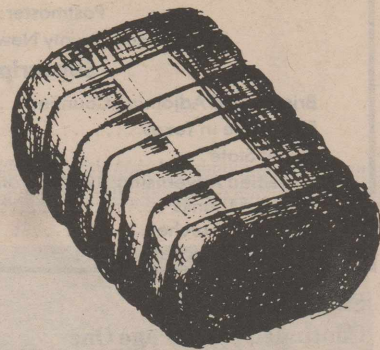

Guidelines Given for National School Lunch Program

The Silverton Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for 75¢ and breakfast for 35¢. Meals also are available free or at a reduced price.

•If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.

•If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals for 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

•If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

HOW TO APPLY

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, carefully complete an application form and return it to the school. If you now get food stamps or AFDC or any children, the application must have the children's names, your food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature of an adult household member. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all your children, the application must have the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income each household member now gets, where it comes from

and how often it is received, the social security number of either the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application or the word "none" if the member does not have a social security number. An application that is not complete cannot be approved.

OTHER INFORMATION

•Verification: Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked to send information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

•Fair Hearing: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing the following official:

•Reporting Changes: If your children get meals based on income information, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month

or \$600 per year. If your children get meals based on AFDC/food stamp information, you must advise the school if you no longer get AFDC or food stamps for your children.

•Confidentiality: The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility.

•Reapplication: You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.

•In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

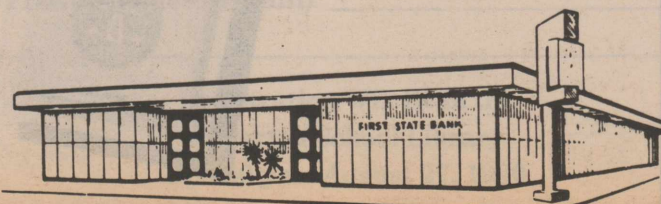

All the children and grandchildren attended the homecoming festivities and enjoyed seeing old friends. Needless to say, a good time was had by all.

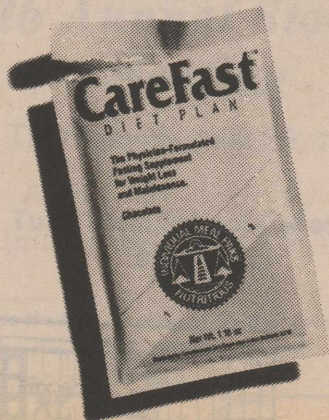

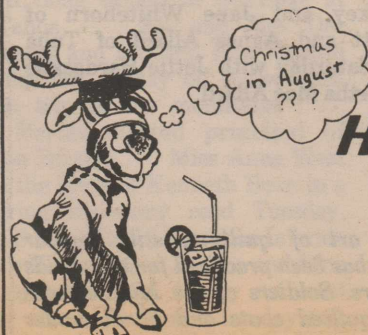

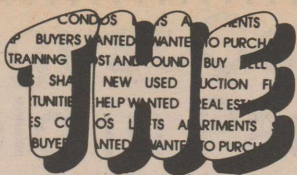
