# German Army Pays Terrific Tolls In Drives Against Russian Lines

MOSCOW —(A)—The German army has paid a terrific toll in tanks and manpower as the price for "insignificant gains" achieved in two days of bitter fighting in the 1943 Summer offensive on the Orel-Kursk-Belgorod front, the Russians said Wednesday.

Acknowledging the loss of two unidentified towns near Belgorod at the southernmost end of the revitalized 165-mile front, the Red Army announced Tuesday night that in two days its artillery had smashed 1,271 enemy tanks and shot down 314\*



Flies may carry and spread the virus from infected persons, their soiled articles, from garbage and from cesspools and open toilets to other persons or exposed foods. Destruction of flies and removal of their breeding places and as garbage and manure reduce the chances of spread. All raw vegetables and fresh fruits should be carefully washed before eating

Early symptoms are fever, headache, sore throat, vomiting, unusual drowsiness and irritability followed by stiffness in the neck and back. Any sick child should be kept at home until he is well. A physician should be called at once if the symptoms make the parents suspicious.

Crowding of children in public places is to be discouraged. Public swimming pools and wading pools are easily contaminated by nose and throat secretions and bowel material. Since children are more susceptible to polio, all such places should be closed to children 16 years of age and younger.






