men in colleges undergoing special training as engineers, medical officers, and in other technical pursuits. However, Army officials said only last week that the schedule

for these soldiers simply doesn't allow enough time for football, much as they'd like to arrange it. Their reaction came when the Unviersity of Maryland carded an eight-game schedule, expressing hope some of its soldiers would be allowed to join the squad.

In recent weeks, a number of colleges have announced they would not be able to continue football because all their mature players were in uniform and they felt the 17-year-olds would not

fill the breach. Weiss is chairman of an informal committee that has been urging the War Department to allow Army college trainees to participate in intercollegiate games.

WASHINGTON - Baseball baseballs and hundreds of units of guards and body protectors to the Americans. More than 100,000 units of recreational equipment have already been contributed alto-

gether by Australia, and some 220,000 additional units will be added, with baseball leading in the athletic department, reading matter in the non-athletic. They range from dominoes to footballs, from phonograph records to horse shoes.

Some 300 bases are included, making possible 75 baseball games simultaneously. On the basis of 96,000 baseballs used by the two big leagues of the United States during a season, the soldier teams should be able to play thousands of games.

Australia also has contributed 1,938 softballs and is committee to an additional 18,062, a total of 20,000. Breakage and loss are on a reduced scale in softball, which explains the smaller number.

Only 20 footballs had been delivered when the report was compiled, but there will be 2,000 with full complements of bladders pumps. A total of 244 volleyballs have also been delivered and there will be 2,000, with nets and blad ders. Basketballs-500 of them-are scheduled, with 168 already deliv ered, and 3.094 dozens of punchbai pladders, with 506 dozen delivered

The servicemen can drow up-a supply of 3,000 dozen tennis balls. It he prefers bodily contact in his sports life, 415 sets of boxing gloves are already on hand and a total of 1,200 scheduled, with punching bags, both heavy and light, and 175 medicine balls, to help him train for his bouts.
