The Case For Food Relief

While the Senate has been debating our part in preserving peace in the post-war world, a small group of its members have been concerning themselves with a more immediate and equally important problem. That is the problem of getting food to millions of underfed civilians in occupied Europe, who otherwise may not live to see the day of liberation from Nazi bondage.

This action has been taken belatedly. But the group partly made up for the tardiness when they called upon former President Herbert Hoover to appear before a foreigh relations subcommittee. Hoover, who was food administrator and director of Belgian relief in the last war, has been attempting to organize food relief for occupied countries since well before our entry into the war. His efforts have been disregarded and his advice has been too long unsought. The sending of food to war prisoners has not been interfered with. (Hoover pointed out the cynical fact that food can be sent to a French father if he is a war prisoner, but not to his hungry children.)

The basic needs of occupied countries would be 150,-000 to 200,000 tons of food a month. Even if the Germans seized this whole supply it would not benefit them greatly, since the nation eats about 150,000 tons of food in

Most, if not all, of this food could be purchased in South America. And much of it could be paid for from funds of occupied countries seized and held by the United

Sweden has at least 350,000 tons of idle shipping. Sweden and Switzerland have agreed to undertake the supervisory work of a food relief program. They would approach the powers concerned, and there would be no direct agreement between belligerents. The mechanism of distribution through soup kitchens is already set up in occupied areas.

If there is a risk involved in a food relief program we can afford to take it, in Hoover's opinion.

Free Enterprise Scores Again

"Improvements in petroleum refining come so fast that as soon as the 'best' process is developed, the industry is already at work on something better," said John A. Brown, president of the Socony-Vacuum Oil Co.

The latest of these improvements is the TCC process (thermofor catalytic crackling). This process is now available to the entire petroleum industry. Without its development and other catalytic processes, the United States probably could not now be winning the war.

Aviation engineers have known that lighter and more powerful engines could be built if a gasoline could be trol. made that would burn smoothly, without knocking under high pressure. Iso-octane was discovered in the laboratory 15 years ago and was believed to have such good properties that it could serve as the perfect fuel. It was given the number of 100 octane, and gasolines were assigned octane numbers relative to this standard.

One-hundred octane gasoline was not available in quantity, however, before the war. For some years the petroleum industry has searched for processes that could convert crudes available into the product desired. Catalytic refining came just in time to meet the demands of war. Two years ago, the Army and Navy joint requirements for 100 octane gasoline were 24,000 barrels a day; by the spring of 1942, they were 250,000 barrels. The present amount needed is a military secret, but it is much larger, and American oil companies are supplying it.


After laborious research and the expenditure of millions of dollars, the oil industry was able to take a product which was only a laboratory specialty costing \$25 a gallon, and turn it into a product which could be made at the rate of millions of gallons a day, selling at about 13c a gallon. Thus did American initiative and free enterprise score another victory.



U. S. Prunes Excess Profits

The battle over renegotiation of war contracts still rages and there is more interest in this business of taking the excess profits out of war than you might think. It's in part due to a natural interest in these big annual incomes such as the \$499,000 paid to machine gun manufacturer Carl Gus Swibelius of New Haven, Conn., and the \$442,-000 paid to Navy gun mount manufacturer John B. Hawley Jr., the two highest-salaried manufacturers in the country.

From businessmen there is a curiosity as to how much income such tycoons are left with after federal taxes, and a further question of whether the job of restoring excess war profits to the federal treasury shouldn't be done by excess profits taxes alone, without this controversial business of renegotiation of contracts through price adjustment boards.

Marked Increase In Divorce Rate After War Feared

NEW YORK-A marked increase in the divorce rate after the war is forecast by the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, who find that even now more than one in every five marriages ends in divorce. The statisti-cians see strong indications that the flood of divorces which followed the last war in the United States and other participating countries may develop again when peace returns to the world. "It is to be expected," they say, "that many who have married in haste will divorce at leisure.'

Immediately after the first World War, the divorce rate in this country jumped to the highest point it had ever reached, rising more than 40 per cent between 1918 and 1920, with the rate in the latter year equalling 165 per 1,000 marriages, a figure, the statisticians say, "which was not exceeded until the closing years of the frenzied decade of the

In France the number of divorces 1920 was about four times that 1918, in England and in Germany the totals in 1920 were three times those of 1918. In the neutral Scandinavian countries, however, there were only minor increases in

the number of divorces. That history will repeat itself in the United States and the divorce rate here rise sharply to new high levels is a conjecture which, the statisticians say, is supported by a number of reasons, foremost among which is "the large number of hasty marriages which have been contracted under the stress of wartime emotions."






