Several firemen, Mayor A. R. Martin and City Secretary Jerry Patton appeared before the Briscoe County Commissioners Briscoe County Commissioners
Court Monday morning to request additional financing for the quest additional financing for the ment. Spokesmen for the City were Patton and Martin. They emphasized that many of the fires the department works are soutside the city limits, and that the city residents are paying more than their share of the expense.
The Commissioners postponed
making a decision making a decision on the request until next month's meeting.
A statement of the fire department's income and expenses in 1989 was presented to the Commissioners. This showed that the department answered thirty county fires, using thirty gallons of fuel per fire and having an
estimated one flat per two fires, an expense of $\$ 2,136.00$. The department also worked nineteen fires within the city limits, teen fires within the city limits,
using an estimated five gallons of using an estimated five galions of
fuel per fire and having an fuel per fire and having an
estimated one flat per five fires, for a total expenditure of $\$ 725.00$.
There were 24 practices at $\$ 2.25$ per man, an expense of $\$ 584.25$. The firemen traditionally donate this amount back to the department for the purchase of equipment and supplies.

Insurance on four vehicles cost $\$ 3,274.00$; insurance on the fire station was $\$ 1,491.50$; workers compensation insurance on twenty firemen cost $\$ 3,324.00$.
The fire reporting system, with thirty telephones, cost $\$ 3,236.28$.
The city expense for equipment, repairs, batteries, air,

their project money when they needed equipment or equipment repairs.
The point the City group was making to the Commissioners' Court was that the county fires cost the department a total of $\$ 15,450.00$, while the city fires cost a total of $\$ 9,785.00$.
The City requested a larger contribution of county funds to help offset this deficit. The City officials reminded the Commissioners that it isn't fair for the residents of the City of Silverton to carry such a large burden of the expense for out-of-city fires, and said that if the county doesn't contribute a larger share of the expense, it might be of the expense, it might be necessary to limit the depart-
ment's fire-fighting territory. ment's fire-fighting territory.
This would mean that some county residents might be refused fire-fighting service by the fire department.
The firemen don't want to do this. They believe they should serve anyone who needs them, but they may not be able to continue this if additional funds are not found. If you live in rural

At Clarendon, the fire department has a contract for $\$ 416.00$ per month from the county.
City taxpayers also pay taxes to Briscoe County, but receive little back in the way of services. The fire service is one that should be shared by all those who are potential users of the service.

Notice is hereby given that LIGHTHOUSE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the utility) intends to reduce the agricultural processing rate available to cotton gins, grain elevators, and other seasonal agricultural processing services. The existing rate contains an energy charge for the first 450 KWh per KW of peak billing demand of $\$ .1357$ per KWh with all excess KWh billed at the rate of $\$ .03$ per KWh . The proposed rate is 150 KWh per KW of peak billing demand per month, but not more than 450 KWh per KW of peak billing demand per season at $\$ .1357$ per KWh with all excess KWh at the rate of $\$ .03$ per KWh. while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet R 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet $(\Omega$ 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.
The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately $\$ 399,600$, or less than one percent annually.
