LONDON -(A)- With the German air force reported definitely on the defensive over the vast Russian front, Soviet armies were steadily developing their ever-wid-ening bridgeheads on the west banks of the Dnieper River Wednesday and have, according to Berlin, launched a new power drive north of the key city of Kiev, capital of the Ukraine.

The Russian war bulletin reported fierce fighting in the battles of the Dnieper, but failed to mention specific areas. It recounted deeper penetrations "many miles" west of the river and indicated that the pincer enveloping operations around Kiev were preceeding satisfactorily.




