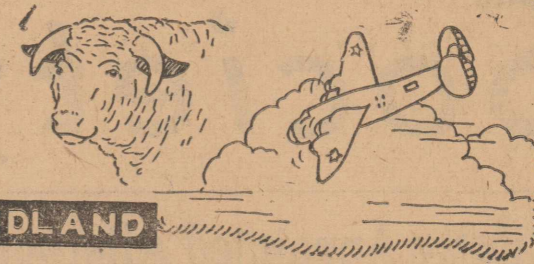

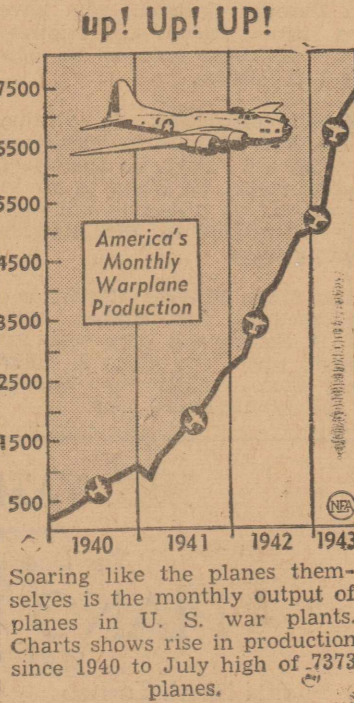

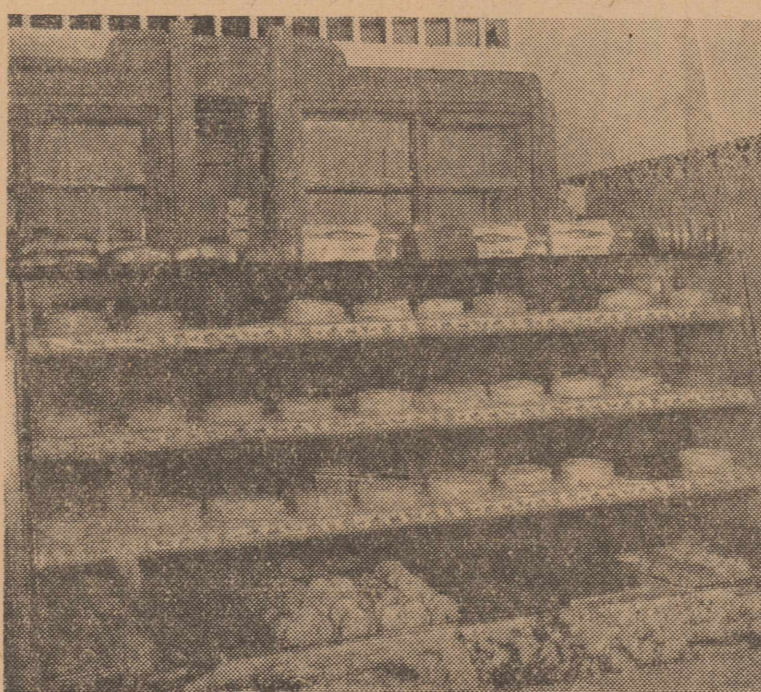

Cafe Customers Become Excited As Officers Nab Kidnapping Suspects

FORT WORTH — (AP) — Police captured two young kidnaping suspects Tuesday night after driving them and a dozen other excited customers from a drive-in cafe with tear gas.

Officers entered the cafe earlier and guns bristled but no shots were fired upon the plea of patrons.

The suspects, 24 and 20, were wanted in the abduction Monday night of Tom Stinson, Ellisville (Young County) merchant.

Robbers Get \$3

Two men forced John Hogan, a rancher near Ellisville, to telephone an order for feed to the merchant. They locked Hogan in a barn and when Stinson arrived at the ranch they took his automobile and forced him to accompany them on a drive to Fort Worth.

Stinson was released here after being robbed of \$3. The car was abandoned about 2 a. m. Tuesday.

Hogan meanwhile released himself and notified Young County officers. They advised Fort Worth police.

Detective Lieutenant Andy Fournier and Detective Jesse W. Montgomery went to the cafe after receiving a tip that two men answering the kidnapers' description were there.

Here's the excitement to which the customers were treated, as related by officers:

Mutual Recognition

The detectives entered the crowded dining room through the kitchen. Montgomery recognized a man in a rear booth as a suspect. The suspect apparently as an officer, whipped out a pistol and shouted:

"Don't you take another step or I'll kill you."

Montgomery replied "You'll just have to go ahead and shoot," took a few steps away and ducked behind a booth as he drew his pistol.

The suspect had been yelling: "Don't anybody leave here, don't anybody come in—they can't get me without a fight. I'll shoot the first one that moves."

Customers in the booths, excited by the gunman's threats, began getting out of their seats. Others moved away from a counter.

Gas Clears Cafe

A moment later, Montgomery said, someone behind him bumped or struck his arm, sending his gun flying under a booth. At the same time, Lieutenant Fournier approached and the gunman leveled his pistol at him.

Montgomery called to Fournier to leave and not shoot it out.

Fournier left and called headquarters for more officers and tear gas. He then stood watch on the place. A nearby resident brought a shotgun to Montgomery, who, meanwhile had made his way back to the kitchen.

Police Sgt. C. S. Hightower and Policeman Bill Hart brought tear gas and one gas shell was fired through a window.

A moment later the gunman and his companion, who was not armed, came staggering out, with hands raised.

Right behind them was Miss Ida (Pat) Mclear, manager of the stand, who held the door open as a dozen customers escaped from the gas-filled dining room.

Aircraft Workers Stay Out Despite Threat From WLB

JOHNSVILLE, PA. — (AP) — A War Labor Board order to end their two-day-old strike immediately and unconditionally met continued resistance Wednesday from workers at the Brewster Aeronautical Corporation's Johnsville plant despite a WLB threat to take all steps "within its authority" to force compliance.

Repeating their demand for the release of four plant guards whose arrest by the Navy precipitated the walkout, officers of United Automobile Workers Aircraft Local 369 (CIO) also insisted on withdrawal of 200 armed Coast Guardsmen from the plant before they would offer to negotiate with the company.

Thomas De Lorenzo, local president, added that it would be "physically impossible" for the membership to act on the WLB order until Thursday morning, when a mass meeting is scheduled, because many of the workers live "a great distance" from the plant.

Strike Despite Warning

The WLB acted after several thousands of the workers at a meeting Tuesday declared themselves on strike despite De Lorenzo's warning that a strike at the plant, which makes Navy airplanes, would be "a technical violation" of the Connally-Smith act.

The meeting also authorized delegates to ask workers at the corporation's Newark, N. J., and Long Island City, N. Y., to strike in sympathy.

While WLB officials in Washington would not say what further action might be taken, the usual next step is to certify the strike to the President for appeal to the workers or seizure of the plant if the work stoppage continues. Criminal penalties of the anti-strike act would become operative if the government took control of the plant.

Patterson Now In South Pacific To See Allied Bases

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC — (AP) — Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson arrived at General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters Wednesday and shortly thereafter predicted that "blows of increasing strength" will not be long delayed in the war against Japan.

He said the twin Allied offensives in the Solomons and on New Guinea were playing a vital part in bringing the Japanese nearer surrender.

In a statement Patterson noted that the United States was producing more than 7,000 planes a month. And he pointed out that "growing striking power" was being sent to the Southwest Pacific war zone.

The undersecretary of war was accompanied by Lt. Gen. William S. Knudsen, Army war production advisor, and high ranking general staff and service of supply officers of the Army.

Besides Patterson and Knudsen, the visiting party included Maj. Gen. Leroy Lutes, director of operations, Service of Supply headquarters; Brig. Gen. Boykin C. Wright, Army Service Forces; and Col. Carl D. Silverthorn, chief, Pacific theater section, operations division, War Department general staff.

Thousands Of Classrooms Will Be Closed This Fall Because Of Serious Shortage Of Teachers

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Thousands of classrooms will be closed and others will be consolidated when school opens this fall because of a teacher shortage.

The military services and war jobs are taking them.

A recent check by the National Education Association showed 75,000 fewer teachers than usual for this time of year had been signed up by the country's elementary and high schools.

Benjamin W. Frazier, U. S. Education Office analyst, expressed belief in an interview that even late sign-ups would leave a shortage of perhaps 15,000 to 25,000. He warned there almost certainly would be a "substantial" increase over last year's 13,000 classroom closings.

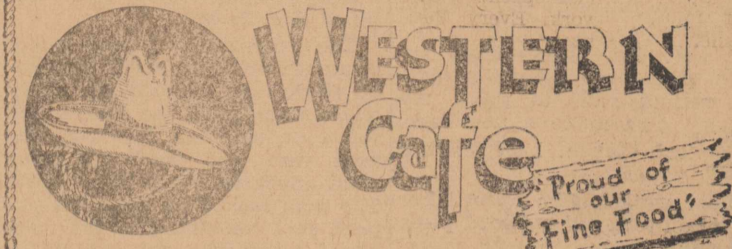
School officials throughout the country driving to overcome their teacher shortages are using these methods:

Army Opens Center Showing Way For Post-War Demobilization Of Fliers

MIAMI BEACH, FLA. — (AP) — The Army Air Force has plans for the battle-seasoned men who will come back after hammering the Germans and the Japanese.

A new command, first of its kind in the United States, has been set to receive these airmen, study them as individuals and send them to jobs for which they are best suited.

No Dumping This Time

At present these arrangements naturally will be fighting jobs. But the command, looking forward to victory, is preparing to become the nucleus of demobilization machinery.

"In 1918, the soldiers were dumped back into civilian life," said Col. Luther L. Hill, commanding officer of the Miami Beach station, Army Air Forces Redistribution Center. "It won't happen that way this time."

Col. Hill said the center, with stations here, at Atlantic City and another to be established in the West, follows closely a pattern laid down recently by President Roosevelt.

"Our immediate job," he declared, "is to institute a system of

tation of officers and men on overseas duty."

Screening Process

He said each returning flyer, officer or enlisted man, will go to one of the stations for a careful personal study before being reassigned.

"Our organization will provide a screening process," he said. "Each man fits best somewhere, and we will find that place. He will have a period of recreation to iron out the kinks left by rugged combat duty. While he is resting and realigning himself, we will give him a thorough physical check, and an examination by classification experts.

"There will be no rules. Every man will be treated as an individual. We want them to know the air force is thinking of them and their future."

RAF Planes Attack Jap Communications

NEW DELHI — (AP) — RAF Beaufighters and Hurricanes on offensive patrol along the Irrawaddy and Lower Chindwin Rivers in Burma struck at Japanese shipping and rail communications Tuesday, an Allied communique announced Wednesday.

Thirteen loaded sampans were sunk and a number of others were damaged in the sweeps. Others were damaged on the Kaladan River. Beaufighters wrecked a locomotive in a cannon attack near Thazi.

Vengeance dive bombers attacked a Japanese supply depot at Bagan south of Buthadanga and hits were scored in the target area.

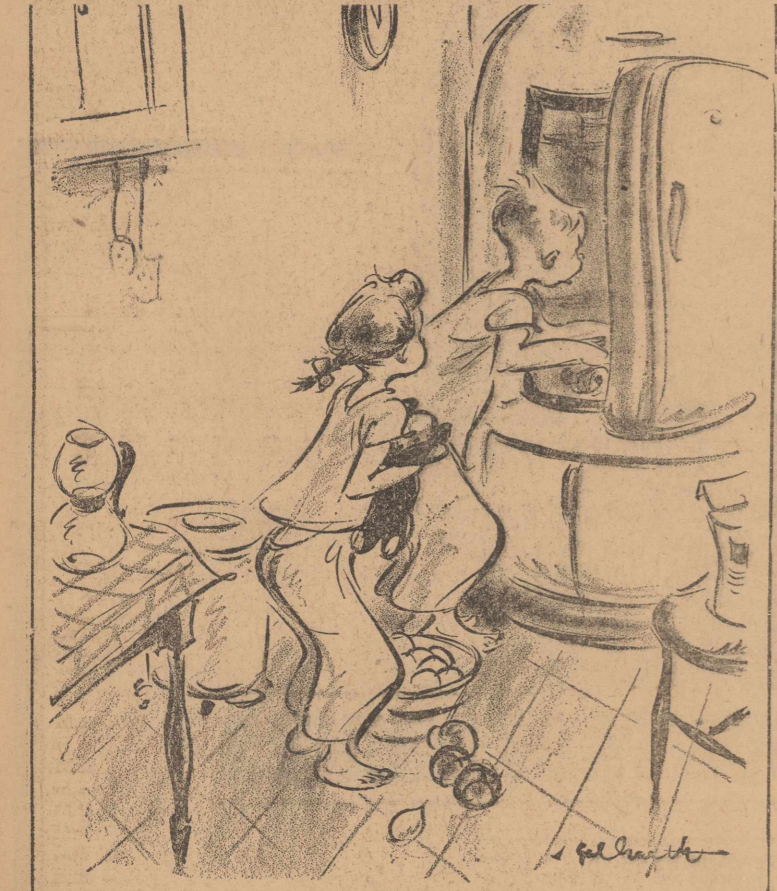

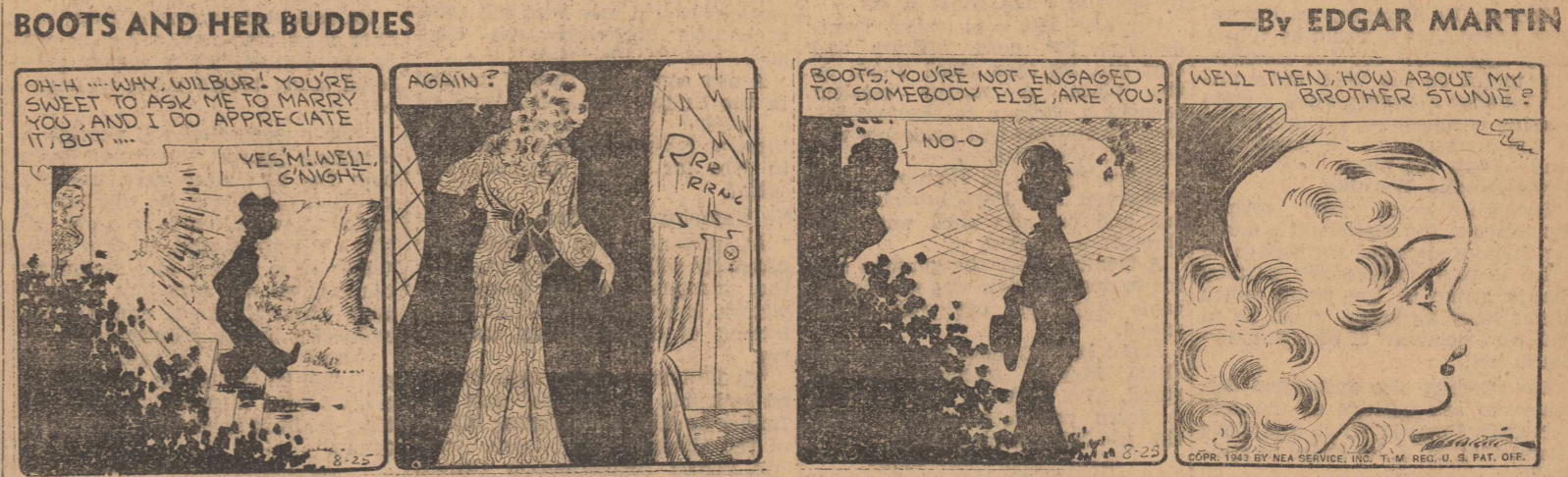


McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

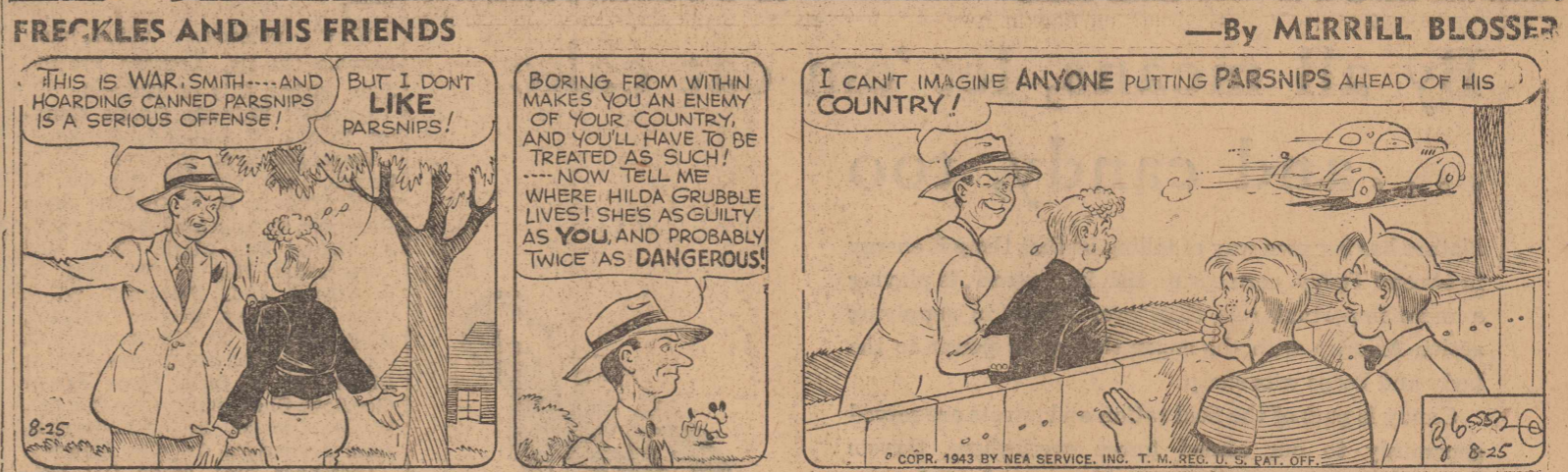

Pressure Bears Down On Yanks Seeking Record

The heat is on the New York Yankees.

Before you take another look at the baseball standings, give us time to explain that it isn't pennant pressure but the pressure of pride which is bearing heavily on the American League champions.

They need to win a doubleheader at Detroit Wednesday to take the seven-game series and extend their record performance to victory in 12 consecutive series.

This is a feat never accomplished even by the famous Yankees of other years and is a dearly sought goal by the 1943 club, which has been described as the weakest ever managed by Marse Joe McCarthy.

The Yankees got themselves into a hole by losing a doubleheader to the Tigers Sunday and until now they never have been able to work themselves out of it. They won a single game Monday and Tuesday took the first half of a double bill 2-1 with Spurgeon (Spud) Chandler pitching four-hit ball.

The Yankees have the only record-breaking streak now in existence in the American League. The Philadelphia Athletics had one of a different kind going strong until Tuesday night, but after losing the first part of a doubleheader to the Chicago White Sox 6-5 for their 20th straight setback, the A's finally submitted to the law of averages and won the second game 8-1.

Washington strengthened its grasp on second place by beating the St. Louis Browns 10-4 as Clayton Heafner pitched four-hit ball.

The Boston Red Sox and Cleveland Indians divided, with Cleveland capturing the first game 5-2 on Allie Reynolds' five-hit hurling and the Red Sox surging back to a 7-0 shutout with Fieber (Dick) Newsome producing a two-hit masterpiece.

In the National League the St. Louis Cardinals edged out the Boston Braves 1-9 when Stan Musial tripled a run home in the tenth inning to decide what had been a spectacular, scoreless pitching duel between Mort Cooper and Al Javery.

Truett (Rip) Sewell was given his 19th success against five defeats as the Pirates took a slugfests session from the Brooklyn Dodgers 9-6 in a twilight game abbreviated to six innings.

A two-run ninth-inning homer by Buster Maynard gave the New York Giants an 8-7 decision over the Chicago Cubs in the first game of a doubleheader but Ed Hanzewski pitched a four-hitter to win the nightcap 6-1 for the Bruins and Cincinnati completed a sweep of its series at Philadelphia with a 4-2 triumph in a night game.

Farmers Will Get More Shells For Destroying Pests

WASHINGTON—(P)—War has put hunting back on its coonskin cap. Long Tom rifle basis with powder—thrifty, sharp-shooting Nimrods going gunning—not for sport—but to fill the family larder with fresh meat.

Sportsmen Get Shells

Those who take advantage of the order will get an extra 100 rounds of 22 calibre cartridges, 20 rounds of center fire rifle ammunition and 25 rounds of shotgun shells of any gauge in addition to their regular quarterly quotas.

Simultaneously, WPB advised sportsmen hunters that they would be allowed 50 rounds of 22 cartridges, 20 rounds of center fire ammunition and 25 rounds of shotgun shells after the needs of the farmers and ranchers have been met.
