The prolonged heat wave is taking its toll on people in Briscoe County, with one person having died and others having had to be hospitalized due to their exposure to the extreme conditions in Briscoe County during the past month.

If you customarily stay indoors with air conditioning, don't even consider going out for prolonged periods in the heat of the daytime hours.

If you are an outdoorsman and enjoy taking part in camping, hiking and other activities that keep you in the elements during the daytime, remember that your body MUST have fluids to function. Don't go hiking, boating or participate in any other outside activities without taking a good supply of water and other fluids for each person who is to be involved. A fluid like Gatorade is best.

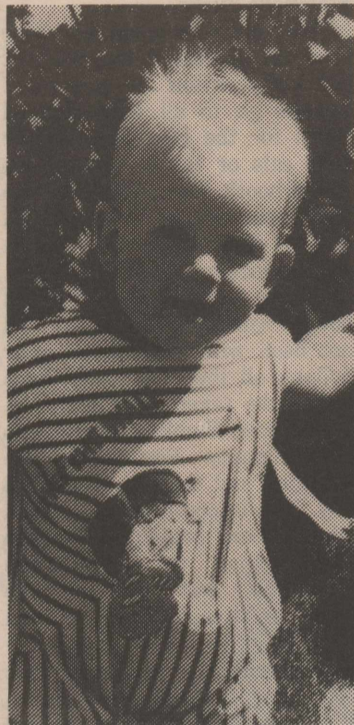
Your comfort in summer depends on the combined effect of air temperature and humidity. If the air temperature is 115° and the humidity is 30%, then the apparent temperature is 135°. When the apparent temperature is 130° or more, and you are out in it, heatstroke or sunstroke is imminent. This is a fact not to be taken lightly. These are true emergencies that could cost you your life.

When the apparent temperature is between 105° and 130°, sunstroke, heat cramps and heat exhaustion are likely. Heatstroke is possible with prolonged exposure and physical activity. This apparent temperature occurs when the thermometer reads 100° or higher and the humidity is near 30%.

When the apparent temperature is between 90° and 105°, sunstroke, heat cramps and heat exhaustion are possible with prolonged exposure and physical activity. This occurs when the thermometer reads 90° or 95° and the humidity is about 30%.

When the apparent temperature is between 80° and 90° fatigue is possible with prolonged exposure and physical activity. These apparent temperatures occur with actual temperatures of 85° to 95° and a humidity of about 30%.

Be sure to remember that most of the time it is hotter off the caprock, and when you are down in the canyons where the wind is blocked off you, your

Fred Strange Resigns As Weather Recorder

Fred Strange has resigned the position of weather recorder for the National Weather Service, and the NWS is presently seeking to find someone to take over this responsibility.

Mr. Strange made the following statement regarding his service:

"During the past 24 years, I have kept the records here in Silverton and have enjoyed doing this job, but I think it's time for someone else to take over.

"This June 1990 has certainly been a hot one. We have had 10 days over 100°, with the 108° on June 24 tying our record for the hottest according to the records I have on hand. This was one of the hottest Junes we have had since 1980, when we had 11 days over 100° in the latter part of June

and first five days of July.

"The coldest, according to the records on hand, has been -9° on January 13, 1963, and in December of 1983, we had five nights below 0, the lowest being -6°.

"The most rain for one month was in June of 1979. We had 11.14 inches of rain, with 5.25 being recorded on June 23, 1979, with a lot of wind and hail damage.

"Let's hope that this July will be like the one in 1975. The high that month was 92°, with lots of low 80's, and overnight lows in the low 60's! Also, we had 3.35 inches of rain that July! Thanks, Fred A. Strange."

City to Enforce Fireworks Ordinance Beginning Today

The City of Silverton has a fireworks ordinance that will be enforced beginning today (July 5). The ordinance, enacted in 1949, reads:

"ORDINANCE prohibiting and restricting the selling and firing any firecrackers, torpedoes, Roman candles or any other fireworks and other amusements or practices tending to annoy persons or residents within the city limits of Silverton, Texas: And fixing the penalty for the violation of the provisions of the ordinance, and declaring an emergency.

"Be it ordained by the City Council of Silverton, Briscoe County, Texas:

"SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to sell or offer for sale any firecrackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, or any other fireworks, within the city limits of the City of Silverton, Texas.

"SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to fire or explode any firecrackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, or any other fireworks, or any other amusement or practice tending to annoy and disturbing the peace of any person or resident, within the

limits of the City of Silverton, Texas.

"SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of any peace officer having jurisdiction to the enforcement of this ordinance, and he is so empowered.

"SECTION 4. PENALTY: Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions or any section or subdivision of this ordinance, shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). And each and every violation shall constitute a separate offense.

"SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication, and it is so enacted. Passed and approved this 5th day of December, 1949.



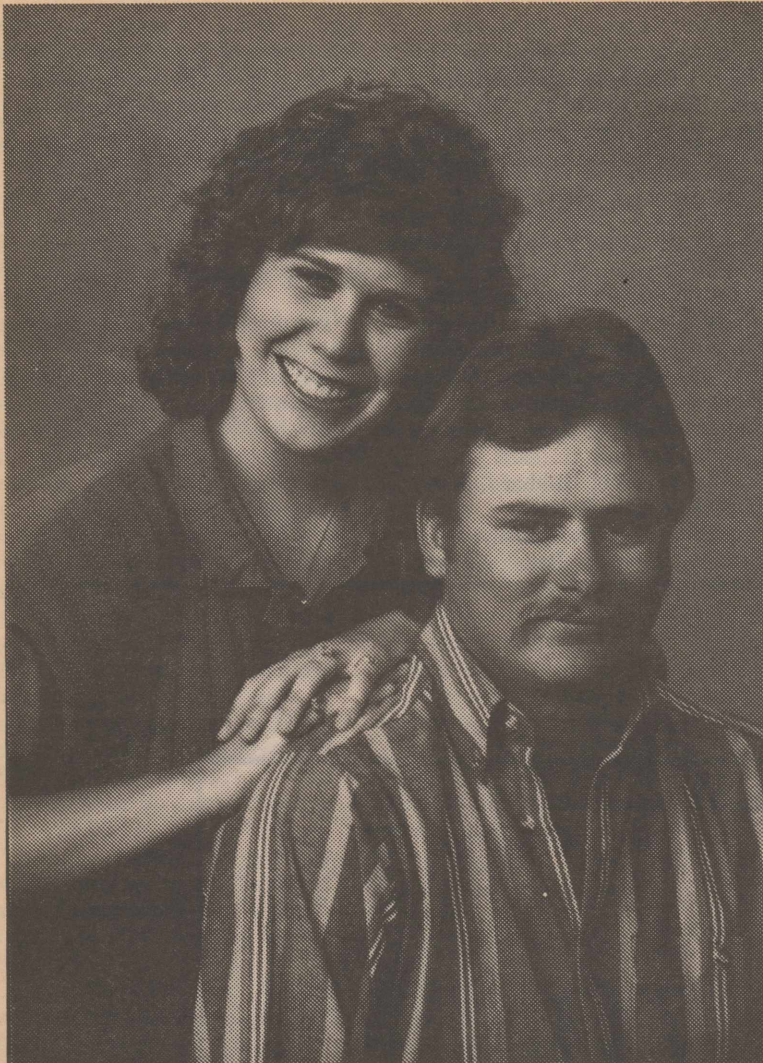

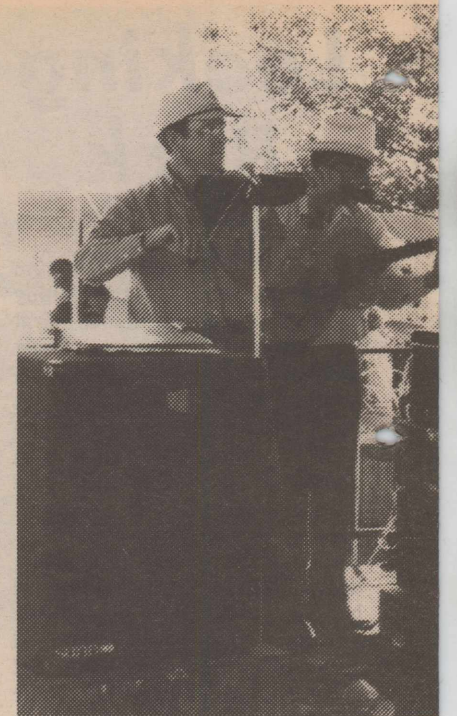

Funding Available For Weatherization

Panhandle Community Services has notified Briscoe County Judge Jimmy Burson that there are very few applications for weatherization on file from this county.

Gene Abbott, program director, says, "With the increased budget for weatherization services and the new enhanced weatherization program, it's important we reach citizens within your county who need this important service."

He went on to say that "The Texas Department of Community Affairs has established the income guidelines for FY 1990 to allow up to 125% of the federal poverty income guidelines: A family of one classifies as 100% poverty with an annual income of \$6,280.00. A family of two qualifies with an annual income of \$8,420.00.

The 125% poverty classification is for a family of one with an income of \$7,850.00 or a family of two with an income of \$10,525.00.

For each additional family member add \$2,140.00 in the 100% poverty category and \$2,675.00 in the 125% poverty category.

"In addition to meeting the above income guidelines," Abbott said, "a needs assessment form is used to prioritize each client. Heavy emphasis is placed on the elderly and handicapped.

"I would very much appreciate

your assistance in reaching citizens within your county," he added. If you could contact some of your constituents who might qualify within the above income guidelines, I would be happy to meet with them and take an application. There is no cost to the homeowner if qualifications are met. Also, if necessary, I would be happy to conduct a meeting explaining the weatherization services.

"Your assistance is appreciated. Please feel free to contact me should you have any questions," Mr. Abbott concluded.

One's problem to love the whole world, for me is no chore; my only real problem's my neighbor next door.

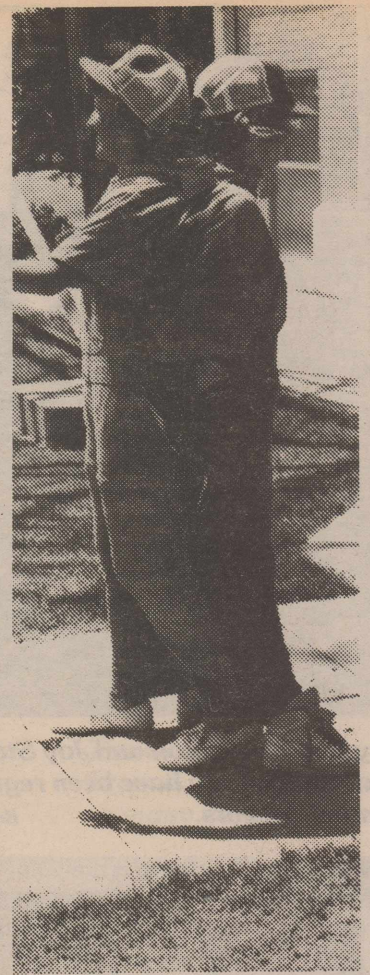

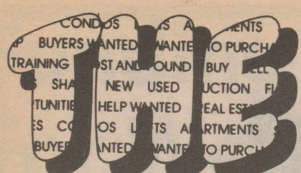

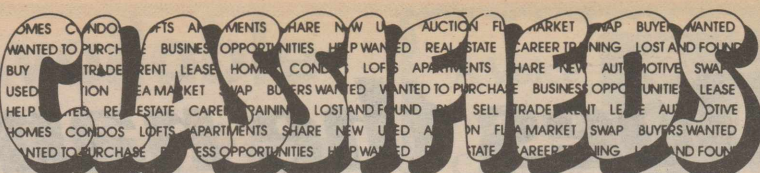
