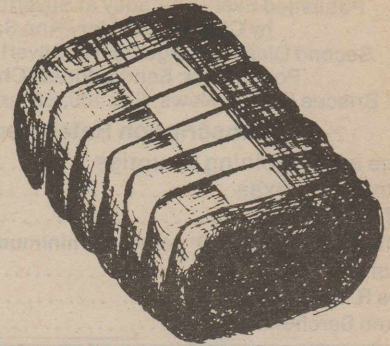

Dinner to Benefit County Show Barn

What I'm writing about this week is something that most everyone but me already knew, but I had my first experience with the 4-H food project this past year and I was very impressed.

First of all, I hated to see any of our local 4-H'ers not advance to the District Food Show because I thought so many of them did an excellent job at the County Show.

I was impressed with their work at the tasting event after the County Show.

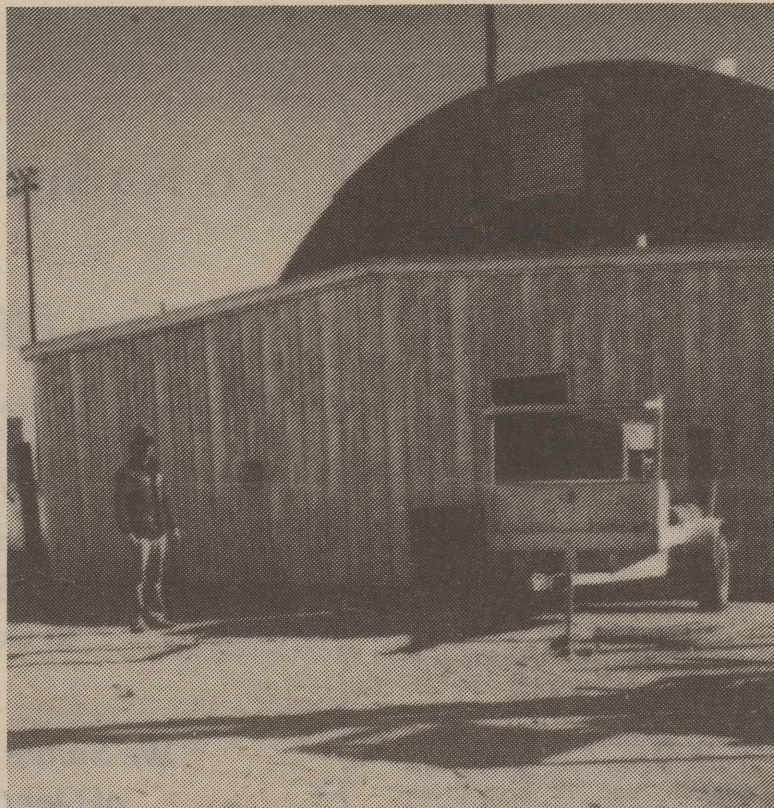
The District Food Show in Lubbock proved to be quite an experience for me, as well. I saw some of the most beautifully arranged and garnished dishes you can imagine displayed there. There isn't a tasting event included at the District Show, and this is because by the time the awards ceremony is held the dishes have been sitting out too long to be safe to eat. For this reason, I think the 4-H'ers should be encouraged to bring only one serving of their dish to the show. It seems such a shame to waste so much food!

I had heard that the District Food Show wasn't run very efficiently the previous year, and consequently I was expecting the awards program to be a hit-and-miss affair. But this couldn't be further from the truth. Dorothy Powell, a former Briscoe County Extension Agent, was in charge of the District Show, and it was very expertly and smoothly conducted, especially the awards program.

Just in case you haven't had any experience with the 4-H Food Show, I'd like to say that this isn't kids submitting blue-ribbon dishes for judging. It's blue-ribbon kids demonstrating their knowledge of foods and nutrition for the judges.

Each exhibitor must be able to answer the judges' questions regarding the preparation and ingredients in the dish exhibited. But each 4-H'er also must be able to name the food groups, giving an example of each, and must be able to define the nutrients contained in his or her dish and tell how each benefits the human body and what could result if the body were deprived of these nutrients.

The Junior I and II divisions are very competitive at the District Show, with 15 to 20 county champions competing in

Silverton's 1989 rainfall amounted to 20.15 inches, somewhat

below the 45-year average for Briscoe County of 21.22 inches. Of the 20.15 inches received, good amounts were received in May, June, August and September, and the other months received little to no moisture. At this time it is very dry here, because only .65 of an inch has fallen during the past three months.

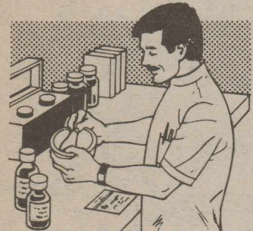

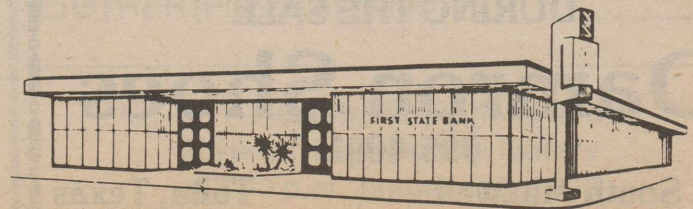

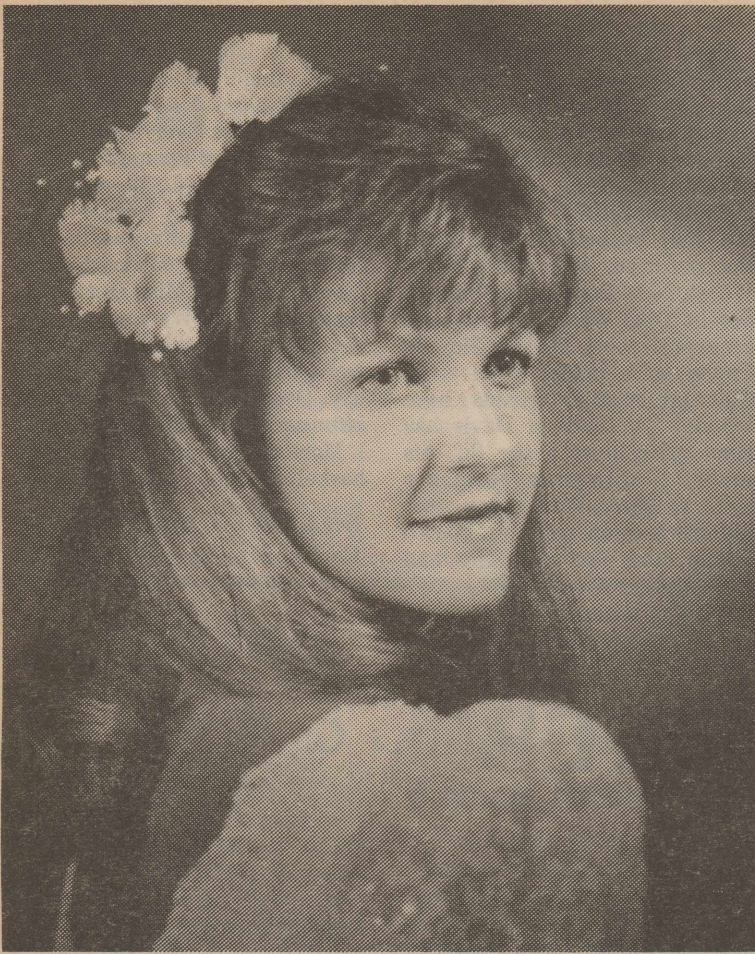

It's Time To Begin Installing Conservation Practices

The Food and Security Act of 1985 (Farm Bill) required farms with highly erodible fields to have a conservation plan in place by January 1, 1990. Most farmers in the Silverton area have met with Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District and developed a plan, if one was needed. This plan makes you eligible for USDA farm program benefits and will keep you eligible when it is applied.

The next step is to know what the plan requires and when it needs to be installed. Every

farmer received a copy of his plan in the mail after it was approved by Caprock SWCD. Pull out the plan and read through it again. If you have questions about your plan or cannot find your copy, contact the SCS office. They will provide you with another copy and answer any questions you might have.

The next step is to begin applying the practices that are planned for your fields. Next week, some of the practices that have been planned by farmers in this area will be discussed.

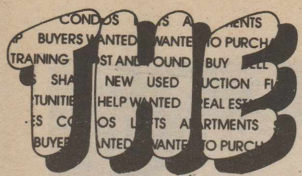

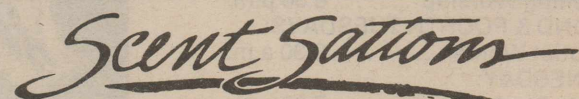
