Big Majority Favors Street Paving Project

Voters here Tuesdays gave a big majority favoring the paving project 208 to 86.

The bonds, which call for no increase in taxes or evaluation, are designed to finance the city's portion of a proposed project. The program includes paving of 112 city blocks and repair of 48 blocks of existing pavement in addition to a drainage control system.

Engineering work on the project will start next week, with extensive survey made on the overall drainage which has been a major problem since the beginning of Rotan.

Later property owners will be contacted to ascertain the ones favoring paving at their property, and a desire to pave will be necessary by majority of owners on each street, for work to be done.

Much Storm Damage In Area During Week

Plagued by heavy rainfall during the past week most Fisher County farmers are waiting for dry weather to start replanting their crops. A general survey of estimates over the county give about 25 percent of the crop left, with the other damaged or destroyed by hail, wind and heavy rains.

The storm period started last Thursday when heavy rains, much hail and a tornado definitely seen by many moved in from the northwest. A large barn on the Clay Fowler ranch northwest of Rotan was destroyed, and as the tornado moved west and south, much damage was done to homes, out buildings and cotton trailers. The storm crossed highway 70 near North Roby where considerable property damage resulted. Mac Blair had considerable damage as did O. R. Clark. Some 10 to 12 inches of rain have gauged in that area this week. Most homes in Roby suffered some damage. Trees ripped in Rotan, and a large picture window was shattered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Campbell. Part of the home was flooded and about \$1,000 damage resulted.

When the tornado was sighted the siren was sounded and firemen drove over with sirens sounding to warn people to seek shelter.

Rains have come most every night since the period started with hard winds accompanying.

Farming operations are similar to last year, when late rains kept farmers out of fields. Most farmers are optimistic, as they did not have ample moisture to get a crop going before the rains came and now most of them will start together, when the weather allows them to plant.

She has fountain service in connection with ice maker and will serve food in addition to the fountain service.

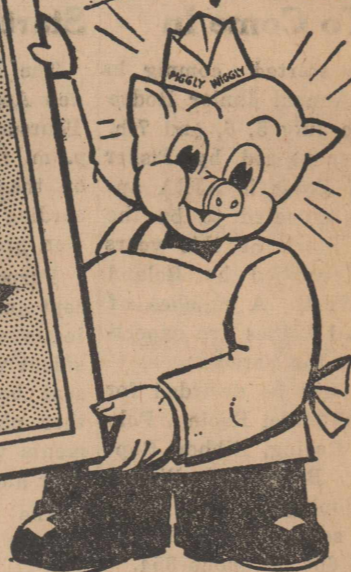

Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson will dedicate the 75-million-per week sterile fly plant at Mission, headquarters of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, on Saturday, June 16.

Dedication ceremonies begin at 10:00 a. m. at the plant, Moore Air Force Base, 14 miles north of Mission. Also included in the day's program will be tours of the plant before production and security regulations are started the following day.

The plant, built with funds contributed by individual livestock producers and sportsmen through the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, is being dedicated to the improvement of the Southwest Livestock Industry.

"We are very pleased that Vice-President Johnson will take part in the dedication ceremonies," C. G. Scruggs, President of the SWAHRF, said. "This is a program for the entire Southwest. Stockmen and sportsmen in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and New Mexico will receive tremendous benefits from the eradication of the most costly livestock pest confronting them. Vice-President Johnson can speak for stockmen and others interested in the program from this wide area."

"This day will be a milestone in the history of the Southwest livestock industry," Scruggs added. "Completing of the plant is the climax of one of the most intensive voluntary efforts ever made by stockmen anywhere. Their funds built the plant and it is being dedicated to the improvement of their industry."

Officials of the Texas Animal Health Commission and the Animal Disease Eradication Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, cooperating agencies in the program, will also take part in the dedication. Governors from the five states and the Secretary of Agriculture of Mexico have been invited.

The plant is actually a "fly factory." It covers 75,000 square feet, will employ 500 people working in three shifts every 24 hours for seven days a week, and is designed to produce from 50 to 75 million sterile screwworm flies each week of the year. Every operation is timed to coincide with the normal life cycle of the screwworm.

Livestock producers and sportsmen from the entire southwest are invited and urged to take part in this ceremony and inspect the plant built with their own funds.

Miss Louise Knolle of Sandis, since being named National Dairy Princess at Chicago last September, has traveled widely telling of America's great and vital dairy industry. According to A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, she has visited 26 states and South America and is currently on her June Dairy Month tour urging consumers to use dairy products for their health's sake.

Three popular insect control guides have been revised by entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and copies are available from the county extension office. They are L-255, Vegetable Guide; L-256, Livestock Guide and L-219, Ways to fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas.

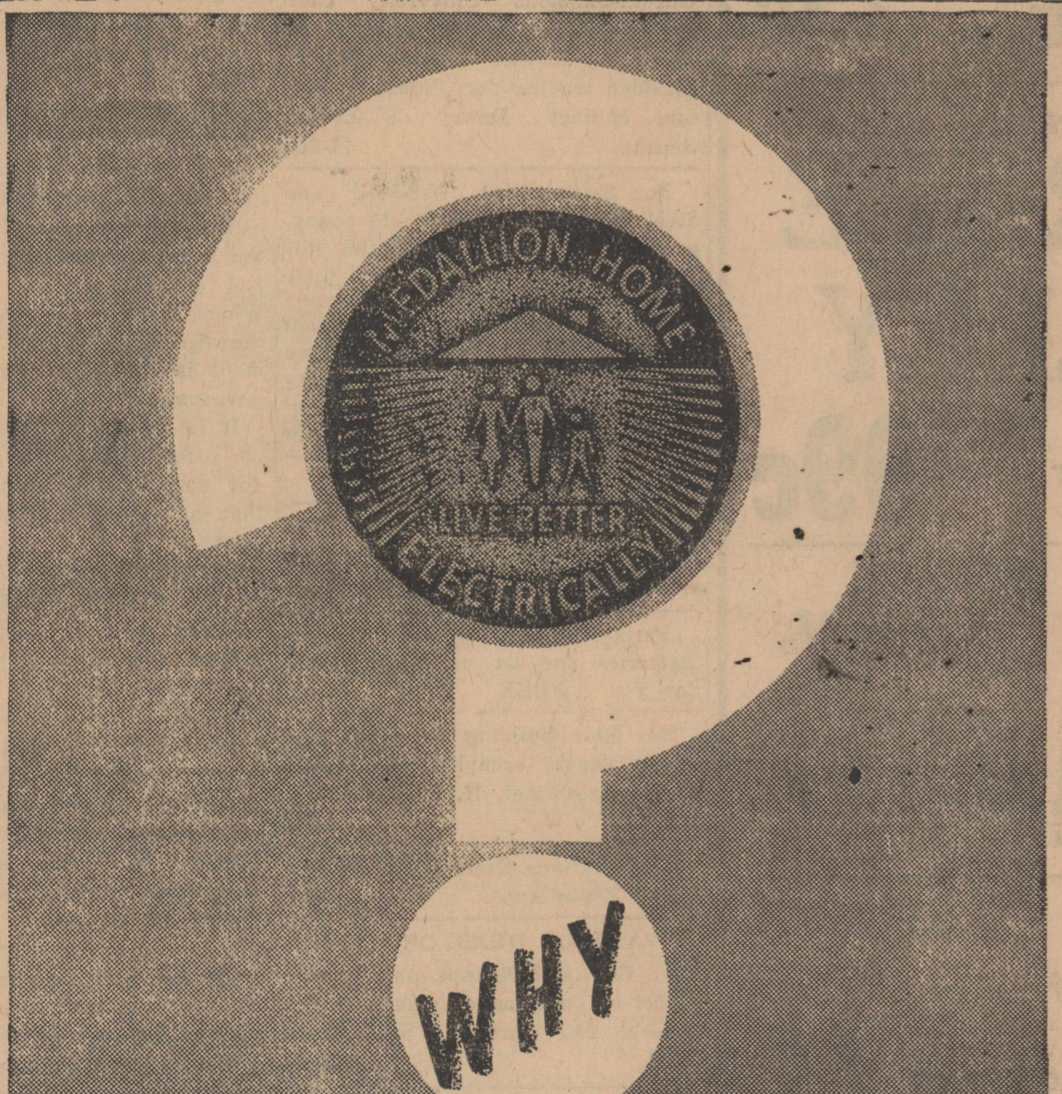

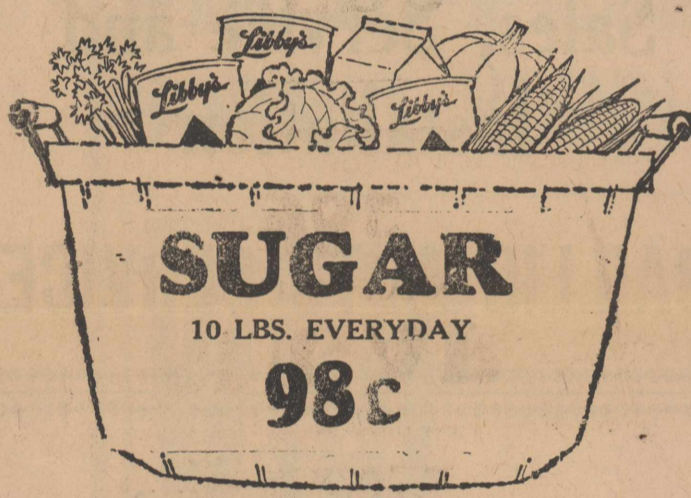

DEBTS--DECEASED DEBTORS--REPORTS.

This matter deals with those VA beneficiaries who have become indebted to the United States Government through overpayment to them by the VA and such overpayment were still outstanding at the time of their death.

Such debts of deceased debtors, regardless of the amount, will not be reported when these is positive evidence that the debtor left no estate.

However, if the deceased debtor leaves an estate, the Government will demand repayment from the executor of the estate.

The executor of the deceased debtor's estate may well be his widow, but even if it be some other person, to which she may be entitled.

This explains why some widows are billed for overpayment to their veteran husband while other widows are not. The governing thing is the estate. If the debtor leave an estate, the overpayment will be reported and collected by the government. When there is no estate left by the deceased debtor, the overpayment is simply written off by the government.

It is significant that the size of the estate left by the debtor is not for consideration, simply the fact that an estate exists or does not exist.

CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF VA CLAIMS FOLDERS

Except for the monthly rate of monetary benefits payable, all information contained in Veterans Administration claims folders is confidential and privileged, and no disclosure may be made except as authorized by VA regulations. The monthly monetary rate of VA benefits may be released to any person requesting such information, although the nature of the disabilities for which the payment is being made may not be revealed. A claimant may not have access to or custody of VA records concerning himself nor may a claimant inspect records concerning himself. When a recognized veterans organization holds a valid power-of-attorney, then an Accredited Representative of that organization may review the claims folder to be better able to assist the claimant. Additional details on the release of information from VA records may be obtained from Regional Service Officers.

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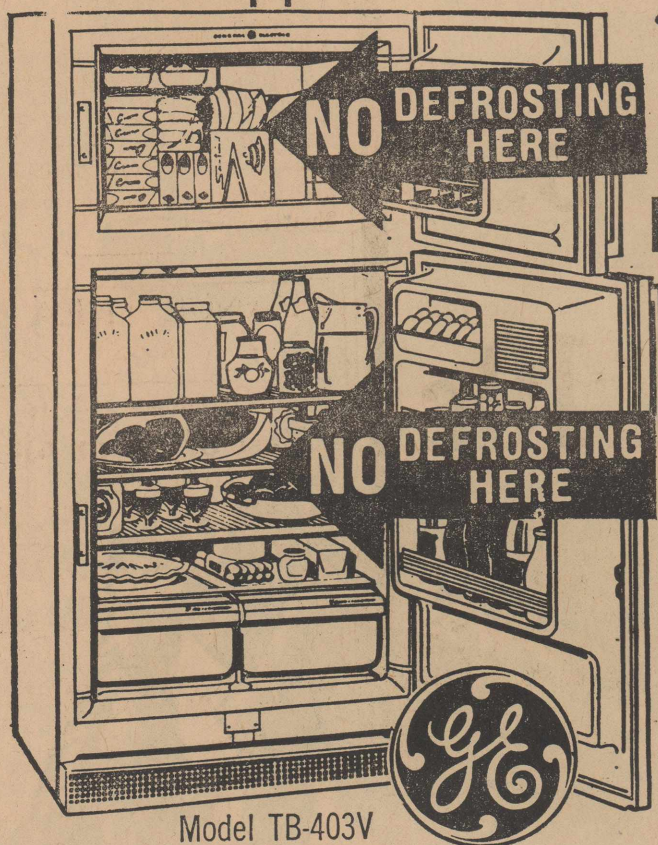

4-Hers Offered Special Conservation Awards

Six 4-H scholarships that have to do with conservation are being offered again this year by the Co-operative Extension Service through the National 4-H Service Committee of Chicago and the scholarship sponsors.

Four are for \$1,600 each and are the largest college scholarships offered in the national 4-H award programs. They will be provide for the sixth straight year by Homelite, a Division of Textron Inc. of Port Chester, N. Y.

Present of former 4-H Club members are eligible to apply if they are college freshmen planning to major or minor in forestry.

The other two scholarships of \$800 each, are identified as crop protection-crop production. They also will be given for the sixth year by California Chemical Company, Ortho Division, San Francisco.

To qualify, students must be juniors in a college of agriculture, majoring for two years in one or more of the following: agronomy, soils, entomology, plant pathology or horticulture (vegetables or fruit).

A forestry major now completing his first year at Texas A&M College, last fall won the \$1,600 forestry scholarship. He is Ronald C. Thompson, 19, who has spent more than eight years in 4-H Club work. Forestry has been his favorite project which he was able to carry on successfully on his parents' farm near Texarkana, Bowie county. He has won previous 4-H awards for his work in forestry.

Applicants for the 1962 scholarships should apply through the state 4-H Club leader or their county extension agent. Further information also is available from these sources.

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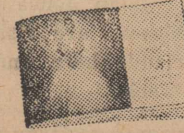
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
