An 18-year-old Dimmitt man became Lake Mackenzie's latest drowning victim late Sunday afternoon and Justice of the Peace James Edwards, acting as coroner, has ruled the death to have been accidental.

Silverton's Fire Department and Ambulance Service rescue teams were called to the second boat ramp at the lake about 5:30 p.m. Sunday after the man was reported to have drowned by members of his family.

The man apparently jumped into the water on the south side of the boat ramp and began swimming. Witnesses said he went down, struggled back to the surface and then disappeared in the water about 5:00 p.m. It is

Divers from the Amarillo Police Department arrived at the scene at 9:10 p.m., and entered the water at 9:55 p.m. They brought up the body on their second attempt.

The body was recovered at 10:15 p.m., and was brought to Schooler-Gordon Funeral Home in Silverton.

One of the divers became entangled in a tree and his diving partner had to help free him, causing a few more anxious moments for those at the scene.

Vigil services for the victim, Billy Marquez of Dimmitt, were conducted at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday at Foskey Funeral Home in Dimmitt. Funeral mass was at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Dimmitt, with the Rev. Norbert Choong, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens under direction of Foskey Funeral Home.

Mr. Marquez was born in Chihuahua, Mexico, and moved from Bovina to Dimmitt in 1985. He was employed by Excel meat packing plant in Plainview and


Minyard to Play in All-Star Football Game

Immunization Clinic Scheduled July 18

"Our goal is to make collection of the checkoff dollar as effective and positive. We produced 'Understanding the Beef Checkoff' specifically to help producers gain more understanding about their checkoff program."

The pocket-sized, eight-page brochure explains the buyer's and the seller's responsibilities whenever any bovine animal is sold. It provides step-by-step information on how checkoff dollar collectors can complete the monthly report and remittance form for TBIC.

The brochure discusses who qualifies for non-producer status and many other important details that may confuse veal, dairy and boof cattle producers.

Weather Was Hot And Dry During June

It was just plain hot across the Texas South Plains during the month of June 1990. It also was dry with several weather stations reporting only a trace or nothing at all. Numerous temperature records were set including the alltime highest temperature ever recorded at Lubbock. High temperatures over 100 degrees

days across the area while ranging from 20 days at Seminole to only seven at Spur. There were 10 days in June 1990 when the temperature was 100 degrees or higher in Silverton.

Temperatures averaged 5.8 degrees above normal across the area and ranged from 7.7 degrees above normal at Lockettville to 1.9 degree above normal at Spur. The average temperature at Lubbock of 84.4 was the all-time highest average temperature for June and was second to the allaverage highest temperature for any month, topped only by 85.4 in July 1966. New records for highest average temperatures were set at fourteen of the reporting stations

Silverton's average temperature for the month was 80.2 degrees, breaking the previous record that had existed

across the South Plains.

Maximum temperatures averaged 7.3 degrees above normal and ranged from 10.2 degrees above normal at Levelland to 1.5 degrees above normal at Spur. With the numerous maximums over 100 average maximum temperature at Lubbock turned out to be 99.3, surpassing the previous highest monthly average temperature of 97.9 degrees in June 1953. Of all the hot days, Sunday the 24th was the hottest and most stations reported the monthly highest that day. Levelland reported the area highest that day with 113 degrees. New records were set at twenty-two of the area reporting stations for the highest average maximum temperature for the month.

Silverton's average maximum temperature for June 1990 was 95.0 degrees, higher than the South Plains average of 94.2, breaking the previous record established in June 1980.

Minimum temperatures averaged 4.2 degrees above normal and ranged from 6.2 degrees above normal at Lockettville to 0.9 degree above normal at Tulia. The lowest temperature of the month was 45 at Dimmitt on the 4th. Silverton's average minimum temperature was 65.4 degrees, lower than the 66.3 South Plains average.

Precipitation was quite varied across the area and ranged from nothing to some reports over five inches. When compared to the long-term averages, June area rainfall was 1.88 inches below normal and ranged from 2.54 inches above normal at Jayton to 3.43 inches below normal at Olton.

Silverton's precipitation for the month totalled 1.60 inches, which was .60 above the South Plains average, but was 2.18 inches below the 45-year history for Briscoe County.

Family History Workshop Slated At Hotel Turkey

Historic Hotel Turkey is the unique setting on July 28 for a writer's workshop, "How to Write Your Family History As Fact or Fiction," conducted by author and literary consultant Cyndy Buchanan.

Fast-gaining a reputation as the place for family reunions, club celebrations, and company retreats, Hotel Turkey's fame has spread largely by word of mouth, even to distant shores. Recently Johnsons received reservations from a German disc jockey, the first of perhaps many international visitors destined to visit the rugged beauty of the Caprock. Once popular with traveling salesmen drummers, the hotel, recently included in the National Register of Historic Places, incorporates antiques, artifacts, and western art of the region into its decor.

Though a professional writer with national publishing experience, Buchanan's favorite role is that of teacher. "I love helping people. If they just have an idea of something they have always wanted to write, fiction or non-fiction, a script or a novel, I can work with them as a consultant." That role might include editing literary content, developing narrative ideas, or shaping philosophies into words.

To register for one or both of the individually-planned family history sessions, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., one may call Hotel Turkey at 806-423-1151. The cost is \$25 a person per session. A delicious home-cooked boarding-house meal will be served in the hotel dining room for about \$5.50 each. If made immediately, hotel reservations may be secured for workshop participants on the night of July 27, one of the few nights unbooked at the busy bed and breakfast.



State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that a representative from his agency will be in Silverton on Tuesday, July 24, to answer questions about Texas taxes and assist taxpayers with paperwork and problems.

"I don't want to see state taxes turn into a burden for folks who can't get to a field office. Our visits are a service we're happy to provide to Texas taxpayers," Bullock said.

Forrest Skinner, enforcement agent at Amarillo Field Office, will be at the Briscoe County Courthouse, first floor county courtroom, from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m. The public is welcome and there is no charge.

"I'm sending my employees out to help people with questions, filling out forms, and working out problems on a local, one-to-one basis. There's basis. some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," Bullock said.

Randall, Armstrong, Swisher, Hall and Donley County area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse seminar can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555, from anywhere in Texas.

The Amarillo office, headed by Mort Watson, serves 25 counties in the Texas Panhandle, including Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Collingsworth counties.

Social Security In **Briscoe County**

How bank accounts affect Supplemental Security Income (SSI) eligibility is an area that consistently confuses people who are receiving or applying for SSI. This column should help clear up some of that confusion.

To be eligible for SSI, a person must have resources of less than \$2,000 (\$3,000 for a couple). Bank accounts are usually considered resources; therefore, they count toward this limit.

What's so confusing about that, you wonder. Well, Social Security considers a bank account yours if your name is on it as owner or coowner and there are no legal restrictions that keep you from taking money out and using it for your own benefit. This is true even if you don't use the account or don't consider the account yours. That means it's important that bank accounts are precisely titled to reflect ownership and

Let's suppose Mary Jones applies for SSI. daughter, Jane, has a \$3,000 savings account. Jane listed Mary as a joint owner, primarily so Mary would have access to the money in case something happened to Jane. Although Mary doesn't consider the account to be hers, Social Security does, and she could be found ineligible for SSI because she is over the \$2,000 resource limit. Of course, if Jane's account is titled to restrict Mary's access, the account would not be considered Mary's and would not affect Mary's eligibility.

Proper titling also is critical when community, civic, or social groups collect money for a special reason such as to help pay a SSI recipient's medical expenses. Although the donors gave money to the person, they also placed restrictions on its use, and the account must be titled to show the restrictions. As long as the account title shows the money cannot be used for food, clothing or shelter, the account is not considered a resource.






