In an address before the Association of Southern Agricultural workers at Jackson, Miss., Feb. 6, 1930, Carl Williams, member of the Federal Farm Board, made the following significant statement: "Southern farmers are facing the prospects in 1930 of no governmental aid of effective character in marketing their cotton crop unless immediate steps are taken to reduce the total amount of cotton produced. Last year Southern farmers harvested 46,-000.000 acres of cotton. That is too much. Over 40,000,000 acres is liable to produce an excessive surplus. It is easier to prevent a surplus than it is to control it after it has been produced and what the Farm Board does this year will be governed largely by what the farmer does at planting time."

Fourth, straight newspaper advertising. This method works so much more effectively than the other three, it gets results so much sooner. and gets them in such greater volume, that it is a wonder that there are still some business concerns that fail to use it. It will ordinarily get more customers than the other three methods put together, at a very slight cost for the volume of trade secured. REVERSED BY APPEALS COURT TECHNICALITY IN WORDING OF INDICTMENT SETS ASIDE SENTENCE AND GIVES NEW TRIAL FOR SLAYER OF TWO.

The death sentence imposed on Will Fritts for the murder of Earl Hamilton on Oct. 24, 1928, was reversed and remanded by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin Wednesday.

The appeal from the death sentence was granted because the indictment under which Fritts was tried did not allege the defendant committed the murder with malice aforethought. The court had previously ruled that under the law, unless one killed with malice en a sentence of more than five years in prison.

> Earl Hamilton, a youth about 18 years of age, and his father, Dudley Hamilton, prominent Rochester farmer, were killed on the night of Oct. 24, 1928, at their farm home east of Rochester after they had been called from their home by Fritts. The slayer was not apprehended for several days after the killing. Fritts was tried for the murder of Earl Hamilton, and faces another murder charge in connection with the killing of the elder Hamilton.
