

Navy Bombards Jap Entire Western End Of Sicily Is Isolated After Fall Of Capital City Positions On Kiska

WASHINGTON —(P)— Heavy guns of the United States Pacific Fleet bombarded Japanese positions on Kisga Island Thursday, the Navy announced Friday, in the seventh surface attack this month against the enemys Aleutians outpost.

The shelling apparently was intended to hasten the day when Kiska defenses will be softened sufficiently for amphibious assault and a final campaign to throw the Japanese out of the Western Aleutians. The surface attack was made by warships which a Navy communique described only as "heavy and light surface units."

Enemy Returns Fire Enemy shore guns returned the fire but none of the Ameriman ships was damaged.

A Navy spokesman said that heavy fleet units could include modern battleships with their 16 inch guns, older capital vessels with their 14 inch guns, or heavy cruisers with their eight inch cannon. All those guns are classed in the Navy as heavy guns. Light surface units include destroyers and light cruisers.

The bombardment followed by 24 hours a raid of Army heavy bombers on the Japanese runway and main camp area on Kiska. Numerous hits were scored and fires started in the air raid. Japs Attack Funafuti

The attack coincided with an Associated Press dispatch from Alaskan headquarters Friday reporting that the Japanese had finally completed a 3,700-foot runway on Kiska. The Liberator bombers obviously intended to undo much of the work accomplished

While these actions were going on in the North Pacific the Japanese threw a force of bombers, the number not reported, against the American base on Funafuti in the Ellice Islands, in the South Central Pacific. The Navy said two bombers were shot down but that while material damage had not been reported there were some personnel casualties among American forces.

FBI Birthday

On this 35th birthday of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, it seems fitting to say what many of us have been thinking for some time now. That is that of all the agencies engaged in the American war effort none has approached so close to perfection as has the FBI.

A certain amount of espionage has occurred, and undoubtedly still is occurring, in spite of the brilliant performance of the G-men. But right down to the moment of writing there is no concrete evidence that Axis agents have got away with even a minimum of organized sabotage. Such destruction as has occurred appears to be traceable largely to cranks and, for the rest, to pro-German individuals acting on their own.

Long before Pearl Harbor, the G-men had made a complete investigation of every potentially dangerous alien. By nightfall of Dec. 8, 1941, a total of 1771 had been rounded up, and since that time arrests have been Shoriages Pose brought up to 13,000.





After cashing the king and queen of diamonds, you must lead your third spade and hope that West will cash another spade trick. When he does, you throw away your nine of diamonds. 

Of Golden Period Killed In Crash

Fabulous Athlete

Death in a fiery plane crash has closed the action-crammed career of Capt. Charlie Paddock of the S. Marines, fabulous figure of the fabulously golden age of sports -the era between 1920 and 1930.

Paddock was killed in line of duty Wednesday near Sitka, Alas-ka, with Maj. Gen. William P. Upshaw, Marine hero, whom he served as aide, and four others.

His death was the third within recent months among the nation's array of outstanding athletes. Ens. Nile Kinnick, all-America grid star at the University of Iowa, and the ountry's No. 1 athlete in 1939, was killed in the Pacific theater of war last month, and in May Lt. Louie Zamperini, who like Paddock wrote track history at the University of Southern California, failed to re turn from a bombing mission in North Africa. First Golden Boy

Paddock was the first of the rolden boys in the track world. He flourished in the decade that produced such sports immortals as Jack Dempsey, Big Bill Tilden. Bobby Jones, Babe Ruth and Red Grange. He was the first "world's




