SCS Says Now Is Time To Plant Winter Peas

"Now is the time to plant winter The harvest is expected to be late, cover crops," says Mike Brown of

> "It is almost time for the wind erosion end of the candle to start burning. Winter cover crops can stop soil in place", states Brown.

> Cover crops come in a wide variety such as Austrian winter peas, vetch, rye, oats and wheat. The crop can be planted in rows, boardcast. They also maybe seeded alone or in mixtures. If your soil is easily moved by the wind, perhaps broadcasting in the blanks would be best. If your soil is not so easily blown planting in rows will do the job.

Punt, Pass & Kick' Registration Started




