After four of the warmest days of the summer, a cold front moved in late Sunday, dropping temperature 20 degrees in less than an hour. High southwest winds during the four days, did considerable damage to the crops, when temperature neared 100 degree mark.

A slow drizzle started about 9 p. m. Sunday and at 7 a. m. Monday Fred Byerly gauged .35 inch of moisture. The fall continued through the day, bringing the total to .66. The fall varied over the territory. Most farmers were hoping for a good, general rain, but now feel fortunate in not receiving the heavy washing rains that covered many points in nearby counties.

Many Dangers In Yard At Home

The amateur gardener is exposed to many hazards and must exercise constant care when using yard tools and equipment, Lone Star Gas Company Manager John Leach cautioned today.

Lone Star and the Fire Dept are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program.

Almost 12 per cent of all home accident fatalities occur in the yard according to a survey reported by the Kansas Board of Health and the Nassau County, N. Y., Health Department.

Of the total deaths, 5.6 per cent were caused by falls; 1.6 per cent by exposure to fire; 1.3 per cent by suffocation; and 3.1 per cent by miscellaneous causes.

Principal dangers are careless use of the power lawnmower. Turn hoes, rakes, etc. downward when momentarily laid aside and store properly when not in use. Observe these safety rules when operating the power mower:

1. Avoid using an electric mower when the ground is wet. You may cause a short circuit or slip on the damp grass and fall against the blades.
2. Before using, clear lawn of stones, wires, and other articles that the mower may catch and throw into the air. If an object discharged by a mower strikes you or a bystander, it may cause serious injury.
3. Be sure that children and pets are at a safe distance when you are using the mower.
4. Be sure of your footing and balance when you are operating the mower on an incline. Downhill mowing is especially dangerous.
5. To push the over obstructions, tip it by manipulating the handle rather than by reaching under the mower.
6. Stop the engine before removing objects from reel or rotary blades.
7. Disconnect plug wires when you are working on the underside of the mower.
8. Store fuel in a closed metal container and keep it out of the reach of small children.
9. Shut off mower before leaving the mower unattended.
10. Keep flame away from the mower while refueling.

First Bale Ginned Wednesday, 30th

First bale of the year was brought in by Gil Almonva last Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The bale was grown on the L. A. Sparks farm and ginned 410 pound bale from 1600 pounds of lint cotton. Farmers Gin ginned the bale and J. C. Edwards bought the cotton for 35c. Grade has not been received, but it is expected to be strict middling.

Most cotton men agree that the crop is spotted this year, and will fall below last years record crop. Increased acreage this year will help, but some of the best land has poorest crops this year.

Insect damage is heavy along the river and creeks and most low land, with little damage on the high ground.

Most estimates are about twenty thousand bales for Rotan, which is a good crop.

The harvest is expected to be late, not getting underway until after Oct. 1, and a large part of the crop is expected to be gathered mechanically.

SCS Says Now Is Time To Plant Winter Peas

"Now is the time to plant winter cover crops," says Mike Brown of the Soil Conservation Service, Rotan, Texas, assisting Upper Clear Fork SCD.

"It is almost time for the wind erosion end of the candle to start burning. Winter cover crops can stop this wind erosion and keep the top soil in place," states Brown.

Cover crops come in a wide variety such as Austrian winter peas, vetch, rye, oats and wheat. The crop can be planted in rows, broadcast. They also may be seeded alone or in mixtures. If your soil is easily moved by the wind, perhaps broadcasting in the blanks would be best. If your soil is not so easily blown planting in rows will do the job.

There are three things to keep in mind when planting winter cover crops. First, inoculate legume cover crops with the proper inoculant to insure nitrogen being stored by the bacteria. Second, plant seed shallow. Third, winter is the time of low moisture demand for growing crops, when they start competing for moisture in March, destroy them but leave the residue on top of the soil says Brown.

Anyone desiring information on planting cover crops may receive it by contacting the SS in Rotan, Texas.

Whereas: Most home accidents are fundamentally the result of inadequate knowledge, insufficient skill and faulty attitudes, and

Whereas: These home accident deaths and injuries can be prevented if all members of our families learn to recognize home hazards and take effective action to eliminate these hazards, and

Therefore: I, by the power vested in me as Mayor of Rotan, do hereby proclaim September to be 1961 Home Safety Month and urge that all citizens of Rotan take part in this splendid program to make all of our homes true havens of safety for our loved ones.

'Punt, Pass & Kick' Registration Started

Registration began Monday August 28 for the nationwide Punt, Pass and Kick competition, in which Rotan area grade school boys aged six through 10 can compete in a test of football skills for prizes ranging from football equipment to a trip to the National Football League Championship game and a visit to the White House.

Eligible boys may register, without cost, at Rotan Motor Co., Rotan, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Each must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The Rotan competition is scheduled for Saturday October 14 at the football field.

In order to help contestants train for the Rotan punting, passing and place-kicking competition, to be held early in October, each entrant will receive an instruction booklet containing tips by National Football League record-holders Johnny Unitas, Yale Larry, and Paul Hornung.

Pete Rozelle, Commissioner of the National Football League, which is cooperating with the Ford Division of the Ford Motor Company in this national competition, points out that the program will enable all boys to participate in athletic competition.

"Boys who have been unable to make the team have been deprived of the benefits offered by participation in the sport of football," Rozelle says. "But this program will make it possible for all boys to participate."

In the "P.P.&K" competition, boys will be judged on the distance and accuracy of their punts, passes and place-kicks. The five top winners in the Rotan competition -- one for each age group -- will receive football uniforms. Second place winners will receive warm-up jackets, and footballs will be given the boys 8 through 10 who rank third.

The scores of the top five boys in the Rotan contest will be compared with the top scores from all the other contests held in the region covered by the telecasts of the Dallas Cowboys home football games. The top competitors, one in each age group, from this region will appear on television during a November home game of the Cowboys to test their football skills against winners of other regions.

All scores then will be compared to determine the five National Champions.

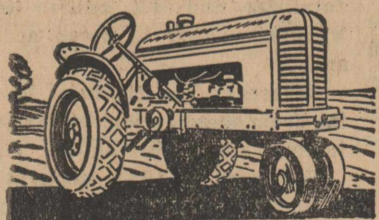
Mrs. Leon Attends Wedding in New Jersey

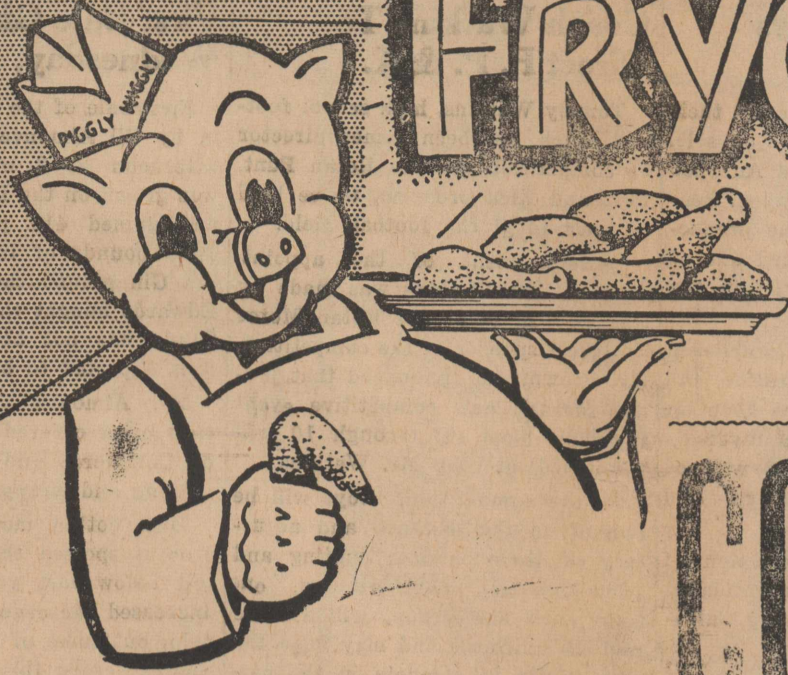

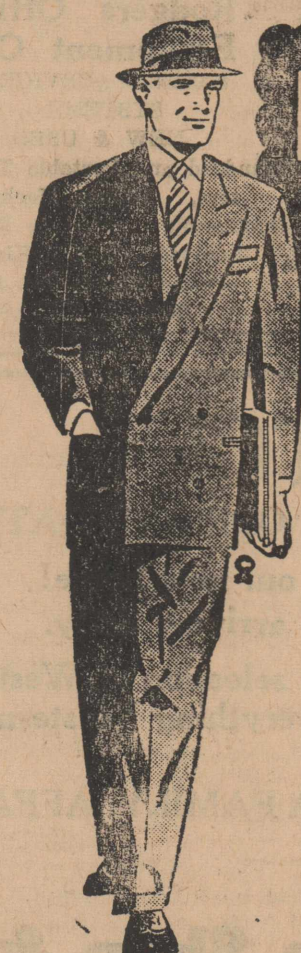

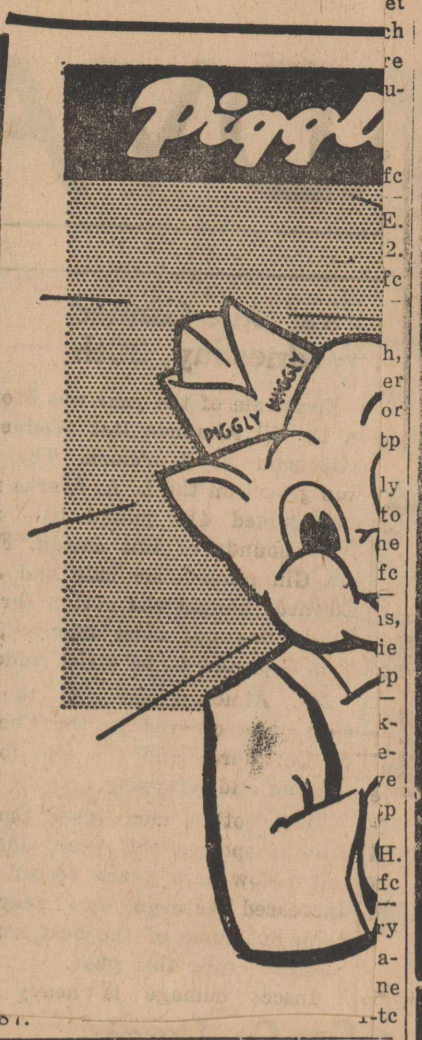

Drivers License Fees Are Now \$3.00

Austin—The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texas drivers today an increase in license fees has been ordered by the Legislature effective September 1st.

The Texas operator's license on and after that date will be increased from \$2 to \$3 for a two-year period, the commercial driver's license will increase from \$3 to \$4.50 for a one-year period, and the chauffeur's license will go up from \$4 to \$6 per year.

The fee for a duplicate of a lost license will remain at 25 cents.

"We urge all drivers to be sure they send the right amount in with their renewal applications," said Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director. "Those which are accompanied by the old fee after September 1 will have to be returned to the sender, causing unnecessary delay and inconvenience."

He said the \$3 two-year operator's license will still be lower than the fees in 12 other states, and will be exactly the same as five other states. He reported Texas now has 4,328,000 currently-licensed drivers.

"Incidentally," said Garrison, "we would like to urge drivers to take care of their licenses, in spite of the fact that it only costs 25 cents for a replacement. Last year we received 85,000 applications for duplicates of lost or mutilated licenses."
