INDIANS USE SPEAR TO CATCH SALMON

Reap Food Supply During Fish Harvest Time.

Toppenish, Wash .- It is salmon time in the big rivers of the northwest states. Indians know it as the harvest time when they catch fat fish and preserve the fillets for winter.

Hour after bour Indian fishermen from ten to twelve tribes-sit on the stone masoury of the Sunnyside irrigation dam, near here, spears poised, ready to tunge at large leap ing chinook or come salmon which are running up the Yakima river to spawn.

Tense, immovable as statues, they wait. Onlookers see the flashing buck of the sulmon leaping up the smooth waterfail. There is a lightning quick strike and the straggling silver beauty. safely speared, is drawn to land to be unjuvelined and the spear is ready for another victim

with barbed moks and the fish is caffed, rather than spenred. The book comes off the end of the shaft and dangles on a cord tied to the pole. This, the Indians point on., prevents breakage of the shaft when a thirty or forty pound tish is taken.

Sometimes a lozen big saimon will be booked by one Indian in a day. At other times days pass without a catch. But the redmen never complain about [luck. They poise over the shimmering. tumbling water patiently waiting until fish do come within range.



rina have been promulgated by the Department of Agriculture. The new definitions characterize purified middlings as the clean, sound, granular product obtained in the commercial process of milling wheat, and is that portion of the endosperm retained on 10 XX slik bolting cloth It contains no more flour than is consistent with good commercial practice, oor more than 15 per cent of moisture. Semoling is the purified middlings of durum wheat, and faring is the purified middlings of bard wheat other than durum.

The best profit on market goslings (young rene) is made on those marketed at Christmas and New Years, as a general rule. Turkeys have the call at Thanksgiving. It will not do, however, to neglect the young geese

and unless they are kept growing at top speed they will not be large enough to be most profitable when they are wanted for the holiday tables. Sometimes we read that these young goese will obtain all the food they need in the fields and that they will live and grow if they have nothing but grass and whatever else they can find among nature's stores.

Give Clean Water

Clean and fresh water is as necessary to the success of egg production as is a correctly balanced ration. The man who goes to a lot of trouble with his feeding but is just indifferent with his watering, may expect trouble. Water is one of the chief constituents of an egg and it is required by the hen just as much as a human being requires water to drink. It should be given several times each day, especially in summer.

Must Have Feed

The Purdue university poultry department summarizes the general treatment of the farm hen as follows: "Hens won't live on hopes and prospeets. They must have feed, and plenty of it. The hen does not get enough to est in summer. The fields. barnyards and feed lots will furnish the hen little else but grains and green food. These alone and in their present insufficient quantities will not be sufficient to produce good egg production."

Culling Nonproducers

Culling Nonproducers An easy and efficient method of culling the nonproducers out of the new hatch of pullets can be accom-plished in the following manner, if each hatch has been housed separate by: Keep the first 75 per cent of the pullets that come into production and sell the other one-fourth, or those that are last to start producing.
