

BATTLE FOR ROME UNDERWAY

Bombardment Of Wake Paves Way For New Smashes

Four Related Moves Raises Speculation Of New U. S. Attacks

Japanese defenses on stolen Wake Island appeared overwhelmed Thursday after a heavy naval bombardment and carrier plane bombing Tuesday of the tiny Pacific speck which the Japanese converted into a strong air base.

The island, on which a gallant band of Marines held out against violent attack until Dec. 22, 1941, lies 2,300 miles west of Hawaii, 1,500 miles northeast of Guam and 1,300 miles from the great Japanese naval base of Truk, north of the Solomons and New Guinea where Gen. Douglas MacArthur was painfully amputating bases from the Japanese octopus, Rear Adm. Alfred E. Montgomery was in command of the raiding party.

The Navy withheld details until the task force returns. The blow at Wake followed rather closely four apparently related moves in the Central Pacific: 1. A carrier plane bombardment of Marcus Island, between Wake and Japan, on August 30. 2. A carrier bombing of Tarawa and other principal bases of the Gilbert Islands on Sept. 18 and 19. 3. The seizure of Nanumea, the extreme northern island of the Ellice Archipelago, by Marines on Sept. 4.

New Smash Anticipated Lumped together, the actions suggested that the United States Pacific Fleet was sparring in the preliminaries of a smash into Japan's holdings in the center of her far-flung Pacific holdings—possibly at the Gilberts and Marshall Islands which bar the direct approach to Truk.

The reduction of Truk would imperil the entire Japanese hold on the South and Southwest Pacific, including the Dutch East Indies, New Britain, New Guinea, Timor, and Malaya.

British Continue Fighting For Coo

CAIRO —(AP)— A British communiqué acknowledged Thursday that German forces, striking back fiercely against the threat to their "iron ring" defenses of the Aegean, had captured a number of landing grounds on Coo Island but declared that resistance was continuing on the Dodecanese Island.

The Germans control the town of Coo, the Middle East communiqué said. RAF bombers continued to pound German airfields on the nearby island of Rhodes and Crete Tuesday night.

Direct hits were scored on hangars and fires and explosions were caused at Maritza, on Rhodes, an enemy encampment near Kattavia and the airfield at Kastelli on Crete was bombed.

More Than 500 Persons Drown As American Submarine Sinks Ferry Steamer During Daring Raid In Jap Waters

An Allied submarine, slipping boldly into the waters off Japan's west coast, sank a Japanese steamer Tuesday in an attack which took the lives of more than 500 persons, Tokyo broadcasts declared Thursday. There is little doubt that the submarine was American.

The steamer, which plied between Shimonoseki on the principal Japanese island of Honshu and Fusan, Korea, was on its regular ferry run, according to Domei news agency broadcast quoting a railway ministry announcement.

The Domei broadcast, as recorded by The Associated Press, said the steamer was the Konron Maru, while a Tokyo broadcast of the railway ministry announcement, recorded and translated from the Japanese by U. S. government monitors, gave the name as Hon-don Maru.

Army Casualties In Italy Total Only 511 Killed

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Secretary Stimson reported Thursday that Army casualties during the four weeks since bitterly-contested landings began at Salerno, Italy, total 8,307, of whom only 511 now are listed as killed in action.

The war secretary told his press conference that 5,428 American soldiers have been wounded in the campaign on the Italian mainland, and 2,368 are missing.

British Subs Sink Six German Ships In Mediterranean

LONDON —(AP)— British submarines operating in the Mediterranean have sunk six German or German-controlled ships and damaged two others, the Admiralty announced Thursday.

British Beat Back Powerful German Infantry And Armor Attacks Along Adriatic Only 130 Miles From Rome

Two Destroyers Bring Up Naval Artillery To Aid Of Montgomery's Forces At Termoli; American Fifth Army Continues To Advance

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, ALGIERS — (AP) —

The battle for Rome has begun with the Germans launching powerful infantry and armored attacks in their Termoli area along the Adriatic where the Eighth Army of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery stands 130 miles east and slightly north of the capital city.

Official announcements at Allied headquarters Thursday said the Germans had shifted an entire armored division from the west side of the peninsula and thrown it into an onslaught against Montgomery's forces.

Mud Conditions Hamper Russian Drive On Nazis

MOSCOW —(AP)— The Germans clung tenaciously to their strong defensive positions along the entire Russian front Thursday, while general mud and his commanders, rain and flood, gave serious combat to the Red Army.

Canadians In Uniform

It was unfortunate that word about Canada's intention to disband some of her home protection units had to reach the United States just when we were all upset about the father draft. Under such circumstances it may have been inevitable that some protagonists should have misunderstood what is happening in Canada.

The Dominion is not reducing her armed forces destined for overseas duty. On the contrary, she is acting to expand them at the expense of the home guard. The mixup arises, perhaps, because not all Americans understand how the Canadian forces are raised.

Up to now Canada has produced, out of a population of about 11,500,000 some 700,000 men for overseas duty. These are all volunteers. No drafted men are available for service outside the continent.

Canada's 700,000-man volunteer army for overseas duty is as impressive in view of her population, as though we had raised 8,400,000 volunteers on this side of the border. We haven't done that. We haven't raised that many soldiers by all methods, and we do not propose to do so. Considering other services, we just about match Canada's contribution.

The disbanding that created so much interest was of drafted home defense units. Two divisions are affected. The purpose is to free these men for two purposes which now, with the Axis definitely on the defensive, appear more important than home defense. Some will be induced, by application of gentle pressure, to enlist for overseas service. The rest will be put into war production.

These home defense units never have been very stable affairs. Their personnel has changed rapidly, as their all the scores of thousands who have been called for in members felt the urge to get into actual fighting. With duction, it never has been found possible to keep the home defense outfits filled up because so many, faced with the necessity for donning uniforms, have decided they would rather get into the real war.

Canada's disbanding of these two divisions has nothing to do with our own argument over the drafting of fathers. It's up to us to stand on our own feet, in that controversy, and decide for ourselves whether 5,700,000 men in the United States do or do not constitute adequate backing for 2,000,000 men abroad.

Permanent Regimentation

Paternalism in government must be abolished. Having survived a great depression and war, this nation cannot be expected to weather another emergency if we follow the same course of excessive spending and taxing. These are the statements of W. Linn Hemingway, president of the American Bankers Association.

He said, "A continuation of government deficits coupled with bureaucratic control of the daily lives of our people can only lead to state socialism and dictatorship, the very thing we are fighting to destroy in other lands. We already have instances of the encroachment of government on the private enterprise system under the guise of emergency in the establishment of government lending agencies. There is danger of these becoming permanent."

Thus we have another group of citizens voicing the common fear that regimentation, a process of war, may become a fixture in the future economy of this nation.

Clearing The Track

It has remained for Joseph Eastman, director of the Office of Defense Transportation for the government, to recognize officially the fact that a lot of our manpower shortage is the result of rules and regulations that were often devised for the specific purpose of making two jobs where one was sufficient.

Unless vigorous remedies are undertaken at once, the country is headed for a crisis in railroad manpower, says Eastman. In a 13-point program to forestall such a crisis, he recommends as an important essential the suspension for the duration in certain circumstances of full crew laws and engine mileage limitations.

Eastman recognizes that the railroads have gone the limit in expanding service under many restrictions, and that the time has come to remove any artificial barriers which block the fullest use of available manpower and equipment in this critical period.

This should be hailed by both labor and management as an opportunity to once more demonstrate that America's rail transportation system and its workers can and will conquer problems as they arise. As a war emergency, it is to be hoped the suggestion of Eastman will be considered in this light.

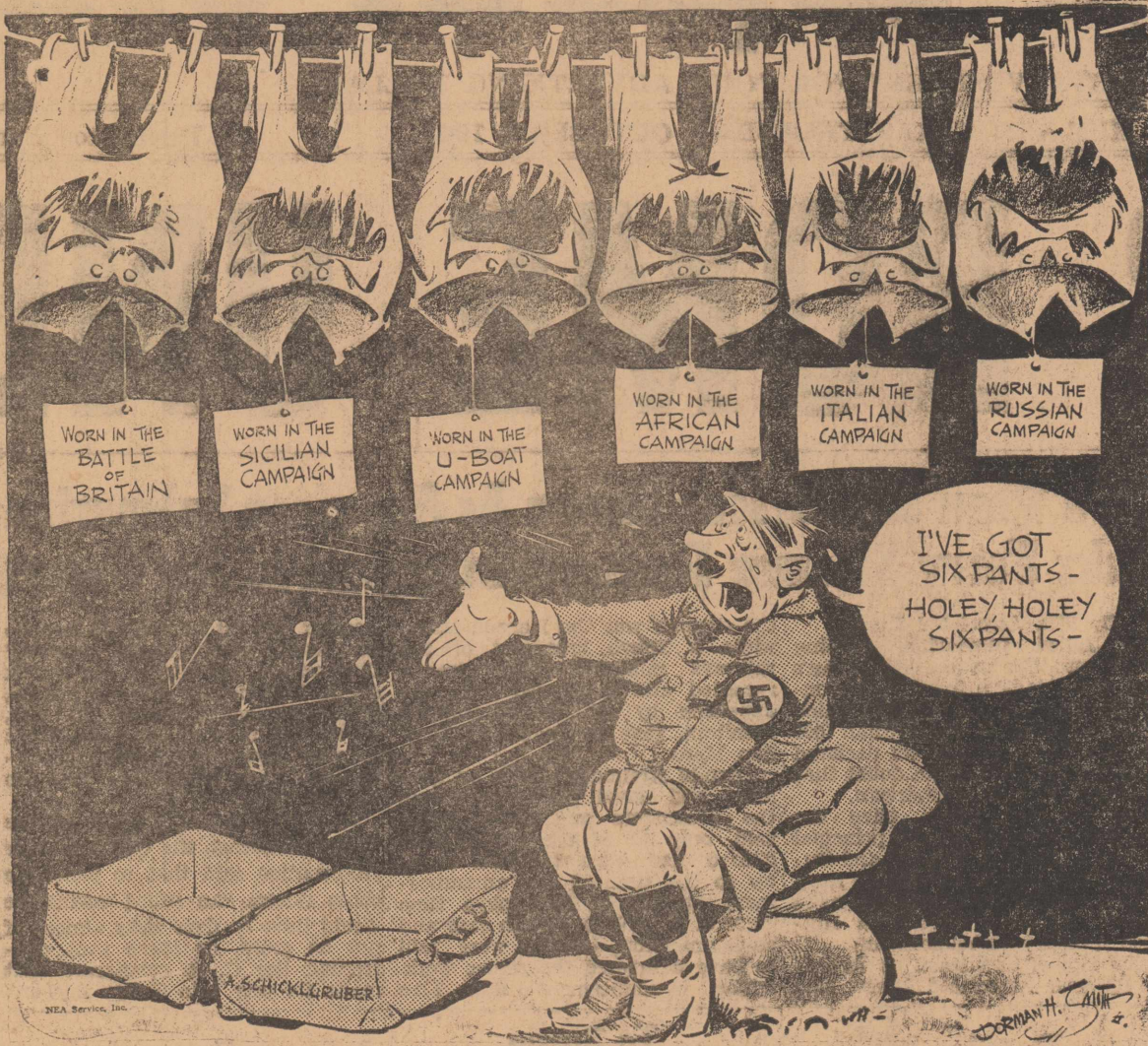

British Women Stock Up On 'Food For Attack' In Fifth Winter Of War; Victory Still Comes First With Them

LONDON — Sinatras may come and go in America, but to British housewives, the number one English glamour boy will always be Lord Woolton—as long as he is minister of food.

Facing their fifth winter of war, English housewives appreciate his effort to insure them a fair share of edibles and his attempt to tackle the nation's food problem from their point of view.

Rations still tight
They realize that before Lord Woolton announced, as he had to recently, that the food ration could not be increased, because "we are planning for attack, and that means we must build up stocks of food over and above a safe margin for civilian consumption," he had done everything possible to get more for them. But victory still comes first with the food minister

—and it does with British women, too.

So rations are still tight and it is still necessary to get every bit of value out of the food that is available. Some of the suggestions made by the Food Ministry might prove helpful to American housewives, as well as to English, during this winter of almost universal shortages. The Food Ministry recommends:

Follow The Rules
Don't go to work or start the day without breakfast. Forget the usual juice and coffee breakfast and eat something sustaining such as beans, potatoes, fish, or Lend-Lease dried eggs. If you like fruit, home preserves can come in to eke out rationed prunes, figs and other dried fruit.

Do, especially if you're an early riser, eat a substantial mid-morning snack of raw cabbage or grated carrot sandwich.

Don't eat a sandwich and pie for your mid-day meal, and don't eat at your work bench. You need the break.

Do lunch at the canteen and eat something hot. This stretches ration points at home and gives the housewife a relief from having to plan new sandwich fillings.

Do eat at least three vegetables a day as long as they are available. Eat more pulses (the edible seeds of peas, beans and other similar vegetables).

Eat For Vitamins
Do make the fullest possible use of your dried milk, especially in desserts.

Do serve thick vegetable soups at least once a day, preferably at night.

Do include raw cabbage in your nightly salad since it has more vitamin C than lettuce. Eat more parsley and raw sprouts for the same reason. Remember vitamin C improves the complexion, puts a sparkle in your eye, preserves the figure and helps ward off infection, especially colds.

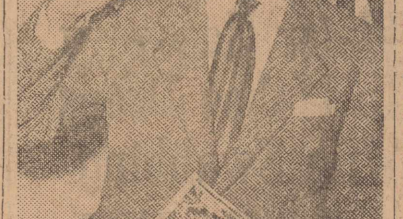

German Spy Ring Cleaned Up With Arrests Of Seven

NEWARK, N. J. — (AP) — Federal investigation of a pre-war Nazi spy ring and a German-American organization was "cleaned up" Thursday. Assistant United States Attorney Thom Lord said, with the arrest of seven naturalized citizens of German birth, two of them soldiers.

The seven were charged in a sealed indictment opened here Wednesday with conspiring to transmit to the German Reich, in violation of the espionage act, "documents, writings, code books, sketches, photographs, blue prints, maps x x x to the injury of the United States."

Among those named as defendants were three men who were included Tuesday in a separate indictment which charged them and 24 other persons with illegally conspiring to act as agents of the German government.

Soldiers Arrested
They were Joseph Benedict Liebelein, 29-year-old American soldier arrested at Camp Ripley, Minn.; Carl Kranz, 43, of Rochester, N. Y.; and Fritz Schroeder, 43, former national leader of the Vocational League.

Also named in the indictment were Hans Phillip Koenig, 40, who was arrested at Fort Dix, N. J., where he was stationed in the army; Gustav Wilhelm Kaercher, 47, of Westwood, N. J., a former German army oberleutnant; Felix Gustav Adolph Jahrike, 41, New York; and Eric Heinrich Wedemeyer, 41, of Floral Park, N. Y.

The indictment said the league served as a "clearing house" for information from April, 1939, to December 7, 1941, and was directed by German agents overseas.

Use Of Military Money Questioned By Senator Clark

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Issuance of Allied military money in North Africa, Sicily and Italy was challenged Thursday by Senator Clark (D-Mo) as "additional appropriations for the Army without any action by Congress."

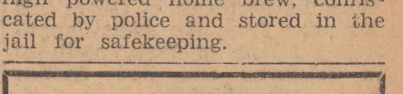
Clark, questioning the legality of using currency that bears no promise of repayment, said: "The best construction that can be put on it is that it is an additional appropriation for the Army without any action by Congress."

He said it appeared the Army was using the cash to buy supplies and that natives were accepting it readily.

Senator Lodge (R-Mass), one of five members who made an inspection tour of war zones, sounded a warning note about the currency in a Senate speech earlier in the week. He said he hoped it bore no promise of future payment that could not be fulfilled by the United States. This provoked sharp questioning of Treasury Secretary Morgenthau when he outlined a proposal for the establishment of an international bank for post war stabilization of the world's currencies.

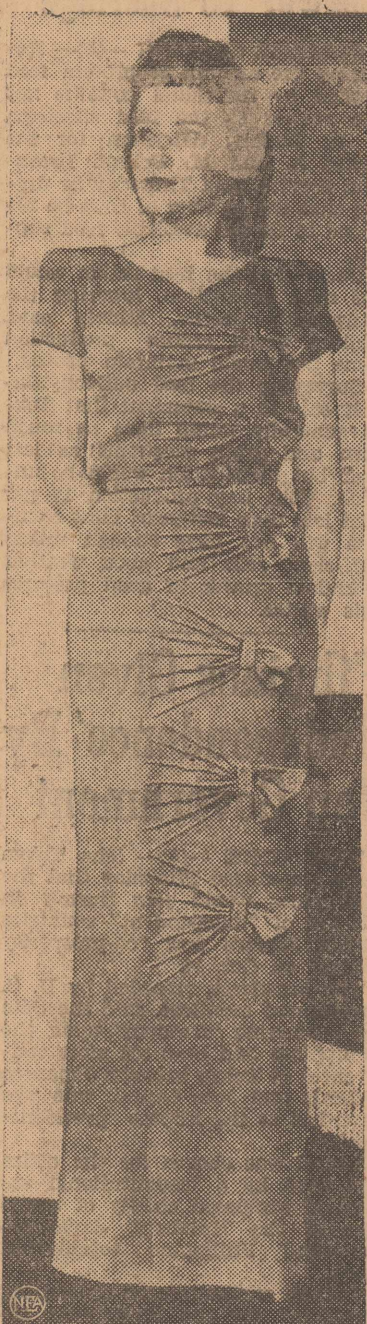

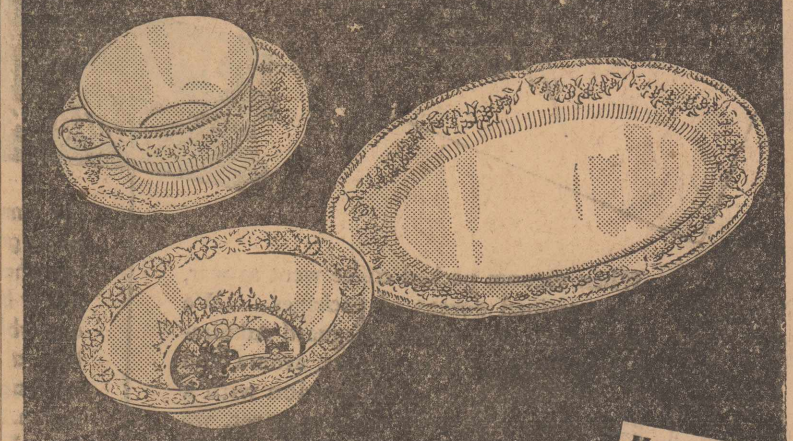

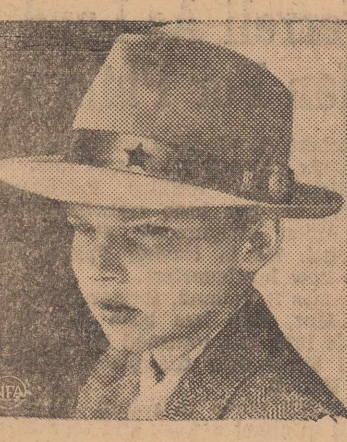

The War Today— Japs Should Get Promise Of Full U. S. Retribution

By DEWITT MACKENZIE Associated Press War Analyst One respectfully submits that it would have a salutary effect the world around if we could have a special official declaration that the heaviest punishment compatible with civilized practice will be dealt out to all Japanese who had anything to do with the beheading of the captive Allied airman in the Pacific theater, and that any other instances of such savagery will meet similar retribution.

It would be a great thing for American morale in particular and for Allied morale in general, not only military but civilian. It would create both moral and physical fear in the camp of a brutish enemy with whom we still have to come to full grips.

Oh, yes, even the throwbacks to barbarism among the Japs experience fear—fear not only for their hides but, strangely enough, for their reputations among respectable peoples. President Roosevelt said that the worst thing he could devise in the way of comment on the beheading was to call the Nipponese uncivilized for perpetrating this act, because nothing gets under the skin of a Japanese more than to be called barbaric.

Japs Deny Atrocity F. D. E. was very right, as was demonstrated a few hours later when the Japs rushed to the radio and broadcast a denial that they had committed such an atrocity. Their pride had been given a slap in the face of the world's reaction to this horror.

Of course, an official announcement that we shall exact grim vengeance for atrocities would be in effect a reiteration of our State Department's strong note to Japan last April after confirming the execution of American airmen who bombed Tokyo in 1942. This note, which the State Department says applies to the present case—warned that for such "acts of criminal barbarity inflicted on American prisoners" the United States government "will visit upon the officers of the Japanese government responsible for such uncivilized and inhuman acts the punishment they deserve."

Personalities Are Discussed By Gilbert In Talk To Rotarians

President Franklin D. Roosevelt was described as a "master political expert," by Dr. Dan Gilbert in an address to the Midland Rotary Club Thursday noon in Hotel Scarborough.

Gilbert, director of the Christian Press Bureau in Washington, asserted the President's "greatest ability is to find out which way the wind is blowing."

In Gilbert's discussion of personalities in politics, he said "a political platform is no better than the personality behind it."

Dr. Gilbert is here delivering a series of lectures at the First Baptist Church.

He said Roosevelt never would be a dictator because he never dares to defy public opinion in a lone range enterprise, although his one objective is to bring more power to the executive branch of government.

Gilbert described Roosevelt as an "experimentalist," said he had an "unfailing weakness for yes men," and that he surrounds himself with "yes men."

Hull Is Exception The exception, the speaker continued, is Secretary of State Hull. Gilbert described Mrs. Roosevelt as a "very clever and very shrewd politician," who is working "to advance socialism."

He said Dendell Wilkie is "vastly overrated" and "not presidential timber."

All London, Gilbert asserted, lacks vision, but he praised Jim Farley as a "fine character with the best thinking machine and memory in the nation's capitol."

Gilbert asserted Gov. Tom Dewey of New York is the outstanding man for Republican presidential timber, described Herbert Hoover as "the most misunderstood man in political life," and branded Harry Hopkins "a court jester."

He also discussed Vice President Henry Wallace, Senator Byrd, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, Senator W. Lee O'Daniel, John L. Lewis and the supreme court.

Depend On Congress Concluding his "impressions in Washington," he asserted "Congress is the first line of defense of constitutional government and we must depend on Congress."

At the conclusion of the address, Ily Pratt, club secretary, suggested that a speaker for the "other side" also be given an opportunity to address the club.

Fire Chief Luther Tidwell called the attention of Rotarians to the Fire Prevention Week program and Pratt, speaking for the club, thanked Tidwell for his 32 years of faithful, volunteer service as fire chief in Midland.

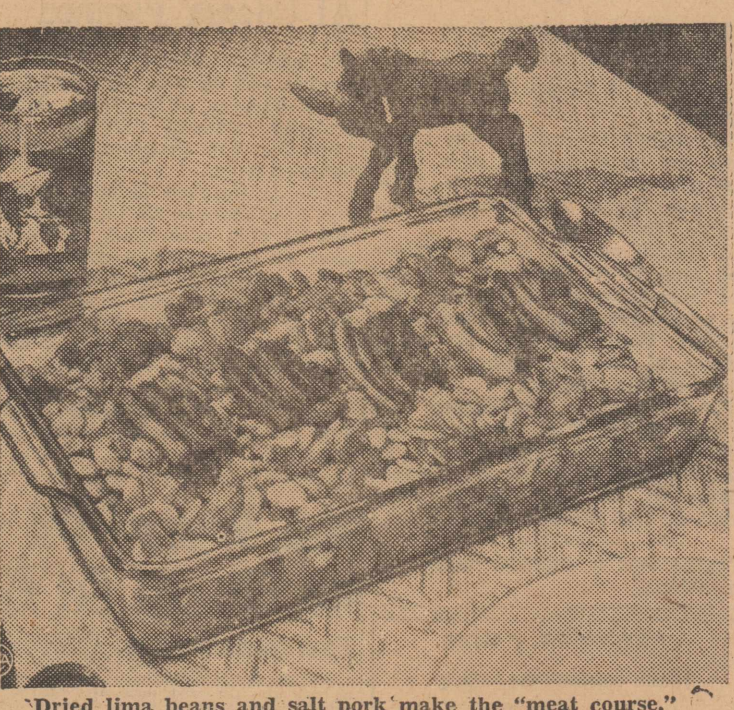
Lawrence Evans was elected to membership in the club.

Cutting Protein Feed Ration For Cows Not Answer To Shortage

COLLEGE STATION — (AP) — Reducing the amount of protein feed needed by individual cows is not the answer to the feed shortage, E. R. Eudaly, dairyman for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, said Thursday in urging that the number of cows be reduced to fit the available feed supply.

Decreasing the feed ration would cut milk production, lowering the dairyman's profits, Eudaly said. Culling would reduce production some but would maintain profits. Surveying the feed outlook, Eudaly said in a statement that Texas generally would have as much corn and grain sorghums as last year but distribution would be uneven. With hay production 12 per cent less than last year, most counties will not have enough unless sufficient rain and good weather stimulate growth of good pastures this winter.

Filipinos Given 'Independence' By Jap Government

NEW YORK — (AP) — The Tokyo radio announced Thursday that the Philippines would join Burma on the list of "independent" countries within Japan's new "co-prosperity sphere" on Oct. 14.

The broadcast, recorded by U. S. government monitors, said the date for conferring "freedom" upon the Philippines had been set after conferences at Tokyo between Japanese officials and Jose Laurel, who was described as the Filipino "president-elect."

Laurel was chosen for the office last week by a "constitutional assembly" composed chiefly of members of the Kalabapi, Japanese-sponsored Philippine totalitarian party.

Tokyo's announcement concerning "freedom" for the Philippines effective Oct. 14 followed by only a few hours President Roosevelt's special message to the Congress in Washington proposing a proclamation of independence for the islands as soon as feasible.

Roosevelt stated the Filipinos had, by their heroism and loyalty, won the right to "complete freedom and nationhood."

Membership Structure Of Associated Press Approved By U.S. District Court

NEW YORK — (AP) — The right of The Associated Press membership to pass upon the admission of applicants has been upheld in United States District Court here which ruled, however, that the by-laws of the news gathering cooperative "in their present form" are in violation of anti-trust laws.

The three-judge court, specifically named to hear the federal government's effort to force the AP to abandon its membership structure and make available the news report to all without restrictions, in a summary judgment Wednesday, gave the AP 120 days to make changes in its by-laws to remedy the court's objections to present operations as to membership qualifications.

Substitutes Left Open The court left open to the AP the adoption "of substitutes which will restrict admission" provided "that members in the same 'field' (morning, evening or Sunday in the same city) as the applicant shall not have power to impose, or dispense with, any conditions upon his admission, and that the by-laws shall declare affirmatively that the effect of admission upon the ability of an applicant to compete with members in the same 'field' shall not be taken into consideration in passing upon his application."

The court also held that the purchase of Wide World photos from the New York Times by The Associated Press does not violate the anti-trust laws as charged by the government.

Provided the by-laws are changed as directed, the court also said the exclusive news exchange contract between The Associated Press and

the Canadian Press, would not be in violation of law. It also was the opinion of the court, composed of Judges Learned Hand, Augustus N Hand and Thomas W. Swan, that if the by-laws were changed as directed, the exclusivity of local news of spontaneous origin which members now furnish the AP as an obligation of membership, would be within the law.

Peanuts Provide Protein



Peanut butter ginger bread doesn't need any shortening.

Peanuts and peanut butter supply first-class protein which is an alternate for scarce meat protein. The War Food Administration is urging farmers to give more acres to peanuts and our leading nutritionists are advising home-makers to include it frequently in their balanced family meals. Here's a peanut butter gingerbread without shortening.

Peanut Butter Gingerbread (12 to 15 pieces)

Three cups enriched flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons soda, 2 teaspoons ginger, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, beaten, 1 cup molasses, 1 cup butter-milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Sift flour, measure and sift again with the soda, ginger, cloves, cinnamon and salt. Cream peanut butter. Add sugar gradually and continue creaming until well blended. Add the sifted dry ingredients alternately with the butter-milk, beating well after each addition. Pour into a greased 8x13-inch pan and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for 30 to 35 minutes.

For school or worker's lunch box, use these peanut butter combinations. They have flavor and that stick-to-the-ribs quality.

Peanut Butter Bacon Filling
One-half cup peanut butter, 4 strips bacon, fried crisp; 2 table spoons homemade chili sauce. Combine peanut butter and finely broken bacon. Moisten with chili sauce.

Peanut Butter Prune Filling (Six large sandwiches)

Six raw prunes, 1 cup seedless raisins, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 1/3 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup light cream or evaporated milk, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons crushed nuts.

Pit prunes and cut into small pieces, chop raisins. Mix peanut butter, salt, milk and lemon juice. Add fruit and nuts and mix well.

Public Health Notes

Fall with the attendant seasonal changes of weather will make common colds and other respiratory diseases more prevalent and widespread in the community.

In the last two weeks, many cases of influenza have been reported in Midland. Cases throughout the state are about five times the average for this time of year. It means that we may expect an unusual number of cases during the next few months.

A respiratory illness should not be neglected or treated carelessly since it can and frequently does result in the dreaded complications pneumonia, bronchitis usually strikes with little or no warning, following a simple cold, an attack of influenza or some other respiratory infection. Diseases Are Communicable

A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage, especially if accompanied by fever, calls for bed rest, warmth and large amounts of fruit drinks. Failure to improve indicates that the attention of a medical doctor is most advisable. Self-medication at this stage of the illness is dangerous.

Since prevention is better than cure, physical resistance to respiratory diseases can be built up with proper ventilation, adequate nourishing food, outdoor exercise and sufficient sleep and rest.

All respiratory diseases are communicable. Rest at home from school or work not only helps the patient to get well but it also prevents the spread of such illness to other persons.

Spanish Newspaper Says Conspiracies Exist In Country

LISBON.—(AP)—The weekly newspaper El Espanol of Madrid, in a full page article entitled "Dissolution of the Falange?" asserted Thursday that "there exist in Spain conspiracies against the Caudillo (Gen. Francisco Franco) which favor a regime of free-for-all shooting."

Strongly defending the Falange and its achievements against its enemies, "which are not the reds alone," El Espanol declared: "The reds, who were responsible for bloodshed in the past, are now acting with such moderation that it contrasts with the conduct of their own ideological enemies, who likewise are enemies of the Falange. Freemasons denounced

"The Falange has never hated the reds, whom it took up arms to fight and will again if necessary—for reasons which are supremely Spanish. But we know that the well-to-do (Bien Pensantes) operate against Spain and Franco from their nationalist, capitalistic, conservative and Christian liberalist labels."

El Espanol denounced Freemasons allegedly operating with foreign aid and inspiration against Franco and the unity of Spain which, it said, has been developed under the influence and control of the Falange. It asserted that the "conservatives are semi-allies of the reds for the conspiracy against the Falange."

New-Fangled Trouble

NORRISTOWN, Pa.—(AP)—Fire Chief Miles Rull, told 2,000 high school pupils at a demonstration. "We are now going to demonstrate the new safety chute which replaces the old-fashioned safety net." Fireman William McGuffin started to slide down the chute. A rope broke and McGuffin fell 15 feet, breaking his elbow.

"I think we'll stick to the old-fashioned nets," said Chief Rull.

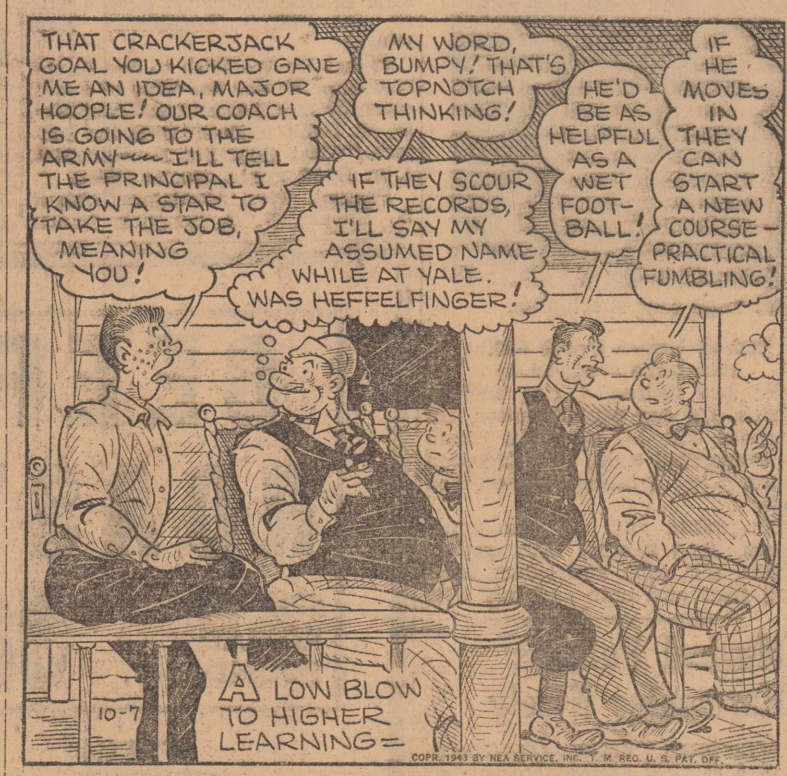

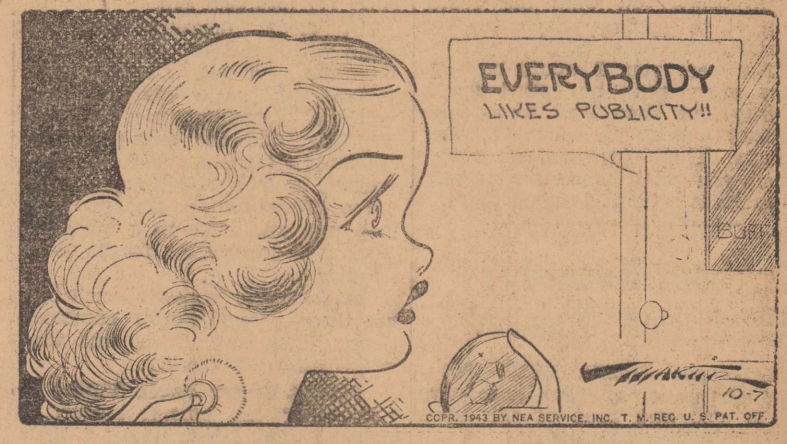

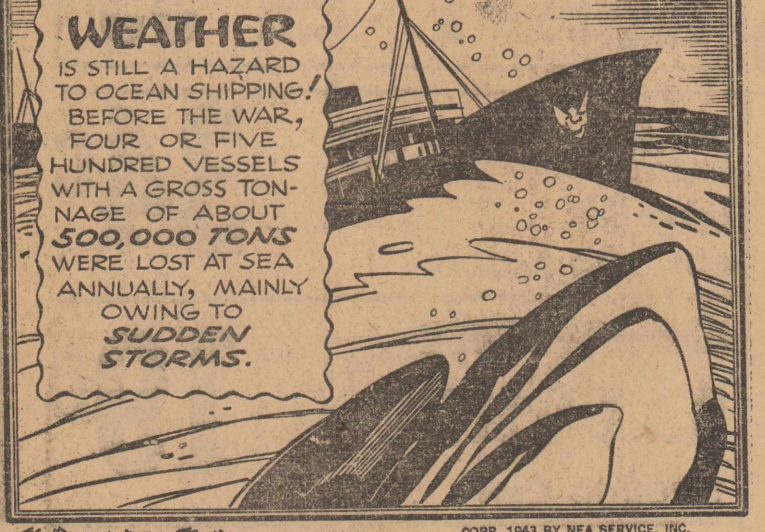

But South made the normal opening and Mrs. Peterson won in dummy with the king of clubs. She cashed the ace of spades, and when South's queen dropped, she came back to the jack of hearts. South correctly did not cover and the jack was allowed to ride. Now a small spade was led and won in dummy with the king. On the two spade plays South elected to let go the queen and jack of diamonds. So at this point Mrs. Peterson cashed the ace of hearts and led a small diamond. South was forced to win with the ace, cashed the ace and queen of clubs, then had to lead a club, allowing the declarer to cash the nine of clubs and the high heart. A heart return by South would give Mrs. Peterson three-odd.

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Desert Magician Is Given British D.S.O.

LONDON—(AP)—The man who deceived the Afrika Korps, led the Italian army astray and made Rommel believe in the "little men who weren't there" has received the D. S. O. for his skullduggery.

This super-magician is Major (temporary Lieutenant Colonel) David Underwicks Strangeways of the Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment. Classified appropriately as "deception officer," he was in charge of "tactical deception" for the last three months of the North African fighting.

One of his favorite tricks in his grim game of hide-and-seek with the Afrika Korps was to line up with British troops, transport and ammunition for the benefit of Axis reconnaissance planes. As soon as they had obtained their information, the forces would be whisked away to strike in a completely different vicinity.

As soon as British tactics were decided on, Strangeways would go about befuddling the enemy. This meant extreme personal danger to him, for he frequently carried out extensive forward reconnaissance under fire, dashing through dangerous areas to plot his next stratagem.

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German Strength Spread Dangerously In Mountainous Part Of Yugoslavia

By DANIEL DE LUCE

AT A PARTISAN BRIGADE HEADQUARTERS IN YUGOSLAVIA—(AP)—German strength is spread dangerously thin along the seagirt, mountainous "under-belly" of Yugoslavia—and the Nazis know it.

More fiction than truth has been printed in the outside world about military events in Dalmatia. When 12 Italian divisions disintegrated as a fighting force on Sept. 9, claims that the partisans controlled all the coast were fantastic, but the fact remains that two German divisions, "Der Teufel" and "Prinz Eugen," had their hands more than full in attempting to restore the situation.

Partisans Hold Giulia
 Here is the latest information, made available to me by the commander of this partisan brigade headquarters:

The Italian port of Trieste, terminus of trans-European rail lines into the Danube basin, continues to be in tight German grasp. Street disorders occurred Sept. 9 after the Italian armistice became known, but the Nazis never let the partisans make a real fighting bid.

Partisans recruited from Slovenians of the countryside exercise authority over most of the Italian Peninsula province of Giulia between Trieste and Fiume. The German defenses on the north bank of the Volturno itself across the plain from the mountains to the Tyrrhenian Sea are still intact, it was stated here.

Favorite Defense Line
 Although the crossing of the Calore, an eastward extension of the Volturno, constituted a flanking threat to the enemy river line, a military spokesman said the Germans were believed to be holding the northern bank of the Volturno "in some strength."

The headquarters communique said merely that "The Fifth Army has made further progress and are working forward to the line of the River Volturno."

This stream has been a favorite defense position for battles in Italy from the time of Hannibal, and the Germans were apparently ready to take advantage of its possibilities for a strong delaying action.

Railway Junction Bombed
 American heavy bombers attacked the railway junction of Mestre, five miles northwest of Venice, in a raid Wednesday, smashing at freight yards, warehouses and engine shops, it was announced Thursday. The American Fifth Army was officially reported as "working forward to the line of the River Volturno."

The communique said that British naval units bombarded German positions and railroads on the Adriatic coast northwest of Termoli in support of the Eighth Army whose positions have been reinforced.

The naval bombardment in the Termoli area was directed against German infantry and tanks counterattacking along the coastal road. The enemy was repulsed, the communique said.

Motorists in Norway are not allowed to sell their cars without government permits. Germany adopted this procedure in order to control all vehicles in case of Allied landings.

Happy Cucumber—Pickled 100 Years

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Confined in a bottle for 100 years has been the fate of "Cutey." Don't fret! "Cutey" is only a cucumber. Now in the possession of Mrs. William Mathias, of Pittsburgh, "Cutey" was pickled at Baltimore, O., by Mrs. Priscilla Goss who wanted an heirloom for her eight children. In 1843, she took eight small-necked bottles out to her garden and placed a growing cucumber in each. When they were full-sized she filled the bottles with alcohol and gave them to her children. A full century later, this cucumber is the last of the pickled brood and owned by the last line of descendants—Mrs. Mathias—who named it "Cutey" at a recent "birthday" fete.

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Congress Still Not Enthused By New Tax Proposal

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A warning that inflation threatens the nation, voiced by Economic Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson, failed Thursday to kindle congressional enthusiasm for the administration's \$10,600,000,000 new tax program.

Vinson pleaded apparently in vain for the program before the House ways and means committee, saying that the additional taxes were "a minimum requirement" to head off inflation and bring in needed wartime revenue.

However, the bi-partisan opposition to so large a tax increase continued unabated and leading members of the ways and means group indicated that a bill would be drawn for a sharply reduced figure, probably nearer \$5,000,000,000.

Vinson testified Wednesday that the threat of inflation was "grave," menacing the value of government bonds and savings, "our insurance policies and our homes."

The additional taxes, he said, are needed to siphon off a part of the \$18,000,000,000 in purchasing power.

Tojo Admits Allied Offensive Is Gaining

NEW YORK—(AP)—Tokyo broadcast reported Thursday by the Office of War Information quoted Premier Hideki Tojo as telling 240 newly-appointed Japanese government officials that the Allied offensive had "gained in intensity."

"As the government officials of his majesty the emperor," said Tojo, "from this day on your responsibility is truly enormous. Should you take even one false step the result will be harming not only yourself but blenching the virtue of his imperial majesty the emperor."

Ticking Clock Proves Quieting For Puppy

NOWATA, OKLA.—(AP)—Having concluded their puppy whimper at night because he was lonesome, Marjean and Maxine Gridland set their minds to work on a solution.

The idea seemed a little silly at first, they admit, but when they placed a ticking alarm clock in the pet's basket he slept soundlessly through the night. Experimenting, they left off the clock. The whimpering was resumed.

Parallels Pointed Out
 And along with the way the big rivalry came out, the ropes punching each time the Yankees had him softened up, the boys and girls will remember the job Mort's catcher-brother, Walker, did, setting his jaw and grimly sticking it out behind the plate, although you knew the heart of neither of the

Missouri farm boys was within a thousand miles.

With the Cards' win in the book from that second game, squaring the show for the Yankees' opener decision on Tuesday, the National League cheering section perked up and pointed out that up to now this 1943 set couldn't be any more like the '42 set-together if they were cut off the same rib roast. A year ago, the Yankees took the opener and the Cards came charging back to grab the second game—by 4-3, incidentally—and then galloped through the next three to pick up all the marbles.

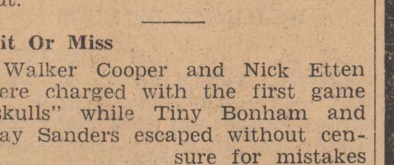

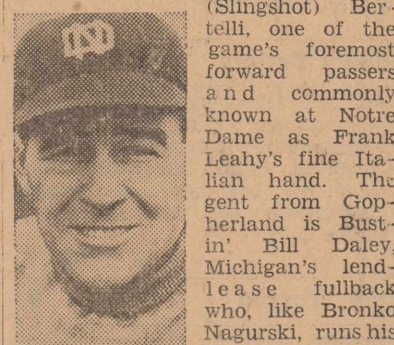
Angelo Bertelli Meets Bill Daley In Saturday Tilt

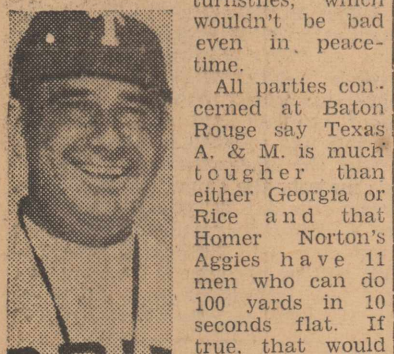
