Entire Nazi Position In Dnieper River Elbow Menaced By Reds

Germans Hurling Fresh Divisions Into Big Battle

Kiev Being Sacked In Preparation For Evacuation Of City

By EDDY GILMORE MOSCOW —(AP)—The whole German position inside the Dnieper River elbow was threatened Wednesday as harassed Nazi commanders hurled fresh divisions of men, tanks and artillery into the fight in an attempt to halt the Red Army's flanking drive to the west of the river.



Registration For Ration Book Four Starts Thursday

More Than 14,000 Persons Expected To Register Here

More than 14,000 Midland Couney residents are expected to register Thursday, Friday and Saturday for War Ration Book Four, the new cible of living for home-front Americans, Mrs. R. C. Ferguson, chief clerk of the Midland County War Price and Rationing Board, said Wednesday.

The ration books will be issued alphabetically in Midland schools during the three days, and a speedy registration is promised if citizens will offer cooperation. School teachers and officials are handling No Tailoring Of Books

No tailoring, or removing of coustocks will be done as in the issuance of book two, Mrs. Ferguson said. Each applicant must present ration book three for each application for book four made. The applicant must sign a certification before the registrar and may apply only for the family, related by blood or marriage, living under the same roof with him.

Some exceptions will be made to that ruling in the cases of illness or physical incapacity. In that event, the confined person must write a letter identifying the applicant applying for his book.

Parents will register at the school attended by their oldest child. Per-

The registration has been simplified. Only the age, first name, initial and surname and sex of the applicant will be necessary. Some registration blanks will be availablt at the registration sites, but citizens are urged to use a blank porter-Telegram.

All persons with surnames beginning with A through F Thursday, from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. All persons with surnames beginning with G through O

WHERE TO REGISTER

Parents will register at the school where their oldest child is in attendance. Persons having no children in school will register at the High School gymnasium.

* * * WHO WILL REGISTER

Applications for War Ration Book Four must be made by an adult member of the family for whom application entire family. The family includes all persons related by blood, marriage or adoption who regularly live in the same house. It also includes members of the family who are temporarily away from home but who expect to return within sixty days.

Each applicant must present a War Ration Book III for each application for Book IV.

The indications of oil were scattered from the 5,860-foot level to total depth. On the last core only five feet of the lime was recovered, but the barrel caught enough cuttings with saturation and porosity to justify an investigation.

Preview Of Post-War Flying

Post-war utilization of the military aviation radio and electronics devices, such as automatic pilots and altitude indicators for the direction and control of commercial flying, is envisaged by Col. Edgar S. Gorrell, president of the Air Transport Association of America, following a tour of several European theaters of operations to see the work which commercial aircraft are now doing to maintain military supply lines.

All these war-developed, secret weapons of communication have admittedly made aerial combat and transport something fantastically different from anything contemplated a few years ago. Colonel Gorrell can appreciate this difference, perhaps better than almost anyone else in aviation today, for he was chief of air staff for General Pershing in World War I, and he has watched and had a leading part in the development of military and civilian

flying since that time. Something To Remember

No industry has worked more conscientiously or has casualties had more detail to comply with in connection with OPA rulings, than has the nation's food industry.


