### Paving Program For Residential Section

After several months work by the City Council, a proposed residential section paving program was announced at Tuesday's Lions Club luncheon by Mayor Justin Morrow. He introduced Noble James of Lubbock Engineering Co., and Thomas M. Anderlitch, executive vice president of First of Texas Corp., of San Antonio.

The proposed project calls for 111 blocks of new paving and about 47 blocks of resurfacing. The speakers stresser that the proposed project could be changed to include other blocks if desired by property owners and any part of the proposed blocks could be deleted if property owners desired not to pave.

Lubbock Engineering Co., has done extensive supvrey work on drainage etc., for the City on this project, including the long standing problem of Hackberry Creek drainage to the west and south of town. Mr. Anderlitch's firm will handle financing of the entire program. A bond issue will be necessary to carry the part of the City and property owners cost is expected to be under \$4 per front foot for paving, gutter and curb.

The speakers also stressed that this is a voluntary project, subject to wishes of the citizenship.

The plan calls for property owners to have 5 year payment plan where desired.

Four maps of the project are posted about town for examination, Postoffice, Morrow Drug, City Hall and Hogsett Chevrolet Co. The map and more information will be in next issue of the Advance.

Following the speakers and many questions and answers, the Lions voted unanimously for the plan. The other civic organizations are being contacted for their support.

If this program can be completed, Rotan will be one of the best paved towns in the entire area.

### Why Have School Nurses & Counselors?

All of us will agree that the health of our children is of vital importance. We also will likely agree that parents many possibly overlook or not discover some types of ill health, such as poor vision and poor hearing. As a safeguard against these oversights, many schools employ one or more nurses if they are available. You may wonder whether there are enough health problems in school to keep a nurse busy. Below are but a few of her responsibilities.

In addition to examining the eyes and ears of the children as was explained last week, the nurse has many other duties, including caring for pupils who become ill in school, now and then taking them home; preparing forms on which parents give permission for the school to give their children various vaccinations; collecting and tabulating the returns from the parents for information as to arranging certain days for the schools to take the children to the hospital for vaccinations; assisting in giving the vaccinations; placing upon the school's pupil permanent records the records of all vaccinations, with dates and other information, as well as recording on such record forms the results from checking the eyes and ears; and sending a record of each child's vaccinations home to the parents; working with the principals and teachers to help prevent the spread of various diseases; working with children to cure and prevent certain contagious diseases such as ringworm, measles, mumps, chickenpox, and other undesirables such as head lice.

They work with Homemaking teachers in each school, giving lectures and showing films on first aid, reproduction, good grooming, mental health, child care in the home, nutrition, and any other subject they might be called upon to do.

### Some Long Distance Phone Rates Lowered

A reduction in rates on certain long distance telephone calls within Texas, which will save telephone users more than \$2.5 million a year, will be put into effect May 20, Roy Eury, Manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today.

In general, the rate reduction will apply to station-to-station and person-to-person calls of more than 198 miles, Eury said.

The reduced rates will apply to merely 17 million calls a year within the state.

The reductions will range from five to 15 cents for a three-minute call.

Here are some typical examples of old and new rates for three-minute daytime calls:

STATION-TO-STATION  
Dallas to Houston, old rate \$1.00; New rate \$.95

El Paso to Brownsville, old rate \$1.60; New rate \$1.50

Houston to Abilene, old rate \$1.20; New rate \$1.10

PERSON-TO-PERSON  
Dallas to Houston, old rate \$1.60; New rate \$1.50.

San Antonio to Wichita Falls, old rate \$1.85; New rate \$1.75.

El Paso to Brownsville, old rate \$2.55; New rate \$2.40

Eury pointed out that the reduction does not apply to calls to other states, nor does it apply to calls of short distances within the state.

The reduced result from accounting changes recently arrived at by agreement between the Federal Communication Commission, the National Association of Railroad & Utility Commissioners, and the Bell System.

Under the new agreement Eury said a larger percentage of telephone plant is allocated to calls going outside that state.

## Darrell Royal To Speak At Boys Ranch May 26

Darrell Royal, University of Texas head football mentor who was named Coach of the Year by the American Football Writers Association last fall, will be the principal speaker at the annual field day at West Texas Boys' Ranch at Tankersley May, 26, Roy A. Minear of Midland, Boys' Ranch board president, said.

Royal, entering his sixth season at the Longhorn helm, will give the dedicatory address for two new dormitories and a new Chapel to be officially opened that day. Each dormitory will house 32 boys.

Boys' Ranch is now operating a capacity of 64 boys.

The dedication speech is scheduled at 12:30 P. M. with a barbecue dinner to follow. Royal will also speak at the dinner.

The young Longhorn coach in just five years brought Texas back from its worst season, 1-9 in 1956, to national prominence and four bowl appearances in five seasons. Royal came to Texas from the University of Washington.

He was an All-American quarterback under Bud Wilkinson at the University of Oklahoma but in 1958 led the Longhorns to their first victory over the Sooners since 1951.

The five-year regime was climaxed last January 1, with the thrilling 12-7 upset over Ole Mississippi in the Cotton Bowl game.

For West Texas Boys' Ranch, it will be a big day. The annual field day ceremonies were first held in 1958 and have grown progressively larger each year.

Farm implement dealers of San Angelo and surrounding cities each year have contributed machinery of all types to the field day activities. Some projects completed in the

past as a result of field day activities includes the air strip at the Ranch, a 3,000 X 150' stretch which will be extended this year, clearing for the rodeo grounds and construction of cross fences on pasture land. A steel pipe line for irrigation from the Spring Creek to the Ranch headquarters was built along with a stock pond about 50 acres of root plowing. Grass has also been planted in cropland fields.

Barney Jefferson, general chairman of this year's field day, said activity May 26, will include some chaining of mesquite on the Ranch along with a demonstration of aerial spray of mesquite.

The actual spraying will have been completed before the field day activities and only water will be used in the demonstration in order to avoid damaging cotton crops on surrounding land.

Farm implement dealers will again show equipment. The public is invited to the field day activities and to the barbecue. The San Angelo Jaycees are helping on reception, publicity, and food.

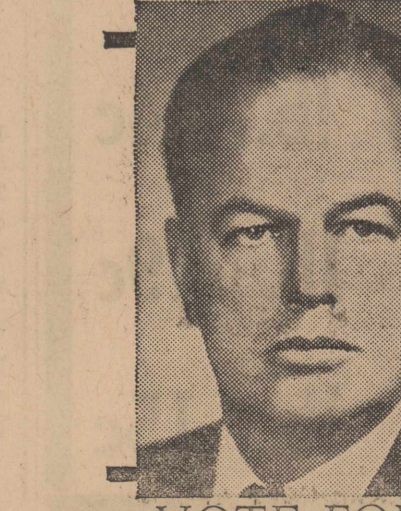

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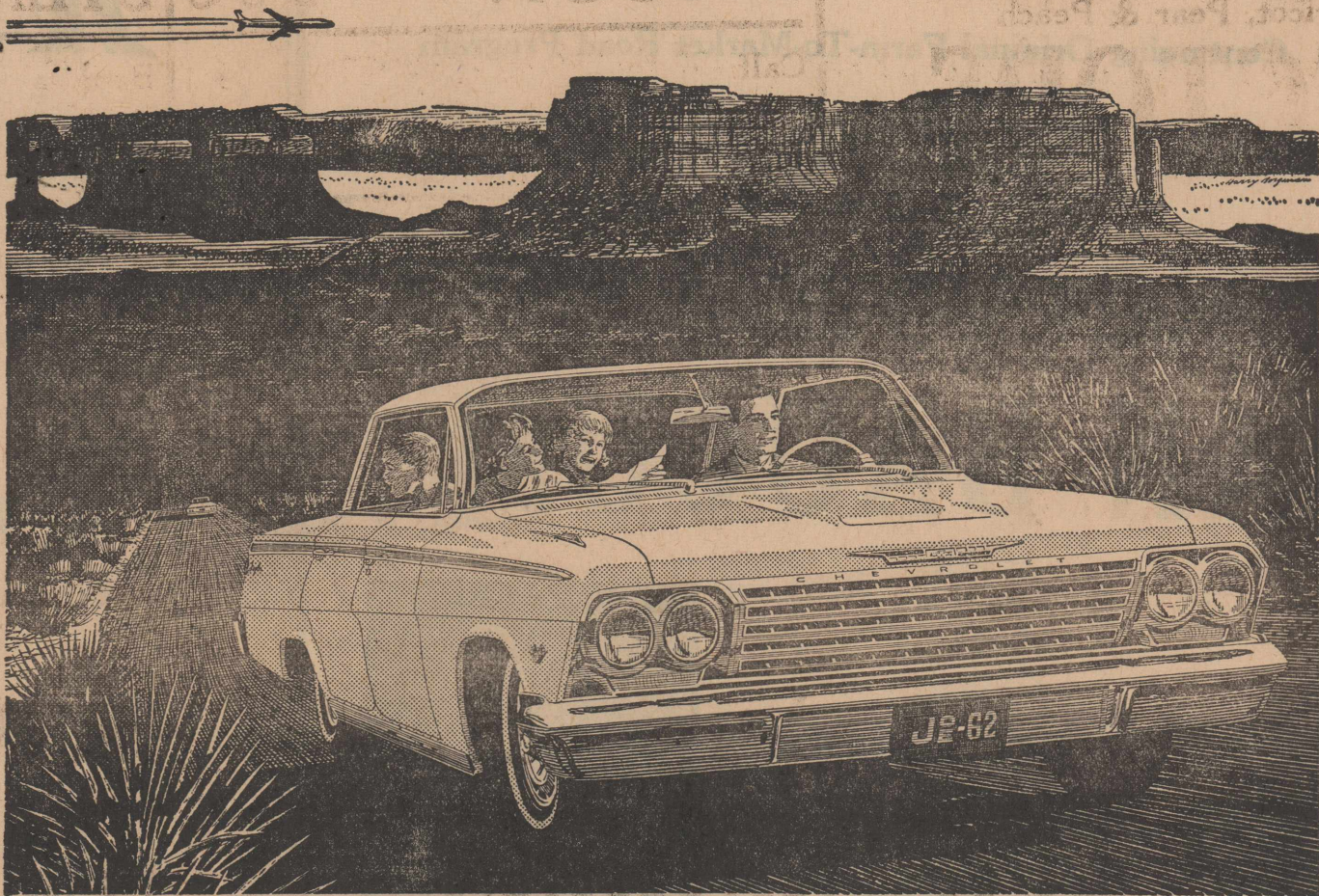

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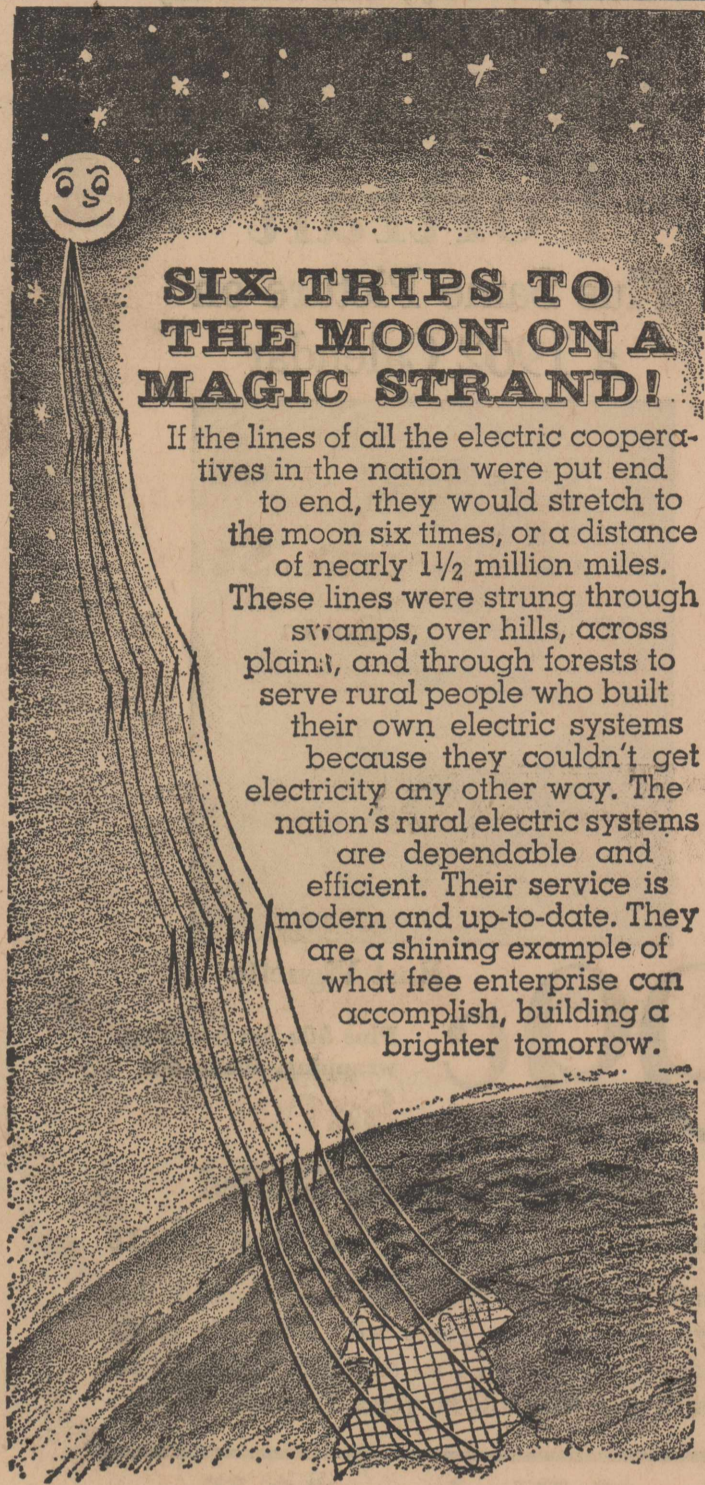
