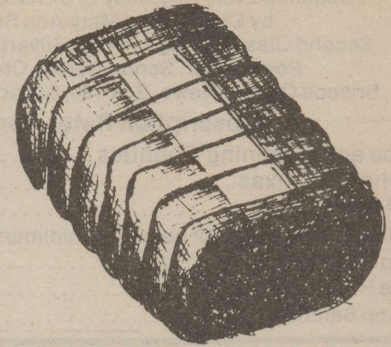

First Six-Man Super Team Chosen This Year

McLean dominated the six-man football scene this season, and it was no surprise that the Tigers dominated the inaugural Amarillo Globe-News Six-Man Super Team.

McLean garnered five of the 16 positions on the elite team, in addition to its coach, Jerry Miller, brother of Silverton's Ronnie Miller, being named Coach of the Year.

Quarterback Michael Williams of Lazbuddie, which had three players selected for the team, was named the Offensive Player of the Year. Linebacker Bradley Brunson of Silverton, which had two players selected, was the Defensive Player of the Year.

Bovina had three players named to the Super Team, while one each was chosen from Higgins, Lefors and Miami.

Seven positions from each side of the line were selected, following the six-man all-state guidelines, in addition to the placekicker and punter.

Coach Miller guided the Tigers to the District 2-A title, a berth in the quarterfinals and a 12-1 record.

Williams led the Longhorns to a 10-2-1 record and a berth in the quarterfinals. He completed 153-of-252 passes for 2,404 yards and 43 touchdowns, with only nine interceptions. He also scored 18 touchdowns on kickoff and punt returns and from the deep back position.

Both ends are from Lazbuddie, Doug Barnes, who caught 40 passes for 873 yards and 14 touchdowns, and Kevin McGehee, who caught 36 passes for 780 yards and 18 touchdowns.

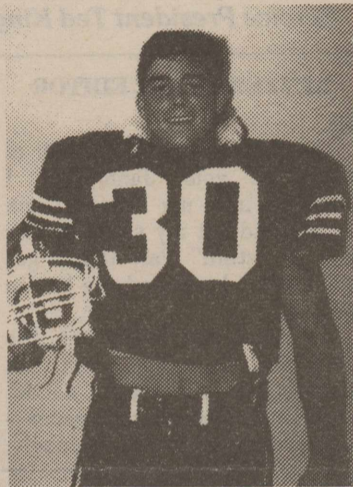
Tres Hess, McLean's two-way standout, was one of the Super Team's running backs. Hess carried 181 times for 1,595 yards and 28 touchdowns.

Kam Russell of Higgins was the other running back. Russell rushed for 1,044 yards and 17 touchdowns, and had his greatest success when the Coyotes were healthy.

Lefors' Dusty Roberson was deep back, where he rushed for 1,679 yards and eight touchdowns.

At center was Bovina's Jimmy Gilbreath, a 5-10, 155-pound senior who used smarts instead of size to get the job done.

Miami's Kyle Fields was the placekicker. Fields converted

39-of-42 two-point kicks, and also made a 42-yard field goal, his only attempt of the season. Fields also was able to placekick into the end zone consistently.

Brunson keyed a Silverton defense that led the Owls to a fourth playoff berth in five seasons. He returned his only interception 30 yards for a touchdown and averaged 10.6 tackles per game. Often he was pulled after the Owls had the game in hand. Only a junior, he'll be back to play for the Owls again next fall.

McLean's Hess, the only player named to two positions on the Super Team, also was chosen at linebacker, where he made 193 tackles, recovered two fumbles and intercepted one pass.

Robert Guevara of Bovina was selected as the third linebacker. The junior averaged 13 tackles per game and intercepted six passes.

Bovina's Manuel Porras, who averaged 18 solo tackles per game, led the three linemen on the Super Team. Porras, whose team made the playoffs for the third season in a row, also averaged two quarterback sacks per game.

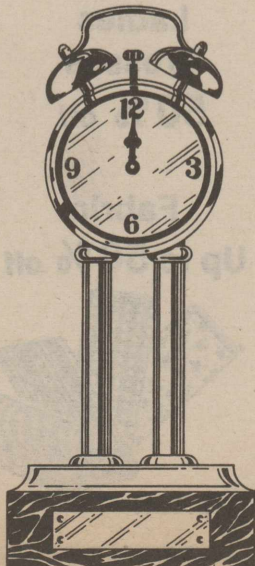
Silverton's Frank Lowrey, who made 85 tackles and recovered two fumbles, and McLean's Caesar Looney, who made 202 tackles and recovered three fumbles, were the other linemen.

McLean's Donald Harris was an easy choice for safety. Harris intercepted 15 passes, returning four of them for touchdowns. He made 141 tackles and recovered one fumble.

Tuffy Sanders, the fifth McLean player on the Super Team, was named as punter. The sophomore averaged 38.6 yards on 28 punts.

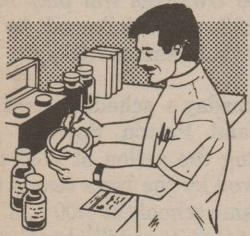
Sunset Baptist Church in Guyton, Oklahoma. Burial was in Llano Cemetery.

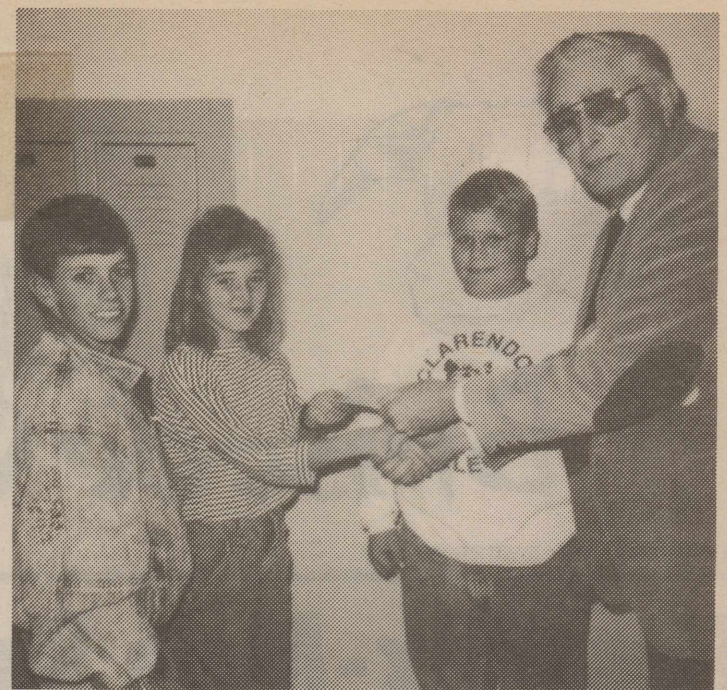
