

ALLIES SMASH AXIS ATTACKS

General Arnold And Sir John Dill See Bombing Demonstration Here

Military Chiefs Visit Air Field For Inspection

The value of precision bombing was clearly demonstrated at the Midland Army Air Field Wednesday night to General Henry H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army Air Forces, Field Marshal Sir John Dill of the British Army and other military leaders.

From an altitude of 6,000 feet Wednesday night, bombardier cadets sent bombs smashing into the "shack," the target which was erected temporarily in the center of the flying field at the bombardier school.

At least three bombs smashed into the "shack" before the distinguished visitors left the flying field. A string of lights outlined the target, but it was a tiny speck from the twin-engine bombers which roared over 6,000 feet above sea level.

"The demonstration proves our men can slip one in the hip-pocket of the enemy from 20,000 feet," General Arnold commented. "Splendid," added the British military leader who with his aide, Captain R. Winn, watched details of the bombings closely.

"Complete accuracy," "The Midland bombardiers," General Arnold continued, "demonstrated the complete accuracy of night bombing."

Two bombing demonstrations were staged for the visitors. Manning the bombsights in the planes were bombardiers who received their commissions at graduating exercises (Continued on Page 2)

Humble To Start New Wildcat In Gaines County

The Humble Oil & Refining Company Thursday announced location for a new 9,000-foot Ordovician test in Southwestern Gaines County, the deepest test to be drilled in this area.

The new wildcat, the Humble No. 1 R. A. Cox et al. is located 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of section 14, block A-11 on public school land.

Magnolia Petroleum Company's No. 2 D. K. Glenn, second producer and 3/4-mile southwest extension of the McKee pool in Southwestern Crane County, produced a potential of 357 barrels of oil based on the last three hours of a six-hour gauge test. The well flowed 68.96 barrels the first three hours and 44.62 barrels the last three.

The same company's No. 1-20-33 B. E. Ralph estate, Northwestern Andrews wildcat was running 2 1/2-inch tubing in preparation of acidizing with 10,000 gallons. Total depth is 8,351 feet in limestone. (Continued on Page 2)

General H. H. Arnold Receives New Plane At Midland Air Field

General Henry H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army Air Forces, received a new airplane in Midland Thursday morning and departed in it for Washington about 9 a. m. He expected to make the trip in six hours. The ship, a B-25 "Mitchell," was delivered to the general at the Midland Army Air Field and travels approximately 100 miles an hour faster than the "Mitchell," he has used in his travels during the last two years. He arrived here from California, via Las Vegas, Nev., Wednesday evening in the old ship. It also took off for Washington and will remain in service.

Decisive Action Looms

American And Australian Troops Closing In On Strategic Enemy Positions At Mubo In New Guinea

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC (AP)—American and Australian troops in the New Guinea theater, keying their attack to the continuing all-American drive against Munda 700 miles to the east, are closing in on Japanese positions in the Mubo area "for decisive action."

This new offensive, announced in a special statement from General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters, was said by an official spokesman to be designed to clear the long-contested Mubo zone of all enemy troops and pin the Japanese back to their lines around Salamaua, on the Eastern New Guinea shoreline 12 miles to the north.

As a preliminary success, the Allies forces captured Green Hill, one of the key strongpoints in the Mubo defense system, following continued pressure against Japanese positions from both ground and air, the announcement said. In addition, an enemy force of "medium size" has been cut off at Mubo.

Allied patrols were reported engaged in intermittent clashes with the Japanese north of Salamaua, which is only seven miles south of Salamaua, the center of enemy strength in New Guinea.

The pattern of extermination now launched by the Allies at Mubo followed closely that already unfolding before the Japanese air base of Munda, on New Georgia Island in the Central Solomons.

Both had their precedents in the campaigns of last winter to eliminate the enemy from Buna, New Guinea, and from Guadalcanal. The Munda action, at least, had even greater hopes for quick success.

Two Barges Destroyed
The Japanese defenders of Buna, who faced a less formidable American air force, prolonged the fight with men and supplies sneaked to them at night on coastal barges. The enemy tried the barge method Wednesday in the Munda sector, with dire results.

The American air force gave the bomb-pitted enemy fields of the Northern Solomons no chance to get back in shape to come to Munda's aid. Liberators and Flying Fortresses started new fires on airfields at Buka, Kahili and Ballale. Some could be seen 50 miles away.

In the jungle fight for Northeast New Guinea, which has been a slow progress since Buna and the Papan Peninsula fell to the Allies, the Allied air force kept up the job of bombing and strafing the Japanese defending Salamaua.

Arnold Congratulates Honor Cadet Thursday

What General Henry H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army Air Forces, said to Lieut. J. T. Eford, honor cadet of Class 43-10, at the conclusion of graduating exercises was not heard by the audience which crowded the post theater and is known only to the faces of both.

Eford stepped forward briskly to meet the general when it was announced he would present the award. A few words were spoken softly by the commanding general, both men smiled, the cadet saluted and no explanations were offered. Lieutenant Eford is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Eford of Shreveport, La.

Hitler Relinquishes Command On Red Front

LONDON (AP)—A foreign diplomatic source reported Thursday that Adolf Hitler, after having commanded the early phases of the latest German offensive in the Belgorod-Orel sector, had relinquished control of the stalled attack and had returned to Berlin for conferences with his military staff.

The source added that some observers believed Hitler's return to Berlin might mean the end of the German offensive for the time being at least.

Nazi Offensive Drives Checked By Red Soldiers

MOSCOW (AP)—Marshal Stalin's powerful Red armies have halted the attacking Germans everywhere in the Belgorod sector and have dislodged them from several positions with local counterattacks which are gaining momentum daily, dispatches from the Russian front said Thursday.

The Germans meanwhile have discontinued their attacks altogether on the other end of the Kursk salient, where they tried in vain to breach the Orel sector.

At the same time the Red air force resumed its night operations with a fierce attack on the Orel railway junction.

Big Offensive Smashed
(The German Thursday communiqué made no claim of any Nazi advances.)

Pravda said one of the great battles on the Belgorod sector was fought along a Russian-held highway. The battle lasted for three days, the paper reported, with the Germans constantly attempting to push through to the north. After only minute progress the Nazis consolidated their positions and then launched attacks to the east and northeast. They were driven back everywhere, Pravda said, losing 30 tanks in the action.

Eye-witnesses who were in the Belgorod area when the offensive opened said "in all our experience on many fronts we have never seen that fire as intensive as this." The horizon literally "seemed to be on fire," they added.

Maxon Quits OPA In Huff Over Red Tape

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dynamic, red-haired Lou R. Maxon, Detroit advertising executive who bounded into Washington several months ago full of confidence that he was just what the Office of Price Administration needed, bounced right out Thursday with the firm conviction that Houdini himself couldn't untangle OPA's "legalistic red tape."

Maxon's farewell statement Wednesday night, criticized "confusion, German, compromise, miles of legalistic red tape, and the presence of theorists in policy-making positions."

Axis Railways Rush Supplies To Italy

MADRID (AP)—The railways of Southern France and Northern Italy have been practically monopolized since the invasion of Sicily by the movement of Axis military supplies toward Southern Italy and Todt organization workers to the Po Valley and Florence, travelers recently returned from that region report.

The travelers said this move apparently was inspired by the German conviction that if the Sicilian offensive leads the Allies to believe Italy is soft and ripe for invasion their next push will be straight into the heart of Mussolini's mainland.

Arnold Of The Army Air Forces Visits Midland



1911: Piloted first air-mail, Nassau to Hempstead, L. I., 5 miles, 42 m.p.h., after Wright brothers taught him to fly. Air corps was 5 men, 2 planes.

GENIAL, hard-working, hard-flying Gen. Henry Harley Arnold, four-star commander of the Army Air Forces, has been an aviator since the corps numbered himself and four other Wright-taught flyers in 1911. He holds military aviator license No. 2, many medals for flying achievement. "Hap" Arnold has always fought for a bigger air force, and by the end of 1943 he expects to have 2,450,000 men under him. He pioneered machine guns for planes, aerial bombardment, radio observation, distance flights, stratosphere planes, airmail. Born in Gladwyn, Pa., the 56-year-old fiction-writing, cookie-baking "first flyer of the U. S." climbed steadily: West Point '07, director military aeronautics and air defense chief of Panama Canal Zone World War I, 1st pursuit wing commander '33, air corps chief '38, acting deputy chief of staff '40.

Value Of Teamwork In Air Combat Emphasized By General Arnold In Addressing Graduating Class Here

"Our Air Force is getting better and better," General Henry H. Arnold, commanding general of the Army Air Forces, told cadets of the Midland Army Air Field at graduation exercises for Class 43-10 Thursday morning.

Graduates of the nation's number one bombardier school heard the four-star chief of the air forces declare that "the whole scheme of our operations is built around aerial bombardment."

"We are getting better personnel," the general continued. "We are getting better equipment, and we are getting better teamwork."

The value of teamwork was emphasized by General Arnold who urged the new officers who received commissions at the program to continue to "study and think."

More than 9,000 veterans of the war have returned to the United States and more are returning every day to aid in training men for the battles, General Arnold said.

"Benefit by their experiences," he said. "They learned the hard way and they can aid greatly in training work."

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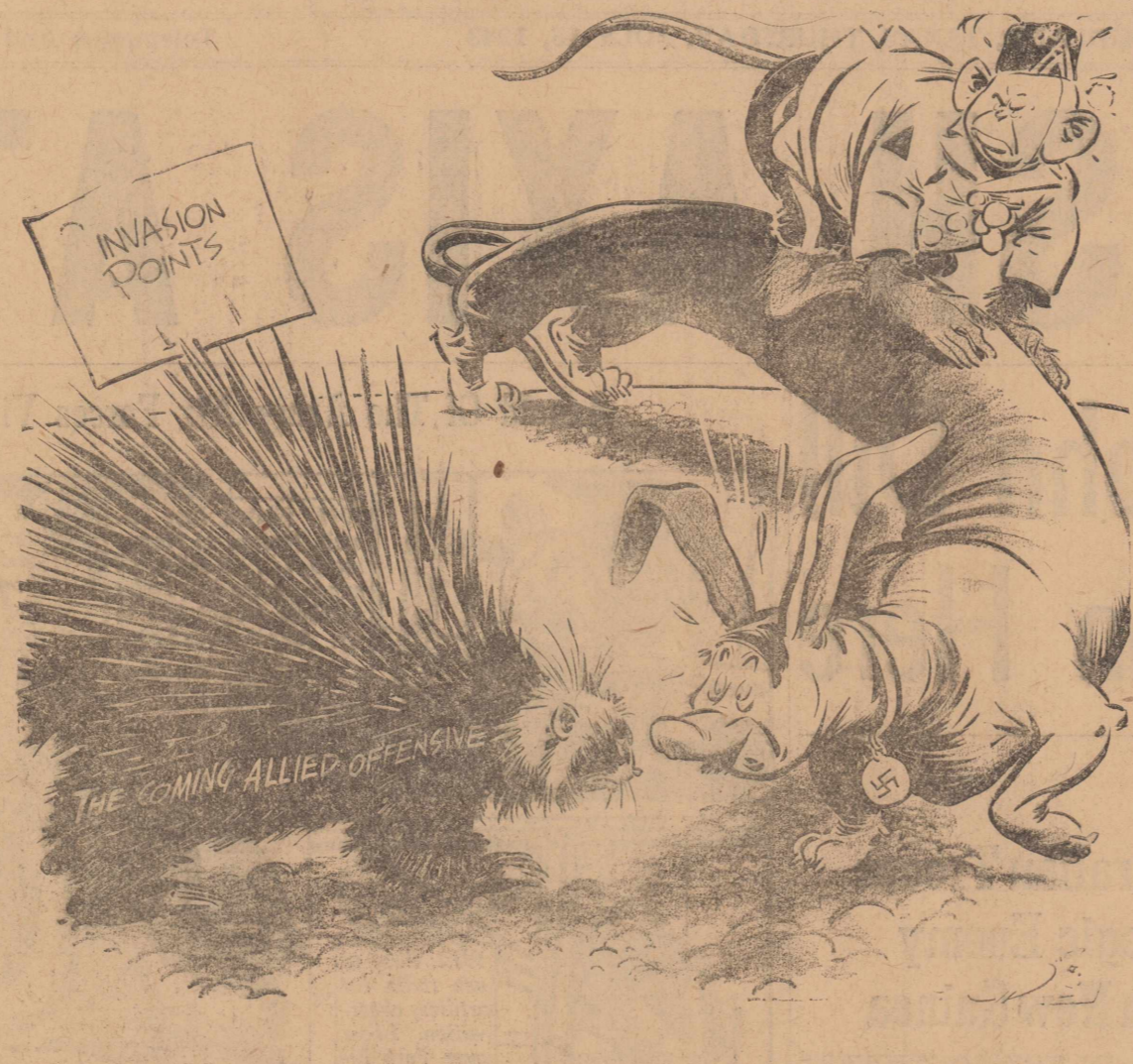

Problem Of Inflation

It is easy to make inflation sound complicated—which it is—and difficult to cut through to the heart of the problem without being superficial and giving erroneous impressions. But laymen, who include most of us, cannot understand the jargon of economists. We have tried, and usually find ourselves more confused in the end than at the beginning.

We must start, always, at the beginning. This is the fact that there is more money in the hands of consumers now than ever before, but there are less goods to be bought than ever before.

Ordinarily, when the supply of money exceeds that of goods, prices begin going up. That attracts new production until there are goods enough for everybody—and eventually too many goods, which starts prices down again.

Such natural action and reaction are impossible at present because the manufacturing capacity which normally would produce goods to satisfy excess demand has been tied up in war production.

We have, then, an estimated \$45,000,000,000 more of money in the hands of consumers, available for the purchase of goods, than there will be goods for which to spend it. That is the Treasury estimate for the 12-month period that began July 1.

With money in their pockets, consumers go to market able and willing to pay high prices for anything they need and want. No system of price fixing and rationing can be sufficiently broad and well enforced to keep prices down under such circumstances.

The program administered by the OPA is designed to prevent price inflation, arising out of this pressure of too much money, by the simple expedient of stopping the auction—controlling the quantity of the scarcer items which any person can buy, and limiting the price that he can pay for it.

This looks simple and workable. So did national prohibition, in 1920. It is simple, but it is not workable. The proof is in the high and ever-mounting cost of most available items; the desperation with which new strata-gems are pulled out of the hat; the continual changes of machinery and personnel; a general public feeling that nobody in Washington knows what it is all about, which breeds disrespect for OPA regulations and attempts, too often successful, to evade them.

Rationing and price ceilings are helping a little, but they haven't solved the problem of inflation.

Mark VI Flops

The Germans expected great things from their 60-ton Mark VI tanks, but these have proven failures on two fronts. In North Africa, Anglo-American defenses knocked out every Mark VI they set eyes on. In Russia the Nazis counted upon weight of armor, particularly in the Tiger tanks, to break through—and they have failed of any decisive result.

American ordnance experts had warned that there is a specific limit to the effective size of tanks. Whether or not the Mark VI exceeds that limit, it does have one deadly weakness. It is powered with an engine incapable of handling the monster's bulk with speed and flexibility. That makes the Mark VI a sitting duck for artillery that can toss shells through any armor that can be put on a self-propelling vehicle.

Two-Way Co-operation

Now that the nation's laundries have been recognized as essential war industries, it is up to householders to co-operate in meeting the reasonable requirements imposed by Washington.

Laundries are to be helped with their labor problems. In return they must discontinue luxury services. This will make the housewife do more of her own work, but will enable her to get by infinitely better than if many of the laundries have to close down for lack of help.

Among interesting points in the correspondence with which President Roosevelt and Chester Davis parted company is a single word in one sentence of the President's letter accepting the food administrator's resignation. It should be read in realization that Roosevelt is very clever with words and well aware of all their connotations.

"It would be unfair to you to insist that you remain . . . when you feel that . . . you cannot wholeheartedly support a program to hold down the cost of living."

Who cannot support a program? Mr. Davis cannot support the President's program, but why the inference that he cannot support a program—which is to say, any program? A sly dig, a venomous dig, an egotistical dig—that exclusive use of "a" as though opposition to the President's formula were synonymous with unwillingness to do anything at all to prevent inflation.

General Arnold, declaring that "our aerial team is the biggest and greatest the world has ever seen," told the newly graduated bombardiers that "you are going out as very important members of that team."

Describing briefly the Battle of the Bismark Sea in which 22 ships entered the engagement and 22 were sunk, he said that record can't be beaten, and proved what the Air Forces can do.

Difficulties of the air war over Germany were mentioned by General Arnold who assisted every theater of war offers different problems.

nation since Monday evening, was isolated temporarily by the furious enemy thrust but the British counterattacked and drove on to Brucoli.

Thursday's communique from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters said the British gained "some miles" Wednesday and that Augusta was now firmly in Allied hands.

Resistance Overcome

Military sources said the battle at Augusta began at dawn when the German tanks hit the British line and broke through temporarily. But Montgomery immediately reformed his lines and by noon not only had knocked the Germans back but had taken Brucoli and Mellini, six miles to the southwest, as well.

This concerted assault by enemy forces in which the crack German armored Hermann Goering Division took part indicated that the Italian and German commanders had shifted the bulk of their forces from positions confronting the Americans in order to block the British path to the east coast.

Heavy Fighting Looms

The Goering outfit previously had received a bad mauling at the hands of the Americans.

Consequently, heavier opposition is expected along the route of the Eighth Army, and the latest developments indicated that the Axis commanders have firmly decided to commit their main forces in battle to hold the British and Canadians below Catania, 35 miles up the coast from Augusta.

Italian divisions, too, were reported making a more determined show of resistance. However, new waves of British and American parachute and glider-borne troops had carried out what the communique called successful operations and it was disclosed that units of the French army which are now operating in the battle zone are Goums, the terror-inspiring pig-tailed warriors who fought so effectively in the Mediterranean coast in Tunisia.

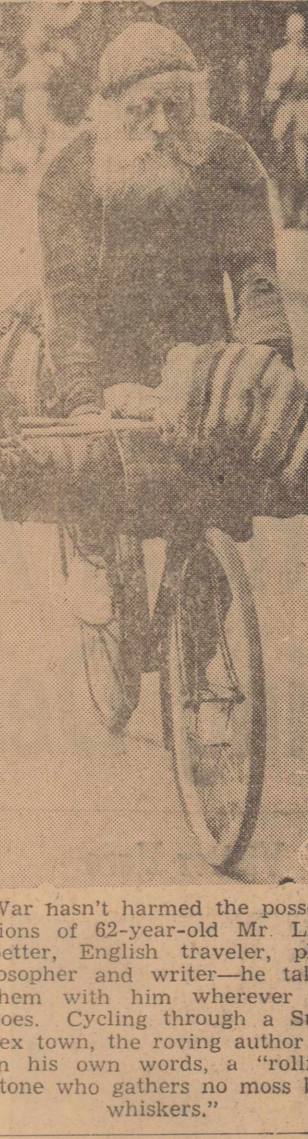

Insurgent Strike In Pennsylvania Ended

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—The insurgent coal strike in Southwestern Pennsylvania collapsed Thursday as a federal grand jury continued an investigation to determine who was responsible for continuing the walk-out which began June 20.

Two mass meetings, with United Mine Workers locals from the dozen mines which had remained idle represented, voted unanimously Wednesday to resume work. All but about 3,500 of the final 10,000 hold-outs went back Wednesday.

Axis Editor Admits Allied Superiority

STOCKHOLM—(AP)—Virginia Gayda, authoritative fascist editor attempting to explain how the Allies effected their landings in Sicily, has admitted that they control the sea and air approaches to the island, Swedish press dispatches from Rome said Thursday.

Other Italian commentators, the dispatches said, acknowledged that the Allies are pouring more men and equipment into Sicily by the hour and some declared that new landings on the west coast of the island could be expected at any moment.

State's Vocational Rehabilitation Plans Explained By Watson

Any citizen disqualified for military service is eligible for vocational rehabilitation, V. B. Watson, representative of the State Board of Education's Vocational Rehabilitation Division, told Midland Rotarians at their meeting Thursday noon in Hotel Scharbauer.

He related the history of the division and explained its program. The division trains physically handicapped persons so they will be self-supporting.

All types of physical disabilities are eligible under the program, Watson said. He told of Midland persons who had been aided by the division.

He said the program for World War II veterans has been started and the state is cooperating with selective service boards and induction centers in getting physical handicapped persons to apply for the training and prepare themselves for war work.

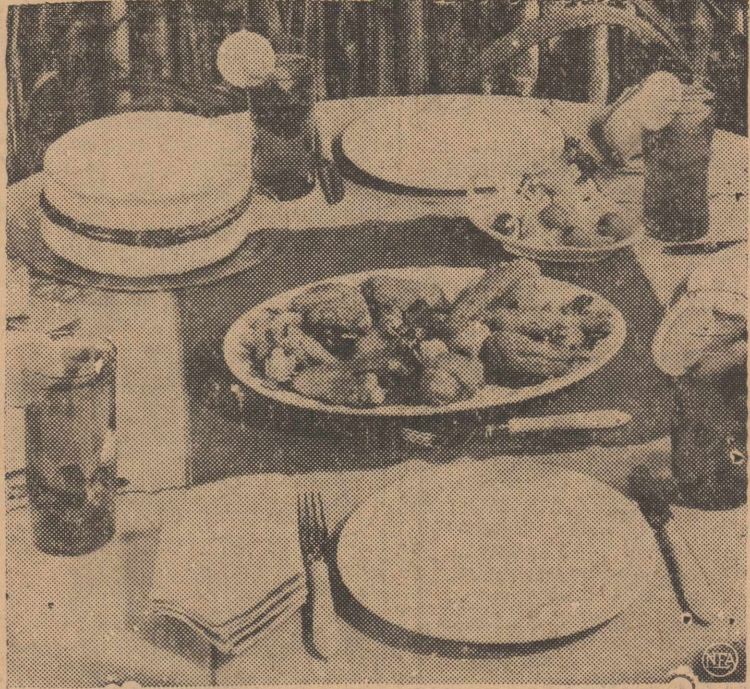

Betsy Beckham Bundy's Advice To The Lovelorn

For The Back Yard Picnic

My young brother, 16, thinks our mother has passed on. He can live at my home. He is here most of the time, and he feels perfectly at home, but my husband does not want him. He is the baby of our family and I do not want to hurt his feelings, but I think he should stay more at the home, even if our mother is here. He has not been working for a long time because he had a sick spell. I do not know how to tell him to leave coming to our home so soon, without offending him for his mother.

Sister. The boy is only a child, and it seems that your husband is a harsh asking the child to stay away. The boy perhaps needs your love since the death of your mother, and if I were you, I would gain these matters to my husband. He is not really hurting anything at your house, is he? If he is inclined to eat with avidity I would go over to the paternal home and get his food and prepare it at his house, so that he would not cost your husband anything. The boy is to be pitied, and it is to be kind, and do not send him away or offend him. Just tell your husband that he is at an age when it is hard for him to adjust to the absence of his mother in the paternal home, and hangs around your home because he feels at home with you.

I want my friend to come to visit me this summer, and I don't want her to stay as long as she can. For reasons over which I have control, I cannot have her stay more than one month. How shall I tell her? A. Just write your friend and let her know that you have been looking forward a long time to that time when you could invite her to come to your house. Tell her that at last you see you can have her from July 25 to August 26, and let her come at that time, and let her please write immediately and let you know when she can come. You might add that your husband has some plans that will take you away about September 1, and that is why you cannot invite her longer. True hospitality comes from the heart. Very few people today, with flattery as it is, would have the heart to come and visit anyone a month. That is a liberal invitation, and she should be pleased with it. You should try to give her your divided attention, and see that she is entertained and that your friends meet her when she first comes as a guest in your home. She probably will not stay over 15 days, which is the usual time for people to accept invitations. There is nothing more crude and narrow minded than to invite a friend for a day or for a night, when she is compelled to travel any distance at all.

Recently I have had my home nearly wrecked by a family of very common people which moved in next door to me. In the first place they are not of the class of people with which I have associated, and the second place they run over my property just as if it were theirs. They even drive their car in my driveway, and their children come up and down my drive until I feel I will go mad. I do not wish to incur their enmity, and there is no other place to which I can move, as there is such a scarcity of houses. Can you advise me just what steps I should use to let them know they could stay on their own premises, and keep out of my yard and garden?

Possible. You could get a fence built on your side of the yard, where they come in. That would fence off our driveway and keep them out. If you do not own the place, suggest to the owner that they will have half the expense of a good fence, in order to keep the dogs and other nuisances out of the yard. He may be pleased at your suggestion, half the expense to him, and you will have the work done at once, and that would solve the problem.

Spiders Are Spinning To Speed War Effort

STATE COLLEGE, PENN. —(AP)—A pair of silk stockings could be made of spider web, but would require about 24,000 feet of fiber. The cost would be prohibitive and probably there is no machinery adapted to making spider silk stockings. But the quality would be surprisingly good. Spider silk is considered extremely strong. When stretched it assumes its original shape, an advantage for stockings. A woven square inch is calculated to have sufficient strength to support a weight of 90,000 pounds. These calculations are from Dr. Stuart W. Frost, professor of economic entomology at the Pennsylvania State College, in a report pointing out how insects are of use in the war.

Spider silk is used for the cross-hairs or lines of optical instruments, and in military sights of various types. Another victory insect produces the galls on plants. Galls are plant tumors. They are a source of tannin and tannic acid which is used in treating burns.

AKRON TRANSPORTATION WORKERS AGAIN STRIKE

AKRON (AP)—An unexpected strike by CIO bus and streetcar operators early Thursday paralyzed mass transportation in this war-busy rubber capital for the second time in two months, depriving thousands of war workers of unusual means of travel to their jobs.

Woman Aviator Has Excellent Record In Wartime Flying

LONDON —(AP)—Leadership of a women's air force and membership on the board of the British Overseas Airways corporation are the latest achievements of attractive Pauline Gower, who is 32 years old.

In 1929 she learned to fly and from then on there was no hesitancy in her choice of a career. She established an air taxi service which operated until the outbreak of the war, by which time her concern had flown 30,000 passengers. In 1939, when the women's section of the Air Transport Auxiliary war formed, Miss Gower was chosen first officer. 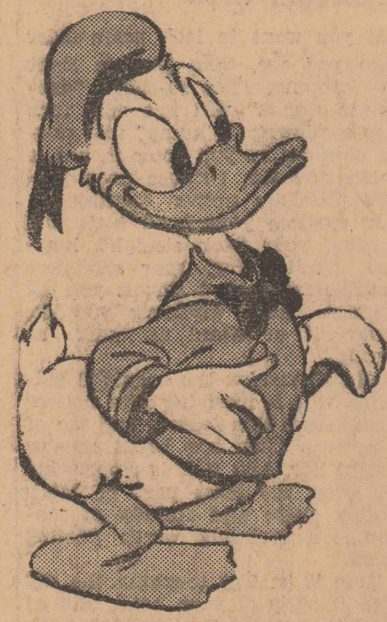
His exclamation was instantaneous, automatic, profane and in English.

"Back The Attack With War Bonds," Is New Slogan

AUSTIN—"Back the Attack With War Bonds!" That Secretary Morgenthau, Jr. of the U. S. Treasury notified Frank Scofield, Texas War Bond Administrator, will be the slogan for the Third War Loan Drive in September.

Morgenthau informed Scofield that this trumpet call to Texans to invest more millions in War Bonds was inspired by the march of United Nations forces against Fortress Europe and Japanese bastions in the Pacific.

"The United Nations are on the march," Morgenthau said. "The first rumblings of the big offensive are being heard in all the Axis nations. This is a great day for us. The real war has now only begun. Everything is at stake."

New Code Laid Down For Textile Dealers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A wartime code of selling practices, aimed at discouraging excess buying and thus heading off the rationing of clothes, was laid down for textile dealers Thursday by War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson.

The declaration of policy dooms for the duration all "scarcity" advertising and such remarks by store clerks as "You had better buy several of these—we may not get any more."

Even the time-honored comparison appeal—"Our price \$8.95, regularly \$9.95"—must be eliminated from advertising unless the sale is a genuine clearance, and the word "sale" must be shunned. The only permitted price comparison is with the government ceiling.

The government will not police stores for enforcement. Compliance is voluntary as long as the plan works.

The policy declaration starts with the flat statement, "The War Production Board has established the fact that there is an adequate supply of textiles to meet essential civilian needs."

Pacific Supply Job Progresses Smoothly

PEARL HARBOR, T. H. (AP)—Problems of supply and reinforcement for American fighting men in the Pacific have been overcome in large measure, says Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, and with "forces of all our services coordinating their operations most successfully," the initiative is certain to remain in American hands.

"New ships and planes and troops trained and fully equipped for battle now are coming into the Pacific in satisfying numbers to insure our retaining the initiative," Nimitz said Wednesday.

Sicily First Of Many Fronts, OWI Head Says

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Allied invasion of Sicily is only "the first of many fronts" of the campaign of Europe, Director Elmer Davis of the Office of War Information said Thursday.

Davis, leaving for New York, from which he will depart shortly for London and possibly North Africa, said he believed Allied commanders "expect" more opposition on the beaches than they got," but cautioned that tough fighting undoubtedly lies ahead.

Henry Fonda Denies Charges Of Divorce

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Screen actor Henry Fonda has denied categorically, through his wife and naval authorities where he is stationed, that he is the father of a daughter born three weeks ago to Mrs. Barbara Thompson, 25-year-old brunet divorcee.

The denials were in answer to Mrs. Thompson's suit asserting Fonda is the father of the girl she has named Sharon Fonda and demanding that he pay \$5,000 medical expenses, \$10,000 attorney fees, \$2,500 court costs and \$2,000 monthly support.

COAL OUTPUT DOWN

HARRISBURG, PA.—(AP)—Pennsylvania produced 6,618,000 less tons of coal in June than in May, according to anthracite and bituminous fields at intervals—than in June, 1942, Richard Maize, acting secretary of mines, reported Thursday.

Turin Suffers Heavy Damage In RAF Raid

BERN—(AP)—As a result of the RAF raid on Turin Monday night that Northern Italian city now is without electric power and is suffering a severe shortage of drinking water, private advices from Italy declared Thursday.

The advices also reported that Typhus had broken out in the city. The Rome radio, in a broadcast recorded by The Associated Press, quoted the Italian communique

Thursday as saying that 402 persons were killed and 601 injured in Monday night's raid on Turin, in Northwestern Italy, by RAF home-based bombers.

DAVIDSON DENIED PARDON
BOISE, IDAHO—(AP)—The Idaho Pardons Board Wednesday denied a pardon to Tobie S. Davidson, former Borger, Texas, city councilman serving a 1 to 10 year prison sentence for voluntary manslaughter.

Newspapers Ordered To Conserve Paper

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Newspapers were ordered by the War Production Board to pull in their belts Thursday on use of newsprint and order only what they consume.

The instructions apply to orders issued for August delivery and henceforth.

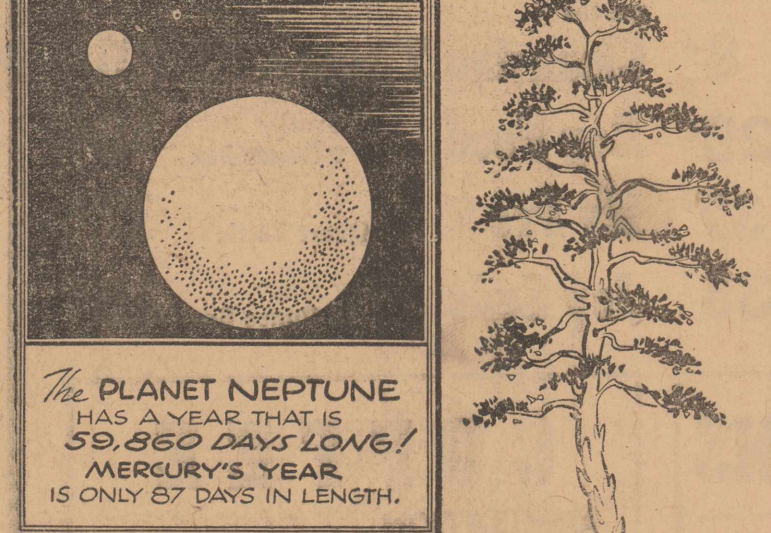

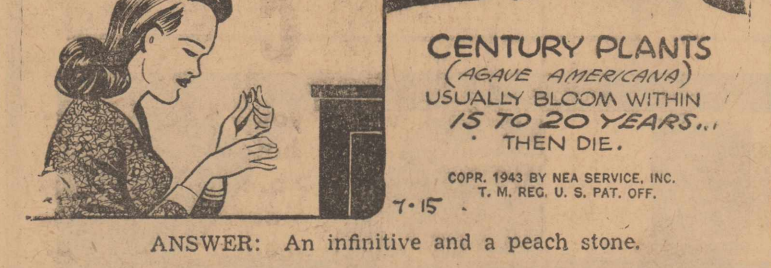

Do good tournament players make good rubber bridge players? No, not always. As a matter of fact, I know several fine tournament players who are consistent losers at rubber bridge. A group of us discussed this recently and I dug out the hand shown today to bring out my point.

A tournament player very likely would play this hand for the maximum and as a result would lose all; while a rubber bridge player would be satisfied either to see the contract, or as declarer to make nine tricks.

When West plays the queen on the opening lead, North must win. A club must be played; East should

play low and the king should win. Now comes the problem. Would you cash all your heart tricks now? If so, you are not a good rubber bridge player. You must cash only three hearts, because three hearts, four clubs, a spade and a diamond make nine.

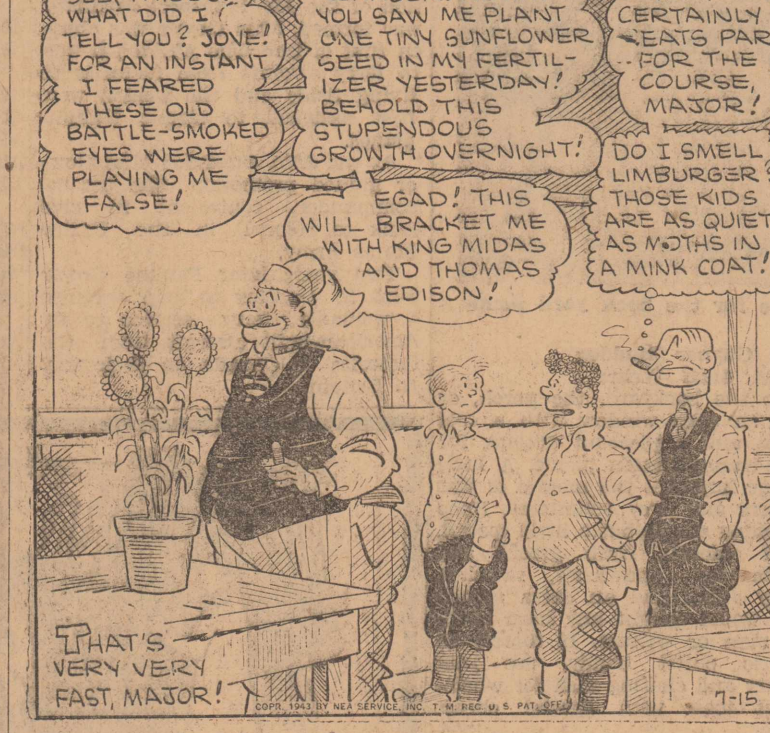
Now let us see how well you would defend the hand. Suppose that North does cash his fourth heart. If you were East, what would you discard?

If you discard anything but the ace of clubs, you are not playing good rubber bridge. If you let go the ace, your partner has the clubs stopped and the declarer can make only eight tricks.

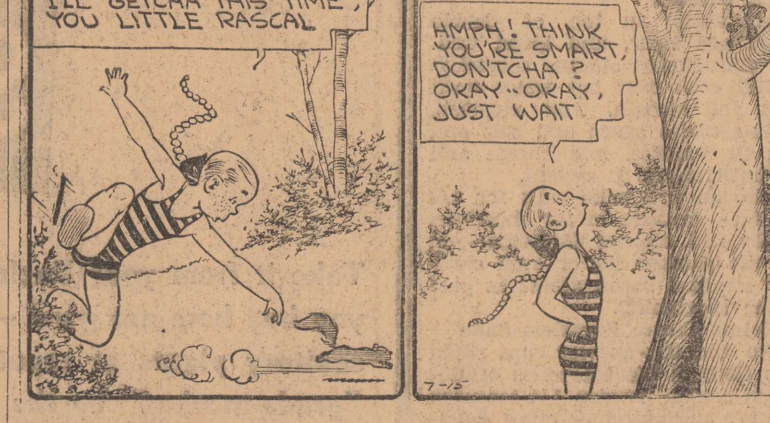

WITH AMERICAN TROOPS IN SICILY — (P) — "It isn't every day in the week that a captain of the engineers captures an Italian general, but I did it," Capt. James Bevecek of Albuquerque, N. M., said Thursday.

His right arm in a sling, injured when he fell from a jeep, Capt. Bevecek recalled how he was standing on a street corner in the town of Comiso.

"Apparently the general recognized my captain's bars and decided he didn't want to surrender to a private," said Bevecek.

"That was okay with me. He had his two sons with him. They were about 12 or 15 years old and didn't look very happy although the general didn't seem too unhappy."

"He saluted me and I returned the salute, and when he raised his hands I knew what he wanted. We walked down to headquarters together with the kids alongside."

"Now I've got something to tell the folks back home. 'Who says the engineers never capture any prisoners, and a general to boot?'" demanded the American.

Atrocity Trials Are Started By Russians
MOSCOW — (P) — Tass, official Soviet news agency, said Thursday that hearings have started in the military trial of 11 persons charged with high treason for complicity in alleged atrocities committed during the German occupation of Krasnodar in the Caucasus.

The news agency declared investigations had established that Russian prisoners had been burned alive, hospital patients massacred, and "many thousands" of citizens suffocated with carbon monoxide in specially equipped motor cars in Krasnodar and the adjacent territory.

Marines Set Record In Economy Of Fire In Downing 13 Japs
SOUTH PACIFIC HEADQUARTERS — (P) — Marine Corps anti-aircraft gunners protecting Rendova Island used only 88 rounds of ammunition to shoot down 12 Japanese bombers and one Zero on the afternoon of July 4, setting what is believed to be a record for economy of fire.

Sgt. William S. Frank, a Marine combat correspondent, said the guns got the range with their first bursts, and within a few minutes had destroyed all but four in a formation of 16 fighter-escorted enemy bombers. American fighter planes knocked down the rest.

The anti-aircraft battery commander, Capt. William M. Tracy of Greenwich, Conn., said of the incident: "I had a hard time making my boys cease firing."

More Steaks For Civilians To Be Available Soon

CHICAGO — (P) — More roast beef and steaks will be available to civilians and the armed forces over the next few months, F. O. Wilson, secretary of the National Livestock Producers Association, asserted Thursday.

But the question worrying cattlemen, Wilson added, was the prospect beyond that period—whether enough cattle would be placed in feed lots throughout the corn belt to produce the steaks which will be wanted this winter and next year.

Wilson, commenting upon news dispatches from Washington saying the OPA was developing a plan to bring about an increase in meat rations, said the price-fixing agency "cannot prevent beef supplies from expanding, even if it wanted to."

OPA Seeks Credit
"The claim of the OPA that it is developing a plan to increase supplies is simply an effort to take credit for the normal expansion in receipts which occurs from mid-July until the end of the year."

Wilson explained that beginning in mid-July cattle which have been fed on grass in the western ranges start coming to market, and this movement continues through November, before frosts kill the grass. This year, he said, there also may be some forced selling of cattle from mid-western feed lots because of the difficulty involved in obtaining corn.

"The big question," Wilson said, "is whether feeders are going to place enough young cattle in their feed-lots to give us the beef we want next year, and OPA threatens to impose ceilings on live animals aren't going to encourage them in that job."

Bobo Newsom Ousted After Feud At Brooklyn

Fireworks still are popping among the Brooklyn Dodgers and that loud noise you heard Wednesday night was Louis Newsom (Bobo) Newsom exploding as he was bounced out of the Brooklyn baseball parlor.

The latest repercussions from the Dodgers' family feud were a statement by Branch Rickey, president of the club, that he would support Manager Leo Durocher to the limit and an announcement that Newsom, the cause celebre of last week's rebellion, had been traded to the St. Louis Browns for a pair of anti-quoting southpaws, Fritz Ostermueler and Archie McKain.

"Don't Wanna"
Newsom, never at loss for words, roared in defiance:
"I don't want to play in St. Louis. I won't play in St. Louis and I'm not going to report."
"I got the dirtiest deal any ball player ever got. I've been the goat all the way through this thing. I guess I'll have to quit and I will quit before reporting to St. Louis. I heard about this only yesterday afternoon and I offered to buy my release from the Brooklyn club, but was refused."

Whether or not the bolterous Bobo goes through with his threat remains to be seen. Changing uniforms is no novelty to him for even before Thursday he was the most traded pitcher in the big leagues and in 13 seasons in the National and American leagues had played variously with Brooklyn, the Chicago Cubs, Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers, Washington Senators and St. Louis Browns. In fact, during his long career he had been with

the Browns, Brooklyn and Washington twice each.

Games Are Resumed
His pitching this year has been the most consistent of any of the Dodger hurlers and his present record of nine victories and four defeats is one of the best in the National League. Although the Dodgers need southpaws, Ostermueler and McKain, both veterans now

relegated to relief roles, cannot be expected to match Newsom's work.

The confusion among the Dodgers may make it difficult for some fans to concentrate on the pennant races again immediately, but nevertheless the major leagues were to resume their schedule Thursday after a three-day intermission for the all-star show. Three contests were on tap in each circuit, with five of the six games being slated at night.

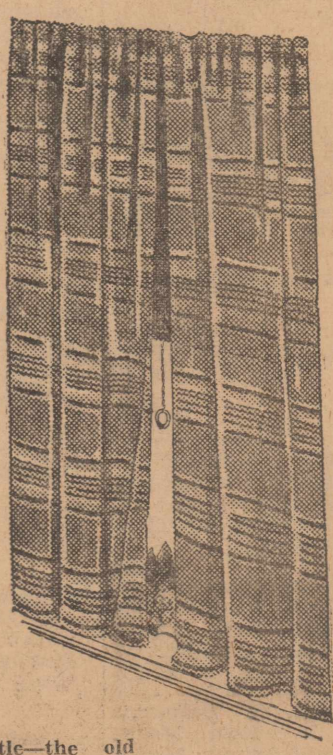
