

The annual Cattle Feeders Day will be held at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's Spur substation April 10 writes Dr. Paul Marion, Superintendent.

The morning session will be devoted to a tour of the sub-station with area county agents serving as guides.

Following are some of the pro-

jects to be inspected on the tour.

1. Bench leveling and water conservation, explained by W. P. Hatchett, Jr. agronomist on the station staff.

2. Grass reseeding and range improvement, discussed by E. D. Robinson, assistant range specialist on the staff.

Maintenance of beef sows on native pasture, discussed by J. H. Jones, of Texas A&M College Animal husbandry dapartment.

4. Feedlots at the station, discussed by county agents.

The afternon program will be in charge of W. J. (Dub) Waldrop, project leader of the Texas Experiment Ranch at Throckmorton.

J. K. Riggs, of the AH department at Texas A&M, will discuss winter maintenance of beef cows and production of feeder calves.

Dr. Ralph Durham, head of the AH department at Texas Tech, will

discuss cattle feeding studies at the Lubbock College.

Dr. Marion, station superintendent, will describe cattle feeding

expreiments at the station.

Joe King, Plainview cattle feeder, will be chairman of a question and answer session, with Jones, Riggs, Durham and Marion composing the panel.

Making this Feeder Day will be carrying out one of the recommendations of the Fisher County Extension Program Building Committee.

Bacterial blight occurs throughout the world wherever cotton is grown. It is one of the most damaging plant diseases in Texas, and during recent years had caused an estimated \$37 million yearly loss to Texas growers.

growers.
Several races and varities of this pathogen are known, but only two are widely distributed. The organism enters the plant through open stamata and wounds in the leaves, bolls and stems. The bacteria break down the cell wall of the spongy

tussues, releasing cellular juices.

Infected leaves soon turn yellow and are shed, and excessive leaf shedding reduces the yieldidng ability of the plant. Boll lesions provide ports of entry for boll-rotting fungi, thus bacterial blight is one of the principal causes of bool rots.

The blight organism may overwinter in the soil on undercomposed plant debris, but more commonly is carried from season to season within and on planting seed. Once in a field the disease is spread from plant to plant and from old to new tissues by wind-driven, splashing rains. The disease may also be disseminated from field to field by whirlwinds, running water, equipment and gin trash.

Bactrial blight can be controlled by a combination of four practices: rotating cotton with other crops, planting disease-free seed, growing resistant varieties and fertilizing with nitrogen.

No chemical control for becteril blight is now known, so cultural practices are very important to the grower. For more information on this disease and on preventive cultural parctices, stop by and ask for a copy of MP-534, "Bactrial Blight of Cotton."


